SOME HINTS

It is claimed that a copper receptacle for cut flowers will almost double their life. Cut the stems, place the flowers in warm water for a few minutes until the stems are full then place them in a copper dish filled with cold water.

Another friend for the candy eating: The kindly policeman now feels un-equipped for his day's work without a sack of candy in his pocket. He not only regales himself with a tid-bit occasionally but he has it to offer to the frightened child when lost. A lollipop or a piece of candy is an almost unerring solace, and through the candy his name and quite often even the street number may be obtained.

The orange juice habit is becoming so common that the breakfast table without a small glass of orange juice for young and old seems lacking in its setting.

An orange itself is something more than a luscious dainty fruit; it possesses one hundred calories of food value, contains calcium, phosphorus and iron, besides being rich in vitamins A, B and C.

Continue during the day with fruit, fruit salad and fruit desserts and the body will be furnished with the ingredients it most needs.

Small shallow wooden boxes make fine containers for small jars of fruit and jelly glasses. When cleaning the shelf the box and contents are easily moved and when well labeled is a help to find quickly what is needed.

When covering jelly glasses with paraffin, set the glasses in water, then any droppings of the wax may be easily gathered and used again.

Orange Pumpkin Pie.—Take one and one-fourth cups of pumpkin, seven-eighths of a cup of brown sugar, one teaspoonful, each of cinnamon and ginger, two and one-half tablespoonfuls of orange juice, a teaspoonful of the grated rind, two well beaten eggs, one cupful of milk, and one-half teaspoonful of salt. Make a smooth paste of the spices with a quarter of a cupful of additional milk, add to the sugar and eggs, then the remaining ingredients. Pour into a deep pie plate lined with pastry and bake in a hot oven for twenty minutes, then reduce the heat and bake in a slow oven for forty minutes longer.

A good rheumatism cure is fasting for several days using plenty of orange juice every few hours during the day, also water as much as one needs to drink. It is certainly a much more pleasant medicine than most rheumatism remedies and cannot be at all harmful.

Choice Foods.
Here is a lemon pie which has the reputation of being the best ever:

Van de Kamp's Lemon Pie.—Take one cupful of sugar, one-third of a cupful of flour, a bit of salt, the grated rind of one lemon, the juice of three, three egg yolks, one cupful of boiling water and two tablespoonfuls of butter. Mix the sugar, flour and salt. Add boiling water, stir and cook fifteen minutes; now add butter, egg yolk, rind and juice of the lemons. Turn into a well baked pastry shell and cover with a meringue, using the egg whites and one and one-half cupfuls of powdered sugar and a teaspoonful of lemon juice. Cover the pie and bake until brown.

Marmalade French Toast.—Beat two eggs, add one-half teaspoonful of salt, one tablespoonful of milk. Spread six slices of bread with orange marmalade, put together in pairs. Soak the bread in the egg mixture until soft, then cook on a hot buttered griddle until well browned on both sides.

Lemon Mint Jelly.—Take a package of lemon gelatin and dissolve in two cupfuls of boiling water in which has been steeped a good sized bunch of mint, well covered for ten minutes. Chill and mold in small molds; serve with lamb. Garnish with a fresh sprig of mint on top of each mold of jelly.

Rice Custard Supreme.—Beat two eggs until light, add two cupfuls of milk, one-half cupful of sugar, one-half teaspoonful of salt, one and one-third cupful of cooked rice, the grated rind of an orange and one cupful of fresh grated coconut; turn into a baking dish, set into a pan of hot water and bake for half an hour in a moderate oven.

Another Fruit Salad Dressing.—Add to four well beaten egg yolks, four tablespoonfuls each of flour, and sugar, one teaspoonful of salt, one-fourth teaspoonful each of dry mustard, white pepper, and one-half cupful each of pineapple juice, lemon juice and water. Cook in a double boiler until the dressing is thick and creamy, stirring well to avoid lumps.

