### BEAVERTON COUNCIL IN REGULAR MEETING

Perhaps the most interesting matter coming before the City Fathers at their regular meeting Monday evening was that of the ordinance providing for the building of a sidewalk from Main Street west to Erickson Ave. Just why the walk was not continued to the west Town boundary is not evident but the ordinance provided for the filling in, grading and building of the walk in one of the most needed places in Town. There are one or two other places where a walk is badly needed but this one is a start in the right direction.

On account of the meeting of the Retail Grocers Association Alderman Manning was not present.

A representative from the Investors' Syndicate was present and told the Council of the merits of his method of creating a sinking fund to take care of the bonded indebtedness of a town but no action was taken on the matter.

The ever present water matter came up in a new form this time. During July the loss was more than fifty percent of the water purchased by the City. During August this loss had been materially reduced though there had been no measures taken to reduce the loss.

The meeting was held on the ninth of this month on account of the first Monday being a holiday, a practice which had been followed for some years. In fact it is said by some that "We have always done it that way."

Monday evening, September 23 was set as the time for opening of the bids on the building of the sidewalk. Just why this matter had to be advertised in a Portland paper did not seem evident but that provision was embodied in the ordinance and so it must be. It is not long ago when a small ad in these columns published right here in Beaverton by people living here brought out a record number of proposals. We refer to the job of putting in the ditch down Short St.

past the Fordney and Hughson property from the north side of Broadway to the Beaverton ditch. Quite some job, perhaps not so big as the sidewalk, but that one will be called small when compared with paving jobs.

Well, perhaps we are living in Beaverton, perhaps a lack of Beaverton consciousness among the other city officials accounts for the advertising in a Portland rather than in a Beaverton paper.

It seems that the young lady had purchased her ticket and was waiting for the stage. When it drew up on the south side of the street, she did not notice as she expected they would announce their arrival at the place where they sold tickets.

A lady, knowing that she had her ticket told her that her stage was leaving and she rushed out and ran directly in front of the truck.

She was picked up by bystanders and Dr. Welsh was called. He pronounced her injuries serious and rushed her to St. Vincent's hospital where a more thorough examination was made. Her shoulder is said to have been broken. She also received other injuries, the extent of which has not yet been learned.
