City Council Names A Budget Committee

Bids Are Opened-Fredrickson of Portland Is Given The Work

LARGE ATTENDANCE

Committee Is Appointed To Consult Property Owners About Street

The meeting of the Beaverton City Council Monday evening of this week was an affair of considerable interest if one is to judge by the number of residents of the vicinity attending and taking part in the deliberations. One of the first things coming up for consideration after the regular routine business of such meetings had been disposed of was the opening of the bids received for the construction of the sidewalk on the south side of Front St. between Erickson Ave. and Main St. There were only two bidders, the Zehr Brothers of Beaverton and S. A. Fredrickson of Portland, but formerly a resident of this vicinity. Mr. Fredrickson was awarded the contract and the actual work of filling in and grading was started this Friday morning.

This being the time of year when a legislative body of this sort must look about and consider funds to carry on the work of the ensuing year, the Council and the Mayor appointed a budget committee consisting of C. E. Hedgie, Roy Gray, C. E. Mason, J. W. Sprague, and W. E. Pegg. They are to meet with the Council at a special meeting set for Monday evening, October 21, at 8:00 o'clock, p. m.

Another committee was appointed by the Mayor consisting of Messrs. Wood, Sprague, Gray, A. M. Hocken and Claude Braden for the purpose of consulting the property owners along the east side of Watson street to find out if possible whether or not it would be possible to secure for the purpose of widening that part lying south of second St. These are to meet with the council and report at a meeting to be held in the near future.
