A new name has appeared on the  
political roster. A. M. Jannsen of  
Beaverton, Rt. 1, has decided to  
seek the nomination on the Repub-  
lican ticket for representative from  
Washington county. He is rather  
well known hereabouts, but per-  
haps a little sketch of previous  
years may not be out of place.

Alfred M. Jannsen was born in  
Clinton, Iowa, February 2, 1885.  
He spent practically all of his boy-  
hood and young manhood on an  
Iowa farm. He was married Nov-  
ember 16, 1914, to Ruby McConnell  
at Vancouver, Wash. Mrs. Jann-  
sen is a native of Mayville, Oregon.  
They have two boys, one ten and  
the other four.

During the war he tried his luck  
at home standing in Montana for  
three years, but found it necessary  
to follow his trade of well drill-  
ing on the side in order to make  
a living. The Jannsens have made  
their home in this county for the  
past nine years. He has been in the  
well drilling business all this time, start-

**POST OFFICE EXAM-  
INATION TO BE HELD**

To fill the vacancy in the pos-  
ition of postmaster in Beaverton,  
the United States Civil Service  
Commission has announced, at the  
request of the Postmaster General  
and in accordance with an order  
of the President, an open competi-  
tive examination.

To be eligible for the examination  
an applicant must be a citizen of  
the United States, must reside  
within the delivery of this post of-  
fice for two years next preceding  
the date for close of receipt of ap-  
plications, must be in good physical  
condition, and within the prescribed  
age limits. Both men and women  
are admitted.

Applicants will be rated on their  
education and business training  
and experience.

Nothing will be permitted to ap-  
pear in the evidence upon which  
ratings are assigned which might  
even suggest the political affiliation  
of any candidate.

Full information and application  
blanks may be obtained at the  
post office for which the examina-  
tion is held, or from the United  
States Civil Service Commission,  
Washington, D. C.

GEORGE W. LIPPERT

Geo. W. Lippert, of Aloha, has  
announced his candidacy for the  
office of County Judge for Washing-  
ton county. He was born in Wis-  
consin in the year 1885, attended  
the grade schools there, worked his  
way through Wisconsin University  
by doing odd jobs, and was gradu-  
ated from the law school of that  
university in 1914. Thereafter he  
was engaged in the practice of  
law in that state.

Mr. Lippert was admitted to the  
practice of law in the Wisconsin  
Supreme Court in 1914, was ad-  
mitted to practice in the Federal  
Courts the same year, and in 1920  
was admitted to practice before the  
United States Supreme Court, at  
Washington, D. C., the highest  
court of the land. The American  
Blue Book of Wisconsin Attorneys  
says of him: "Mr. Lippert is a good  
speaker, and few men of his age  
and experience at the Bar have  
gained a more favorable standing."  
And the biographical edition of  
Wisconsin, Its History and People  
says of him: "Among his fellow  
practitioners he is recognized as a  
lawyer of high attainments."

He has been associated with Busi-  
ness more or less all his life. At  
one time he owned an interest in  
a mercantile business, then traveled  
for the National Biscuit company,  
and he is now associated with H. A.  
Lowry in the Aloha Mercantile  
company. He is the owner of a  
large White Leghorn ranch near  
Aloha.

He is president of the Aloha  
Community club, and is also presi-  
dent of the United Westside clubs,  
an affiliation of some forty com-  
munity clubs interested in the pro-  
motion of the interests of the peo-  
ple of the Tualatin Valley. As such  
president he has taken a keen and  
active interest in the welfare of the  
people of the Valley—especially  
those of Washington county.

In the fall of 1929, Mr. Lippert  
won the silver cup awarded by the  
State Fair association, at Salem,  
in the oratorical contest. He was ad-  
judged the best speaker there. If  
he should decide to make an active  
speaking campaign, as it is intimated  
that he will do, the voters  
of Washington county may expect  
to hear things of interest.

