Washington County Wins Blue Ribbons

**Jake Snider and Leland
Flint Are Among
Prize Winners****ARE MANY ENTRIES****In Oats Exhibit County Wins First
In All Of The Classes**

Washington County won twenty-one blue ribbons on the farm products assembled and taken by the county agent's office to the Land Products Show now in progress in connection with the Pacific International Livestock Show at Portland.

In the six market classes of wheat Washington County won the first prize awards, with entries made in only four classes in competition with wheat from all parts of the Northwest.

In the oats exhibit the county won first in all classes.

The Scholla community won six blue ribbons out of a possible seven in the potato classes. The potatoes in these winning classes were selected by Bert Rowell of Scholla.

Robert Forbis of Dille won three blue ribbons in the walnut and filbert classes.

Jake Snider and Leland Flint, of Beaverton, both won prizes.

TOPIC IS CHOSEN FOR ESSAY CONTEST

The Oregon Historical Society has selected "The Admission of Oregon to Statehood" as the subject for the 1930 Oregon History Essay Contest. The prizes are four in number, viz., first, sixty dollars; second, fifty dollars; third, forty dollars; and fourth, thirty dollars; and will be awarded for the best four original essays on the above named subject written and submitted by girls or boys over fifteen years of age and under eighteen years of age, attending any public or private school, academy, seminary, college, university, or other educational institution within the State of Oregon. Each of the four prize winners will also receive a handsome bronze medal.

The essay, handwritten or typewritten, and not exceeding two thousand words in length, accompanied by a separate sheet containing the name and post office address of the writer, the date of his or her birth, and the name of the school attended, and a certificate signed by a teacher or instructor of the educational institution attended, stating that the writer of the essay is a pupil or student thereof, must be delivered to the Oregon Historical Society, Room C, Public Auditorium, 253 Market Street, Portland, Oregon, not later than March 15, 1930.

All essays submitted in competition will be numbered and submitted, without the names of the writers or other identifying marks, to three judges who will judge the essays according to their general merit and excellence, with neatness of manuscript, accurate orthography, correct grammar and composition, and purity and clarity of diction being also taken into consideration.

Beaverton Trounces Tigard At Football

**Two Long Passes Are the

TO PLAY HILLSBORO

**Beaverton Has Not Been Scored
Against Once This Year**

The Beaverton boys took the Tigard team into camp to the tune of 27-0 last Friday afternoon on the latter's field. This was rather an unexpected turn to the game, though, of course, the Beaverton boys expected to come out at the long end of the score.

It has been repeatedly reported here that the Tigard boys were especially primed to beat Beaverton this year to in part pay back for the terrible drubbing they got last year.

Tigard boys were up and fighting every minute of the time, and during the first half they held Beaverton about even with no advantage that could be seen for either side. But in the last half they began to weaken and being about tied out they were slow to get going. That way Beaverton got the jump on them.

Two long passes were the big features of the game. These came in the way for a touchdown and were so well hidden that they got away clean.

The game today (Friday, Nov. 1) is with Hillsboro and Beaverton is looking forward eagerly to this contest. Beaverton has not been able to beat Hillsboro for a number of years and they think they have the best chance they have ever had this year. No reports have leaked out of what tactics Hillsboro will use but it is sure to be a good game. Beaverton has not had their goal line crossed this year but they probably will in this game.

Individually Beaverton has always had a good team, much better than indicated by their football record. But it takes teamwork to play this game and this year, the boys are getting an idea of what that means. Coach Warren has been very successful in getting them to work together and that is going a long way towards winning the games on this year's schedule.
