THINGS IN SEASON

Some day when the range oven must be used for baked beans or other long baking, try

Steamed Graham Pudding.—Take one-fourth cupful of butter, one-half cupful of molasses, one-half teaspoonful of soda, one egg, one-half cupful of sour milk, one and one-half cupfuls of graham flour, one cupful of raisins and spices to taste. Mix well and steam four hours. Serve with

Egg Sauce.—Beat the white of an egg until stiff; add one cupful of sugar, the yolk of the egg, a pinch of salt, one-half teaspoonful of vanilla and one-half cupful of boiling milk just as it goes to the table.

Fruit Pork Cake.—Chop fine one pound of pork—the salted pork—all fat. Cover with one and three-fourths cupfuls of boiling water and let stand until cold. Measure two cupfuls of sugar, one-half cupful of molasses, five cupfuls of flour, one tablespoonful of cinnamon, one teaspoonful of cloves, one-half tablespoonful of nutmeg, one teaspoonful of soda, and one pound of raisins finely chopped. Mix the spices and flour, add the raisins dusted with some of the flour, add soda and molasses and mix all the ingredients together. Bake in bread pans in a moderate oven. Test with a toothpick before removing from the oven. Ice, and the cake will keep for several months, improving with age. When one has home dried apples the apples may be substituted for half of the raisins. Use the water in which the apples were soaked and stewed for the cake.

Chestnut Salad.—Now is the time that the fresh nuts are so appetizing. Cook the chestnuts until soft, after they are blanched. Season with salt, a little chicken fat, or cook the nuts in the broth for flavor. Add two times the amount of diced celery and any desired boiled dressing.

Serve apple pancakes as a garnish for pork chops. Add as much chopped apple to the pancake batter as it will take well. Then cook is usual.

Economy in Foods.

One of the essentials in any family is a small Scotch kettle such as our grandmothers used for frying doughnuts. An iron cover is now made for the kettle and any foods placed in it may be cooked tightly covered and after heating the kettle, at lower

temperature, making a dish with all the flavor, aroma and nourishment preserved.

Creole Soup.—Take an ordinary soup bone from the leg of beef, rub with salt and a cut clove of garlic, place in the Scotch kettle, with no water. Cover closely and place in a moderate oven for four hours. At the end of that time the meat will have dropped from the bone and there will be plenty of juice and fat in the kettle. Skim off the fat. If too much; add one chopped green pepper, one small onion chopped, one-half teaspoonful of cloves and one-half a can of tomatoes. Cook in the sauce, tightly covered for a half hour, thicken with a little flour and serve poured over the beef.

The corner tough portions of meat which need long slow cooking to make tender, are delicious cooked in such a kettle. The flavor, as one knows, is in the muscles of the meat that are properly cooked, will be much more tasty than the choicer cuts.

Lamb Haricot.—Cut into two-inch squares the meat from a three-pound breast of mutton. Wipe clean with a damp cloth before cutting, then roll in seasoned flour. In an iron kettle place one pint of lima beans which have been soaked over night, add two sliced onions, a clove of garlic, season well, then lay on the meat. Cover and bake three hours.

New Orleans Pork and Cabbage.—Take two pounds of shoulder of pork. Shred one cabbage and place in the bottom of a well-greased kettle. Season the cabbage with salt, pepper and a few mustard seeds, half a cupful of vinegar and one teaspoonful of brown sugar. Put the pork well seasoned and floured on top of the cabbage and bake covered three hours. Serve with baked sweet potatoes.

Baked Date Pudding.—When the range oven is in use it is best to use every part of it. This pudding needs long, slow baking. Take a half cupful of rice, well washed, put it into a deep crock, add sugar to sweeten, one-half cupful of pitted dates, a grating of nutmeg or cinnamon. If preferred, and two quarts of milk with a bit of salt. Stir occasionally during the first hour of baking and bake until the pudding is soft and the milk nearly absorbed. Serve with a hard sauce. This is a pudding you may serve freely to the children of the family.

