FARM REMINDERS

The most effective method of protecting orchards from the forest tent caterpillar, now reported in great numbers over Oregon, is by applying tree tanglefoot in a ring around each tree, says the experiment station. This material is obtainable at most feed and seed stores, and must be kept fresh to be effective. Spraying with arsenate of lead, two or three pounds to 50 gallons of water, will control caterpillars already in the tree, but will not prevent others taking their place.

There are three possible methods of control and eradication of liver flukes on a ranch, says the Oregon experiment station. These are (1) the treatment of all fluke-infested animals at regular intervals to prevent infestation if pastures with fluke eggs, (2) the destruction of all snails which act as secondary hosts for liver flukes, and (3) the

fencing of all snail-infested areas so that sheep, cattle and goats cannot pasture in them.

HOME POINTERS

If fruit is served too cold the flavor is lessened as the cold numbs the taste buds in the mouth.

A corrugated rubber mat in front of the kitchen sink saves the hard wear on either floor or linoleum. It is also more restful for the feet.

To test fruit juice for pectin mix one tablespoon juice and one teaspoon sugar with one-half teaspoon Epsom salts. Stir until salts are dissolved and let stand two minutes to jelly.

Citrus and other tart fruits are valuable for breakfast as they stimulate the appetite. Some canned fruit has too much sugar, blunting the appetite for more needed foods.

To obtain an evenly coagulated, jelly-like soft boiled egg, the best method is to lower the egg into boiling water, remove it from the heat and leave for five minutes. Boiling makes the egg rubbery and unevenly coagulated.

Butter icing for cup cakes or cookies is made by creaming one-half cup of butter and adding gradually sifted confectioners' sugar. Add 2 or 3 tablespoonsful of strong coffee and one-half teaspoon of vanilla for flavor a few drops at a time when creaming.
