CONSERVATION AND THE FUR SUPPLY

"An active conservation policy," says the Sears, Roebuck Agricultural Foundation, "is the one sure way to check the decrease of fur bearing animals in the United States."

When the white man first came to this country it abounded with astonishing numbers of wild animals and birds. Nowhere, except in Africa, could be found such a variety and profusion of wild life. Although our ancestors took heavy toll of both game animals and fur bearers little difference could be noted up to within less than a hundred years ago. But the rapid advance of civilization and increase in population accomplished what trappers and hunters could not. It drove the fur bearers from their breeding grounds and the buffalo from the plains. Tall cities sprang up where at one time the wolf had stalked unmolested. Great bridges spanned the streams once tenanted by otter, beaver and muskrat. Whole forests fell under the settler's axe and the draining of swamps for farming deprived countless herds of their homes. Naturally hundreds of thousands of animals perished, but this was not noticed immediately. The heedless waste went on and on. Demand for furs increased by leaps and bounds. Prices shot up. Not only did trappers ply their trade long before and after the prime season, thereby taking much fur which was practically valueless; but also hunters and sportsmen killed thousands of animals for the sheer joy of killing, not even bothering to carry home the carcasses.

Finally, thinking people began to realize that if unrestricted trapping and hunting continued there would soon be no fur bearers to take. Conservation commissions were formed in many states. The fur industry gave advice, and even the government took an active part. One by one nearly all the states have passed laws limiting the season during which fur animals may be trapped to the cold winter months when furs are most valuable, and thus insuring the future fur supply. Trappers themselves have been quick to appreciate the advantages of intelligent conservation; and the higher prices they secure for prime furs is more than making up for the fact that they can no longer trap during the unprime season.

Conservation means more, however, than the legislative control of trapping seasons. Trappers are also learning how by more careful skinning, stretching, and drying they can make the furs they do catch yield them a maximum of returns. For instance the First National Fur show offering \$5,000 in cash awards for well handled furs is now being sponsored by the Sears, Roebuck Agricultural Foundation. The purpose of the show is two fold. It encourages better preparation of pelts for market and discourages the taking of furs out of season. Movements such as this are constantly bringing the benefits of conservation before the eyes of trappers, and it is hoped that some day the slogan "Every trapper his own game warden" will be a reality.

KEEP HOME AIR MOVING AND INCREASE WORKING EFFICIENCY

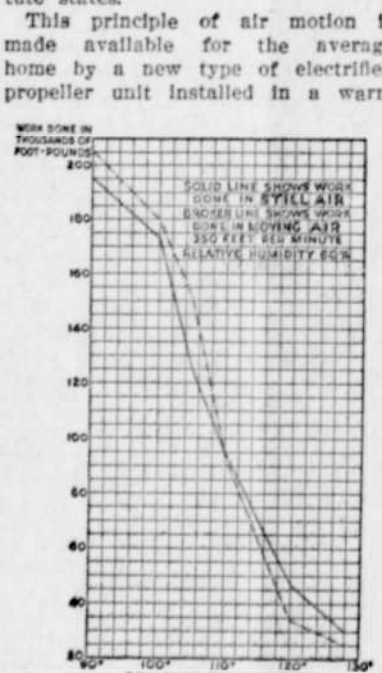
Modern air conditioning science makes it possible for employers to increase both the comfort and the efficiency of their workers by simple and inexpensive methods. The Holland Institute of Thermology, Michigan, declares the Holland Institute of Thermology, Michigan. And the same methods can be used to change the ordinary warm air circulating in a year-round air conditioning plant that will make the home comfortable in summer as well as in winter.

Keep the air in the factory, office or home moving steadily at moderate velocity instead of allowing it to remain stagnant—that's the principle by which effective cooling can be introduced without complicated refrigerating or dehumidifying machinery, according to the ventilating experts of the Holland Institute.

Air motion tests recently conducted at the Pittsburgh research laboratories of the U. S. Bureau of Mines and the American Society of Heating and Ventilating Engineers showed how the application of this principle increases working efficiency. First, men were put to work in the test chambers with the air normally still and stagnant. Then this air—of the same temperature and with the same relative humidity—was blown past the workers at a velocity of 350 feet. All the men tested were able to produce more work in the moving air than in still air. The results are shown in the chart given here, which was simplified by the Holland Institute of Thermology from one prepared by the Society of Heating and Ventilating Engineers.

Other tests showed that the work pulse rates were lowered by the air motion—and scientists accept pulse rate as the best indicator of the severity of discomfort under hot weather conditions. Similar results have been obtained from studies made by the British National Institute of Medical Research, the Holland Institute of Thermology, Michigan.

This principle of air motion is made available for the average home by a new type of electrified propeller unit installed in a warm air heating plant.



air heating plant. During the summer it keeps cooling breezes moving through every room of the home. In winter it increases heating efficiency by distributing heat more rapidly through the house and by operating on the principle of a large volume of moderately and healthfully warmed air rather than a small quantity of dry and parched air.