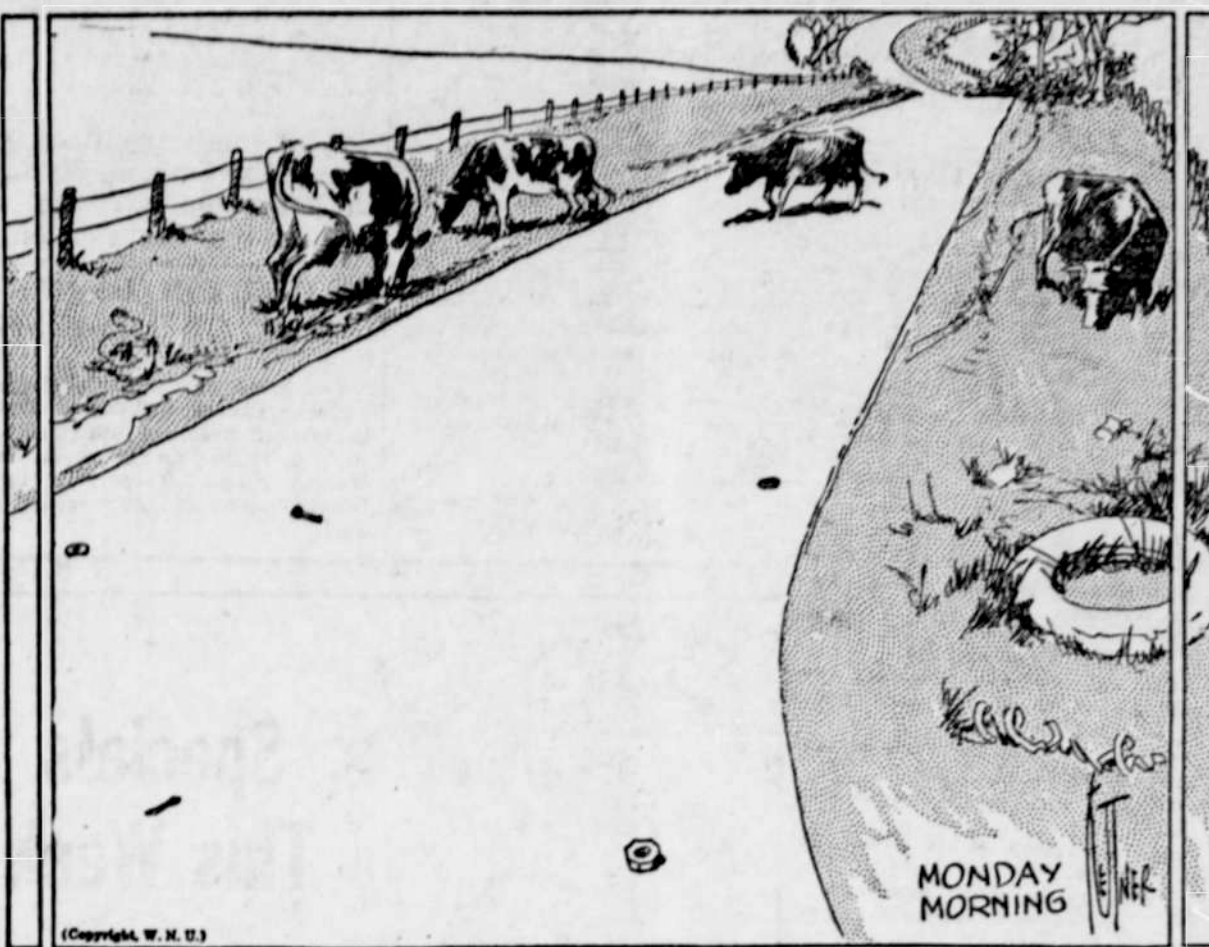
