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ACCIDENTAL EXPLOSION CAUSES DEATH

Seth Sandberg died, and John Sandberg and Carl Johnson received injuries Sunday afternoon as a result of a premature explosion of dynamite at the Pumpkin Ridge rock quarry. It is not known what caused the accidental blast. The three were partners holding a contract for the removal of rock.

The explosion occurred at about 4 o'clock. Seth was placing the powder and tamping it with a pole at the time. He died a few minutes later. John, a nephew of Seth, and Johnson received more or less trifling injuries and were able to be around the next day. At first it was believed that John had received a skull fracture, but an X-ray, was taken, revealing no injury of the skull. His eyes were injured by the blast. The men were taken to the hospital.

Tuesday, Sandberg and Johnson, while describing the accident, stated that there were 80 sticks of dynamite in the hole, which had not been closed. The charge went straight up, and struck Seth in the chest. John was sitting about two feet away from the side of the hole. He believes that he probably owes his life to the fact that he was on the ground. Johnson was about six feet away. He received only a few cuts about his face.
