MANY VARIETIES OF GRAIN ARE NAMED

Many inquiries are being received by the county agent's office relative to the best varieties of grain for midwinter and spring seeding. County Agent O. T. McWhorter refers to a report made by a local committee of grain growers and E. R. Jackman, of the O. A. C. Farm Crops Department, just following the freezing out of grain in 1925. This report recommends Jenkins Club wheat, White winter, White Holland and Rink for February seeding. The White Winter and White Holland varieties are not recommended for seeding later than February as these are true winter varieties and often fail to head when seeded later than February. Jenkins Club has become a general favorite in many parts of the county.

Varieties of true spring wheat such as Rink, Marquis, Jenkins Club and Polsy are recommended for spring wheat seeding. For spring seeding especially after the middle of March, Hanchen barley has no competitor for amount of grain yields per acre. Since 1922 this crop has become the leading spring grain crop in Washington County.

This report made in 1925 pointed out that if half a crop of grain remains and the same is somewhat evenly distributed that it is usually better to leave it rather than replant as fall planted grain usually yields nearly double that of spring grain on most soils. In case of thin stands, it was at that time suggested that the addition of 50 to 100 pounds of sulphate of ammonia or nitrate of soda per acre in the early spring would make the grain stand out.

Local Man Struck By Passing Auto

F. M. Lassiter Is Killed In- stantly, While Cross- ing the Street

BURIAL TO BE SUNDAY

Newman Claims He Was Going Less Than 25 Miles an Hour

F. M. Lassiter, Beaverton, was struck and killed by an automobile driven by M. Newman, at 11:30 a.m. Sunday, while walking across the Pacific highway just north of the city limits of Oregon City. Newman, a traveling salesman, was taken to the city jail, pending the outcome of a coroner's inquest.

Lassiter and his wife were driving, but stopped their machine to look at the falls of the Willamette. Lassiter left the car and started across the road, stepping in front of Newman's car. The impact killed him instantly.

Newman said he saw Lassiter start across the highway, hesitate a moment, then dash in front of his machine. He said he was traveling not more than 25 miles an hour, but that it was impossible to halt the car before it struck the man.

Lassiter had been with the Union Pacific since 1920. Just before his death he was chief clerk in the freight accounting department at Portland.

Besides his widow, he is survived by his aged mother of Vicksburg, Miss., a daughter, Mrs. Frank J. Tibbets of Salem, Ore., two sons, Warren and Frank M. of New York City, three brothers, W. W. of Vicksburg, Miss., Allan of Baton Rouge, La., and Clayton C. of Douglas, Ariz., and three grandsons of Salem, Ore.

Mr. Lassiter's body is being forwarded to Vicksburg, Miss. Mr. John Keeling of Seattle is accompanying Mrs. Lassiter as far as Chicago where she will be met by her sons, Frank and Warren of New York, who will go with her to Vicksburg, Miss., where interment will take place next Sunday.

NINE PASSENGERS BOARD AT PORTLAND

The first passenger train from Portland to Corvallis arrived in Corvallis over the Western Oregon railroad, or Southern Pacific as it is now called, fifty years ago Thursday, January 30. The train, consisting of two cars, was pulled by a wood-burning locomotive, via Forest Grove and Beaverton. The trip was completed in nine hours.

Nine passengers, according to records, boarded the cars at Portland, but 27 were on hand at Independence.

This train was scheduled for arrival on January 1, 1880, but owing to the severe winter conditions the construction work had not been completed there.

Every ten miles, there was a wood pile sitting along side of the tracks, and the train would stop and load up with fuel. Passengers were often invited to help in the loading.

In 1890, Corvallis was connected by railroad with Albany.

City Council Meets In Regular Session

Council Votes To Purchase a Much Needed Fire- Ladder for \$75

TAX IS DISCUSSED

Bills Are Presented and Are Given To the Finance Committee

The Council meeting was called to order Monday evening by Mayor Erickson, all members of the Council and the Recorder answering to the roll call.

Bills are presented and given to the finance committee for their auditing as follows: Howard Cooper Co., fire extinguisher, \$50.00; P. E. P. Co. meter slips, \$1.50; P. E. P. Co., January light, \$141.00; P. E. P. Co. light in town hall, \$2.00; P. E. P. Co., Christmas tree, lights, \$19.95; Orrie Sutton, shoveling snow, \$8.00; Geo. Thyng, water clerk, \$50.00; V. H. Bixby, marshal, \$12.00; Otto Erickson, tractor clearing streets, \$138.10; F. W. Bishop, \$3.75; P. L. Schultz, moving safe, \$25.00; Dewey, the Plumber, thawing out pipes, \$20.00; Tualatin Valley Water Co., \$509.10.

A representative of the Howard-Cooper Co. was present and offered the Town a fire ladder, which he claimed was a bargain, and the council voted to purchase same at a cost of \$75, as this is a thing the Town has needed for some time.

A letter from N. J. Skee called the attention to the matter of the City's liability for accidents which might happen in connection with the fire engine and suggested that same be covered by insurance. A motion to place it on the table carried.

The matter of the purchase of a site for the Town hall which has to be moved from the right-of-way of the new highway was discussed and finally carried over to a meeting to be held Monday evening of next week.

The "Occupation Tax" came in for some consideration and a motion for the Mayor to have a committee prepare a schedule for some consideration of the City Attorney carried.

Probably the feature of the evening was the presentation of an initiative petition having in mind defining the duties of the Recorder and making him the official who should collect the water and naming the salary at \$75 per month.

When presented, City Attorney Allen read from the Constitution of the State of Oregon that it was illegal for one man to hold two legislative offices at one time. After the petition had been read and some discussion, it was moved by Alexander, and seconded by Lewis that the petition be laid on the table, "until next regular meeting."

Some time after the reading, Attorney Allen requested the petition and shortly afterward left with it in his possession, notwithstanding Ordinance No. 77 limits the time the recorder has to look over the signatures on the petition and report it out one way or the other within ten days. Conversation had at the meeting seemed to indicate that the twentieth of the month, which would make it too late for any action to be taken on the initiative, was as soon as he would expect to return the document.

Another incident which looked rather significant is that after the bills had been audited by the finance committee, the recorder asked the Mayor to request a motion to allow the bills. The Mayor replied that it "is not necessary, as we have always paid the bills without any motion."