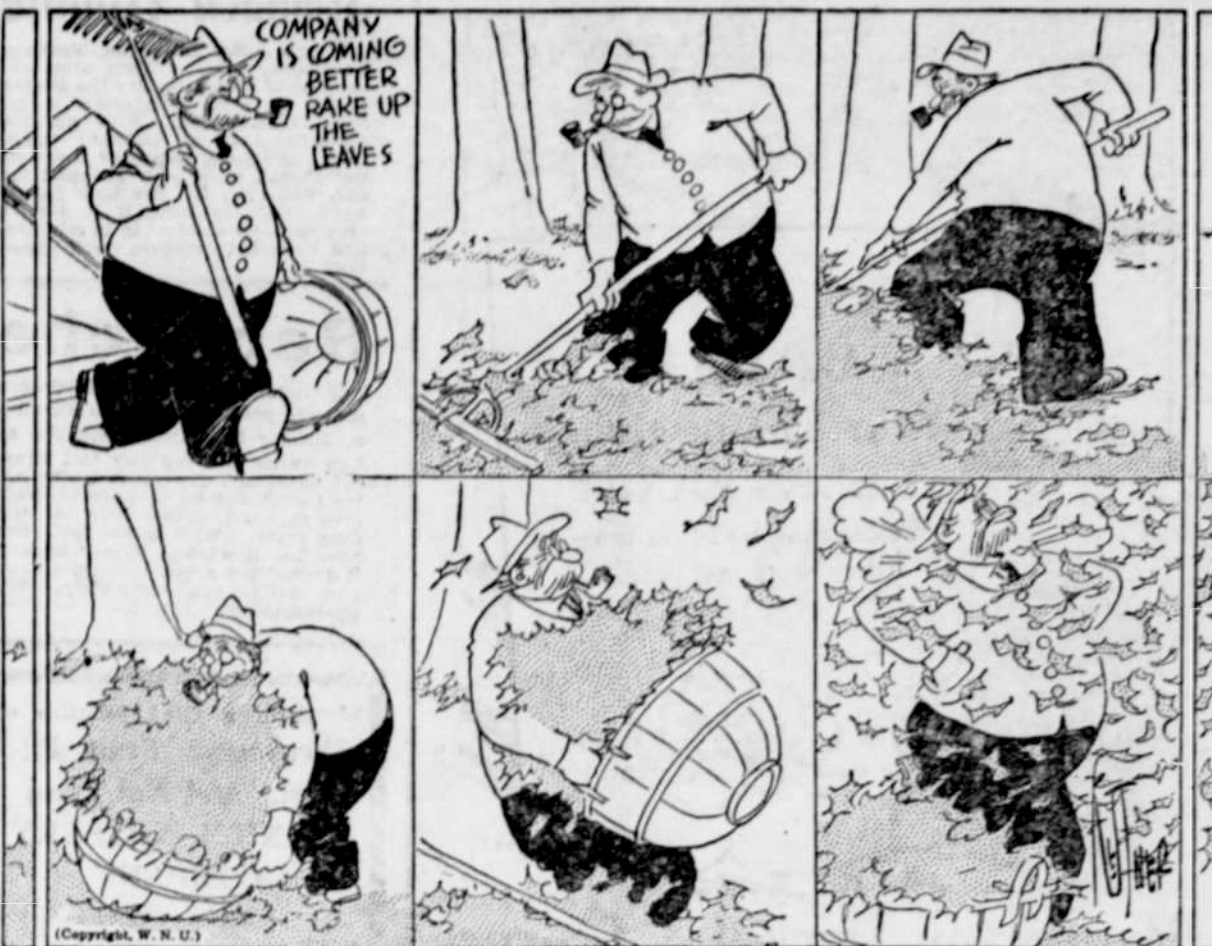

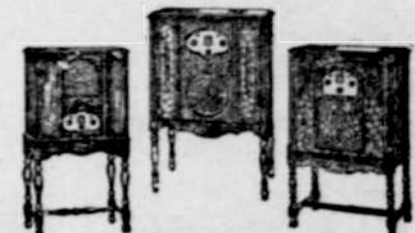

"Collectors" to Fight Menace of Insect Life

The stamp collector, the cigar-band fan, the hoarder of specimens of hotel china and other such collectors are about to be pushed aside by a coming generation of collectors, who are likely to specialize in gathering insects.

In this case, the childish hobby is to have a real benefit to the country. The growing menace of insect life to the larder of the future has spurred the Department of Agriculture to awaken early in the life of young students an acquaintance with their tiny enemies and to teach gathering and control methods.

To further this end a bulletin is being issued for distribution in schools giving data on various types of insects and describing how they should be collected and preserved.

The whole field of collecting, including the exchange of specimens, and so on, is covered in the comprehensive work. It soon may become a common sight to see youthful types of the scientist out stalking beetles, lady birds, aphids and such specimens.
