Dr. C. E. Mason And Atty Geo. Lippert Both Deliver Able Addresses

The Chamber of Commerce and Kivans are feeling rather proud of the success of their banquet put on in the Masonic Hall last Friday evening. There were about a hundred fifty present, including delegations from Hillsboro, Huber, Aloha, Portland, Salem and way points. Among the distinguished guests of the evening were Governor A. W. Norblad of Salem, H. R. Findley, Portland, Route 2, lecturer of the Leedy Grange, at Cedar Mills; Harris Hanson, Master of the Beaverton Grange, Former Mayor, M. F. Cady of Hillsboro; President of the United Westside Club, Geo. Lippert, Washington County Commissioner, Livermore-- but the list gets too long for recording, as these were by no means all the distinguished visitors.

It would be a grave omission were we to neglect to mention Mrs. A. W. Norblad, the wife of the Governor, and the charming daughter who sat at the head of one of the tables. Color bearers from the Daughters of Veterans met the Governor when he alighted from his car, Mayor Erickson gave the greeting for the city very cordially and C. A. De Grace spoke for the citizens of our town.

Dr. J. R. Talbert presided at the meeting at which the Governor spoke on the good points of Oregon. He gave some historical data which were interesting, instructive and not generally known. He is a forceful speaker and his remarks were delivered in a convincing and emphatic manner.

Following the Governor, Geo. Lippert spoke from the topic, "Selling Oregon to Oregonians." Inasmuch as Governor Norblad had almost taken his ideas from the same topic, George did remarkably well. He is completely "sold" on the merits of our grand commonwealth.

Dr. C. E. Mason delivered a rather witty, and at the same time entertaining talk on "Selling Beaverton to Beavertonians." He told something of the development of the last ten years in this Community, speaking of the progress made in roads, schools, buildings, and other institutions which give an index to the progress of a people.

The Chamber is fortunate in having secured the services of the Daughters of Veterans to put on the banquet. Everyone seemed well pleased with the service, the quality and quantity of the viands offered and with the very efficient manner in which the whole affair was handled.

N. P. Johnson Out For County Commissioner

Attends Public School And Graduates From Portland Bus. College

HE IS A NATIVE SON

Has Lived All His Life In This Part Of Washington County

N. P. Johnson Republican candidate for the nomination for County Commissioner was born in Washington County about two miles north of Beaverton in 1885, near where he now resides.

He graduated from the Barnes public school and then attended the Portland Business College from which he graduated in 1905.

After leaving college he learned the carpenter trade and put in about a year with the U. S. Engineers in the construction of the Columbia river jetty. In 1910 he took a trip to Australia and visited several of the South Sea Islands including New Zealand.

In 1915 he began contracting. Washington county is well dotted with buildings of all kinds contracted by him.

In 1913 he was married to Ethel May Ruhndorf of Portland, Oregon and in 1917 bought the farm owned by W. J. Butner former County Commissioner, and on which place he now resides.

ODDFELLOW GETS A FIFTY-YEAR JEWEL

Quite a considerable number of members of the Beaverton Oddfellow and Rebekah lodges went to Hillsboro to meet with the Hillsboro Lodges last Friday evening when the lodge there presented one of its members, R. H. Greer with a fifty-year Jewel in token of his membership in the organization for more than half a century.

The presentation speech was made by L. R. Carter of Salem, Past Grand Master of Oregon and a member of the Sovereign Grand Lodge. Greer became a member of the I. O. O. F. lodge in Minnesota and in 1917 moved to Hillsboro and transferred his membership to Montezuma Lodge in 1882.

Following the presentation of the fifty-year jewel, Mr. and Mrs. Greer were presented by their lodges with a fountain pen, as a token of their being the only surviving Charter Members of Hillsboro Rebekah Lodge No. 54, now living there and holding membership in the Hillsboro lodges.

Two members of the Hillsboro Oddfellow Lodge who were initiated into the Hillsboro lodge in 1881 are still members, one of whom, Mr. Merrill, was present and spoke feelingly of the time when they were taken into the order.

