Kiwanis Club To Give Prizes for Decorations

Committee Is Appointed to Look For A Site For A Community Hall

DECORATION PRIZES

Judges Of Christmas Contest Will Be Out Of Town People

What was probably the best meeting of the local Kiwanis club of the year, that is speaking of interest, and accomplishments, was held this week at the Commercial Hotel. The number present was not in the nature of a record crowd, nor was the number of selections on the program. However the excellence came from the action taken by the club on certain matters and the nature of the selections on the program.

The first unusual occurrence was that the hall rang accompanied by strains of music from a piano-accordion and a banjo in the hands of Ellsworth and Miss Zelma Hooker, young people who live just east of Beaverton in Kennedy Acres. This music was most favorably received.

When almost as soon as the members were seated, action began in the nature of the naming of a committee to look into the matter of acquiring a site for a Community Hall. Elmer Stipe, Leonard Adams, and L. R. Dean were named along with one or two others whose names we have forgotten to act on that committee.

Finally what had been accomplished when I. R. Metzler arose and invited all present to attend the dedication of the new high school auditorium and gymnasium. He also made the announcement that the Town Library was to be moved to the high school where it would be open part of every afternoon of school days for the use of the public.

The next matter which came up and was disposed of in a creditable manner was that of offering prizes for the best Christmas decorations which can be seen from the street. Seven dollars for a first prize and three dollars for a second prize in two different classes. The first class to consist of the business houses of the city, the other class consist of all residences within the corporate limits. The judges will be people from out of town so that there will not be any living within the town who will be barred from competing for one of the prizes.

Not at all satisfied with these good works, a committee was named and delegated with authority to purchase a trophy case to be inscribed with a suitable "K" and placed in the hall of the high school, if possible to be placed there before the coming dedication.

A fine program is being prepared by the teachers of the school and committees have been appointed to look after other matters.

BEAVERTON LIBRARY NOW AT B. H. S.

The Beaverton Library in the Cadby Building has not been used for some time as no librarian has been in charge. It has been thought best, therefore, to bring all of the volumes to the High School library and then open it to the public every afternoon except Saturday from one to four for borrowing books and from three to four for reading and reference. This will enable both the students and the townspeople to get the most out of books from the combined libraries. The school is constantly adding books to the library, both reference and fiction, and the addition of the town books will make it much more complete. The combined library in the high school building will be open for inspection the night of the dedication, and will be open to the public following New Years.

Large Gathering At U.W.C., Raleigh, Meet

Hon. Milton A. Miller Chooses Subject Of "Super-Highway For Speech

MEETING INTERESTS

Brother and Sister Furnish Music For Entertainment of Members

What is said to have been one of the most interesting and enthusiastic gatherings held in the Tualatin Valley in years gathered at the Raleigh school house Tuesday evening of this week under the auspices of the newly formed federation of clubs known as the United Westside Clubs. Representatives from forty-two communities were present, communities scattered from Hillsboro which was represented by Attorney McAlear, to Portland and from Wilsonville on the south to Linnton on the north.

The Greenwald orchestra from Reeville supplied the music, with Mr. Greenwald drums, Mrs. Greenwald, pianist and Mr. Olson, violinist.

Hon. Milton A. Miller spoke about the new "super highway" project, that road which is to bring the capital of the state and the metropolis of the state closer by a number of miles as well as when measured in minutes. This talk was followed by the Webb-Boswell quartette of Beaverton, consisting of Mr. and Mrs. E. G. Webb and Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Boswell, who gave several well-received selections.

Ben Reiland then spoke of the proposed Tunnel which he expects to be under actual construction not later than by February 1 of the coming year. This was followed by several selections by Harris Hansen, tenor soloist from Progress. Harris is well and favorably known in this vicinity and his singing always meets a cordial welcome.

John H. Lewis of Portland, formerly State Engineer, then spoke of the hydro-electric power possible development on the Columbia River. He told how Congress had appropriated several thousands to make a survey of the Ohio river, one capable of developing only a fraction of the horse power the Columbia could supply. He included in his talk, some of the possible development of the resources of Oregon, having charts with which to illustrate his points. Edwin A. Brown, another civil engineer of Portland also spoke on this same subject of "State Development."

Miss Zelma Hooker with the banjo and Ellsworth Hooker, brother and sister of Kennedy Acres, gave several selections which were loved by a talk by George A. Buck, Roadmaster of Multnomah County on the improvements being made and others contemplated for the Scholls Ferry road which connects the Bertha-Beaverton highway with the Canyon road at Sylvan. He also told of the re-surfacing of the Terwilliger with the new Amacote giving that boulevard an element of safety never before experienced by drivers.

The next meeting will be held in the new high school auditorium at Beaverton, the date being secured only after over-coming spirited competition from several other localities, among them Garden Home, Huber, Tigard, and others. At the next meeting there will be presented the matter of annexing a part of Washington county to Multnomah.