McMinnville's speedy town team  
came to Beaverton Wednesday eve-  
ning all set to add another scalp  
to their long string of basket ball  
victories. But the dope sheet failed  
to prognosticate what was going  
and the visitors returned to their  
home town after suffering a set-  
back to the tune of 36-41, the  
Beaverton boys claiming the own-  
ership of the long end of the score.

The weather was not all it should  
have been, and so the crowd which  
greeted the players was not large,  
but they made up in noise what  
they lacked in numbers and gave  
the local boys plenty of cheers when  
the sphere descended through the  
loop.

During the first quarter it look-  
ed as though it was going to be "too  
bad" for the locals, for when "the

19-8 with the McMinnvillians at  
the long end. Put when the half  
came, things were evened up to  
considerable, the reading then be-  
ing 23-22. Along in the last quar-

game, played more of a defensive  
game, or the score would probably  
have gone up much higher.

Lovett was high scorer for the  
visitors, having negotiated 14 points  
for their side, with Green taking  
second honors for them with eight  
points to his credit. Phillips and

locals, each getting credit for ten  
baskets. Homrich was third with  
eight.

## Aged Violin Maker Answers Last Call

He Becomes Widely Known  
In This Section For His  
Skill in Violin Making

BORN IN NEW YORK

Widow and Three Children Survive  
and Three Children Are Dead

Chas. Haulenbeck was born in  
East Genoa, New York, April 9,  
1847. When only a young lad he  
went with his father to the plains  
of what was then Iowa, just after  
that territory had been admitted to  
the Union.

From there, when about fifteen,  
he went to Manhattan, Kansas,  
where for almost fifty years he  
was engaged in the lumber business.

He married there and six chil-  
dren came to bless them. Three  
survive as does the widow, affec-  
tionately known here as "Grandma  
Haulenbeck".

The living children are John A.  
of Beaverton, George of Multnomah,  
and Gertrude Johnson, late of  
Beaverton but now in Hollywood.  
The three dead are: Marie, who  
departed this life about twenty six  
years ago; and Frank and Arthur,  
who died here in Beaverton. Arthur's  
wife lives at Crescent City, Calif.  
The other two never married.

It was about 1910 when the fam-  
ily came to Portland, Oregon where  
they spent ten years and 1919 they  
came to Beaverton where they en-  
gaged in the lumber business in  
what is now known as the Beaverton  
Lumber Co.

Mr. Haulenbeck in late years  
became rather widely known as a  
violin-maker and the products of  
his handiwork are quite widely  
scattered through the Northwest.

For the past few years, age has  
benumbed the faculties once so keen  
and last spring he went back to his  
old home in Kansas. There he suf-  
fered a fall which injured his spine,  
an injury from which he never fully  
recovered.

In the picture he is shown hold-  
ing one of his own make of violins,  
while in the other hand he holds  
a loving cup won in a radio con-  
test of which he was adjudged the  
winner though he competed with  
some of the leading musicians of  
this section.

Mr. C. A. Haulenbeck died last  
Saturday morning at the age of  
82 years. The remains will be sent  
to Manhattan, Kansas, for burial.

**AIR MAIL PACKAGE  
COMES TO THE BANK**

A package bearing, probably the  
largest amount of postage of any  
ever handled at the local post office,  
arrived Tuesday morning addressed  
to the Bank of Beaverton. It bore  
stamps aggregating \$3.85 in value  
and came by air mail.

Some time during the storm the  
Bank ordered some special station-  
ery for their modern book-keeping  
machine, one of the very latest  
of this sort of equipment. For  
some reason these supplies did not  
arrive and late last week they  
wired the Chicago house handling  
these supplies, the only place in  
the country where they can be  
purchased. The Chicago house  
mailed the package late Saturday  
afternoon of last week. It must  
have arrived in Portland Monday  
in order to get out here on the  
morning mail Tuesday.

Considering the inclemency of the  
weather and the distance the pack-  
age travelled in would seem al-  
most to have been record time.

## Defiant