All milk producers interested in a movement to better the market condition are urged to attend.

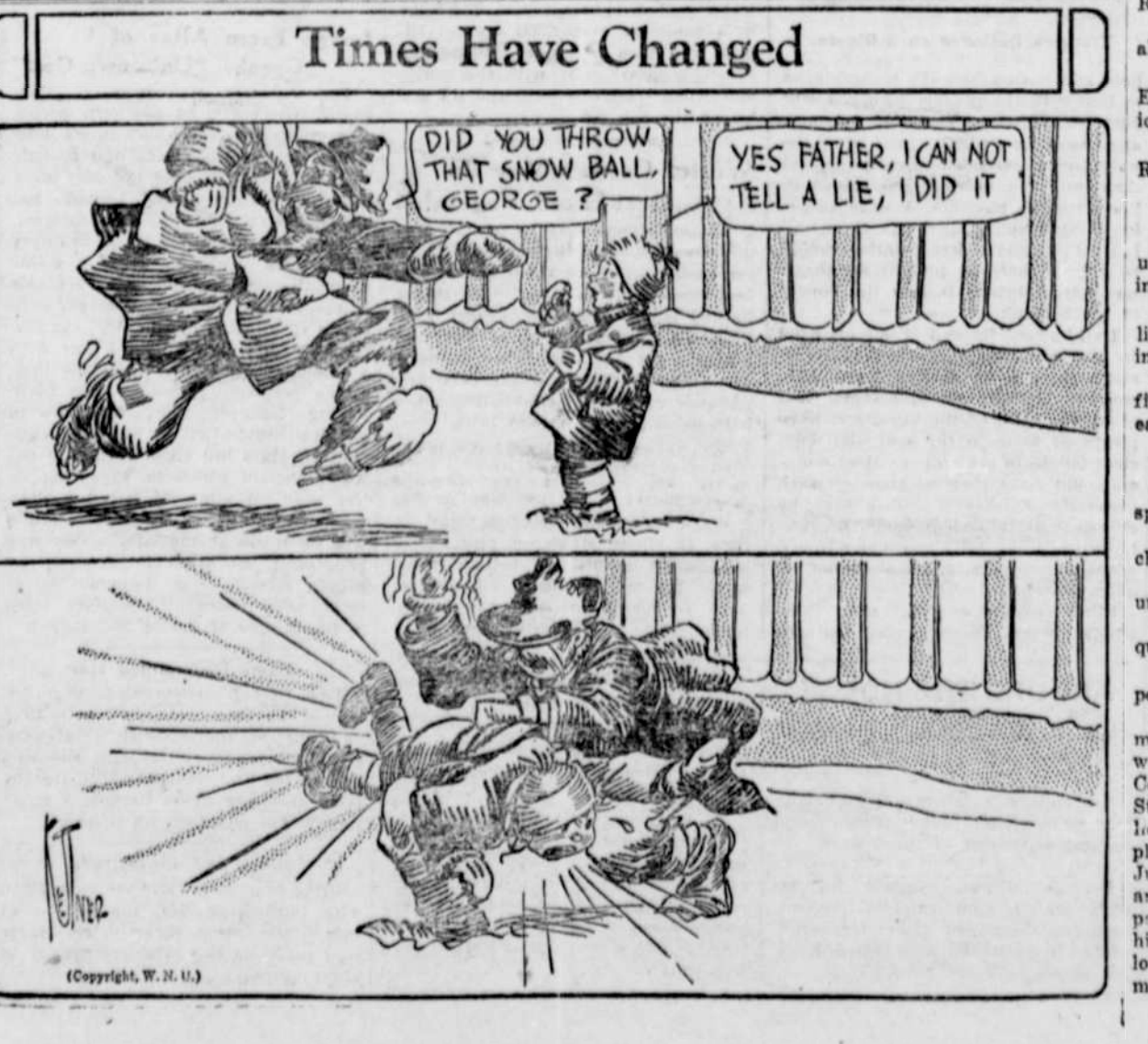
TANNLERS ARRIVE FROM JUNCTION CITY
