Council Holds First Meeting Of The Year

Water Question Pops Up For a Time Just Before Adjournment

DR. TALBERT TALKS

Last Year's Bills Are Presented to Council, and Ordered Paid

The first meeting of the Town Council for the year is always looked forward to with plenty of interest by residents here. This is likely to be when the key-note for the activities of the Town government will be sounded. That is when the Mayor gives his annual message to the Legislative department of the municipal government. This is when he makes his recommendations and suggestions which he is supposed to keep before the Council for the coming year.

But to get back to the report of this meeting. After the minutes of the previous meeting were read and adopted, the old members proceeded to close up the books for the past year by passing on the bills they had incurred and ordering an audit of the accounts of the Recorder-treasurer. There was nothing said about auditing the accounts of the water clerk.

The following bills were presented and ordered paid: Tualatin Valley Water Co., \$404.10; Portland Electric Power Co., \$142.00; Geo. Thyns, recorder, salary, \$25.00; water clerk, \$50.00; V. H. Bixby, reading meters and labor, \$28.00; Investors Syndicate, January payment, \$97.50; Beaverton Enterprise, advertising, \$28.50; Glass & Prudhomme, poll books, \$7.00; Beaverton Review, advertising and printing ballots, \$30.15; Barr & Cunningham, supervising concrete work, \$54.35; Watson St., \$7.50; assessment roll for sidewalk, \$6.65; West Coast Telephone Co., long distance toll, \$4.80; F. A. Noyes, work on sewer, \$5.95; Alexander service station, gas for fire truck, \$5.20; top for meter top, \$1.20; Otto Erickson, repair and storage of fire apparatus, \$48.40; J. E. Smith, work on streets, \$24.00.

The retiring members of the body then gave up their seats to those coming in. Mayor Erickson, who succeeded himself was sworn in as were all other officers taking their seats, by retiring Recorder Thyns. After this the mayor read his speech, which he had not committed to memory. In this he made the usual plea for harmony in the Town government, then proceeded to appoint the committees for the ensuing year. They are as follows: streets and walks, Wilson and Talbert; finance, Lewis and Alexander; health, Drs. C. E. Mason and R. S. Walsh; sanitation, the council as a whole; Marshal, V. H. Bixby; Attorney, A. C. Allen. These he read to the Council, but on the paper handed to Recorder Dietrich, there was the following significant statement (which he did not read): "There has been no resignation from the office of water clerk so that there is no need for any appointment as the Council appointed the present water clerk at their meeting on June 28, 1929."

There were a few remarks by Dr. Thyns and then the Recorder was asked to speak. Both voiced about the same sentiments, that they were in readiness to help in any matter to carry out any measures looking forward towards the well-being of Beaverton.

After the speech-making the old friend the water question came up for a little discussion as in his message to the Council, the Mayor had made the statement that he did not think it desirable or possible at this time to lower the rates. This brought out the question from Alderman Talbert as to why it was not possible or desirable to make some reduction. This question was still being discussed up till the time adjournment was taken.

KIWANISANS MEET AT LOCAL HIGH SCHOOL

This week's meeting of the local Kiwanis club was held in the newly remodeled cafeteria at the high school. Dinner was served to the members by the class in domestic science. The local basketball team were guests, as was a brother of Pres. Talbert.

The members for the first time wore their Kiwanis buttons purchased through the Beaverton Review, constructed according to a drawing made by Mrs. J. R. Talbert. There were many expressions of pleasure and favorable comments were heard on every hand.

Not the least among the nice things said were the remarks on the delicious luncheon served by the girls of the domestic science department of the high school. Everybody seemed to enjoy the meal immensely.

L. R. Dgan, proprietor of Dean's Drug Store and chairman of the local school board was the principal speaker of the evening. He told the club some thing of the aims and ambitions of the school board and how the school has grown in the past decade. He also spoke in glowing terms of I. R. Metzler, Superintendent of schools, who he believed was entitled to a major portion of the credit for this development.

Next meeting will be held on the evening of January 14, just preceding the meeting of the United Westside Club which will convene about the time for the closing of the Kiwanis meeting. There will be an excellent program presented at both of these meetings.

FINDLEY POTATOES GROWN IN TRIALS

Certified Netted Gem seed potatoes grown locally by H. R. Findley & Sons of Cedar Mill produced equally as large a crop of potatoes as did Netted Gem seed potatoes from Montana, according to a report made to our County Agent. In another trial on the irrigation Branch Experiment Station at Prosser, Washington, this year the Washington County Netted Gems returned 11.74 tons of potatoes per acre, with only .4 of a ton of culms.

Yakima Valley finds it profitable to buy the bulk of the four to five hundred cars of seed potatoes from outside points. Yakima grown seed gives low returns generally. Much of this seed stock is being purchased from Idaho, Montana, and as far east as Minnesota. The trials were arranged by the county agent in the hopes that markets for Washington County Netted Gem seed potato stocks might be developed. The trials are to be continued this year. H. R. Findley is much interested in this new development and contemplates a trip to the seed potato show at Wapato, Washington, this week to further the trial of Washington County Netted Gem seed potatoes in the Yakima Valley.

Premature Explosion Is Cause Of Death

One Of Reed Brothers Was Only A Little Way Away Newly Placed Blast

IS BORN IN CANADA

Newton Comes to Oregon and Purchases Home in 1919

Friday afternoon while blasting stumps on land belonging to the Reed Brothers, Alfred Newton met his death as the result of a premature explosion.

Newton, who lived across the road from the place was an elderly man hired only to help. He is said to never have lighted a fuse and this time, with an extra long fuse attached to the powder, the brothers consented to let him try his hand at lighting it. One brother, Fred, was only a little way from the newly placed blast when the explosion occurred. The other brother, who had not waited to quite finish up the final preparations for lighting had gone away some distance.

This was the last charge they were going to use and had on what they thought was an extra slow fuse.

Fred, the last one to leave the location had picked up the powder box and gone a few rods when he turned just as the explosion occurred, but in time to see Newton toppling over apparently from where he had knelt to touch off the charge. Death was instantaneous.

Alfred Newton was born in the province of Quebec, March 5, 1864, of French parents but early learned to speak the English language.

As a youth he came to the States and spent a number of years there but returned to his old home where he met and later married Mrs. Arzelia Tucker.

The couple came to Oregon and purchased their home, just a little north and west of the Hazeldale store late in 1919. There they made their home until the husband met his untimely death.

Funeral services were held from Pegg's Undertaking Parlor Tuesday of this week.
