HOME POINTERS

KIDDER'S DELIGHT

3 cups milk
3 eggs
4 tablepoons sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla
¼ teaspoon salt
Few grains nutmeg
Few grains cinnamon
Beat the eggs until very light. Add the sugar, salt, vanilla and spices, then the milk. Stir till the sugar is dissolved, then beat well. Serve cold.

TOASTED RAISIN SANDWICH

½ cup chopped cheese
½ cup raisins
6 drops tabasco sauce
Bread
Pump raisins, drain and chop, using a coarse cutter. Blend raisins with cheese and spread on thin buttered slices of bread. Put slices together as a sandwich and toast on both sides. Serve hot.

MARSHMALLOW SALAD

4 oranges
2 bananas
1 cup marshmallows
½ cup cream
Yolks of 2 eggs
2 tablepoons sugar
2 tablepoons lemon juice
Sprinkling salt
1 cup fresh grated coconut
Cut oranges into sections, slice bananas and cut marshmallows into quarters. Mix with dressing made by scalding cream and thickening it carefully with egg yolks, beaten until light with sugar. Cool dressing and add lemon juice and a light sprinkling of salt before adding fruit. Serve with coconut.

WINTER SALAD COMBINATIONS

Don't neglect the salad merely because some of the fruits and vegetables usually used are not obtainable. The family needs the balancing properties, minerals, salts and vitamins of the daily salad, and there are still plenty of salad foods available.

Oranges may be blended with other fruits and served on lettuce; they may be served with prunes and cottage cheese, with honey and coconut, with cranberries and with onions. The orange-onion combination may strike you as surprising, but try it some day and see how delicious it really is. Cut two orange slices, one-half inch thick. Arrange sandwich fashion with a thin slice of Bermuda onion in the center.

Garnish with sliced, stuffed olives. Place on lettuce.

BEET RELISH

1 cup cooked beets
2 tablepoons horseradish
2 tablepoons powdered sugar
1 teaspoon salt
4 tablepoons lemon juice
Chop the beets, which should be cold, and add other ingredients. Serve with cold sliced meat.

APPLE MARMALADE

6 oranges
3 lemons
9 apples
9 cups sugar
3 cups water
Pare and slice apples and cover with lemon juice. Wash oranges and cut into thin slices. Slice lemon rind. Add sugar and water and let stand 1 hour. Cook slowly to boiling point; boil 1 hour or until of the consistency of marmalade. Turn into sterilized glasses or jars and seal when cool.

MARMALADE GRIDDLE CAKES

(About 18 cakes)
2 cups flour
1 tablepoon baking powder
1 tablepoon salt
3 tablepoons sugar
1 egg
1½ cups milk
8 tablepoons melted butter
Orange marmalade
Extra sugar
Mix and sift dry ingredients. Add beaten egg and milk. Beat thoroughly and add butter. Drop by large spoonfuls on a hot greased griddle. When puffed, full of bubbles and cooked around the edges turn and cook on the other side. Spread cakes with orange marmalade. Roll up like jelly rolls. Sprinkle with sugar and serve at once.

ORANGE OMELET

(Serves 4-6 persons)
6 eggs
2 tablepoons powdered sugar
¼ tablepoon salt
¼ tablepoon cornstarch
2 tablepoons lemon juice
½ cup orange juice
Shred oranges for garnishing
Extra powdered sugar
Separate egg yolks from whites. Mix together the sugar, salt, cornstarch, lemon and orange juice. Beat the egg yolks light and add this mixture to them. Beat the egg whites stiff and dry. Fold in the first mixture and turn into a well-oiled omelet pan. When done garnish with the sliced oranges sprinkled with the powdered sugar and serve.

How to Raise Poultry

"Can't these provide naught for our board, but this eternal turkey Goodman?" quoth dame Prudence.

"Methinks this gloomy forest is full big enough to have in it all birds and beasts created since the Deluge!"

Goodman Pennyfeather snatched up his blunderbuss and retort a bit acidly, "Beasts and birds there are aplenty in yon forest and hostile Indians, too—while turkeys in plenty are at our very door. Nae theless, I shall try again to appease thy impatience."

That might have happened a long time ago. Even right after the Civil War wild turkeys were so numerous in some parts of the country as to constitute an actual pest. They raided grain fields with such devastating effect that it was a problem to cope with them. Now quite the reverse is true.

Of course, no one is surprised to learn that the wild turkey practically extinct. One would think, however, that the periodic demand for wild turkey would cause a considerable part of their time to turkey raising. I believe the reason that such is not the case is to be found in the oft repeated story that turkeys can only successfully be raised on great ranches and that, at best, they are so delicate and temperamental as to make them very hard to handle.

For those who have hesitated to take up turkey raising, or who have tried and failed, I want to make a number of recommendations. I shall give a short digest of these recommendations and will be glad to answer further questions from any one writing me in care of this paper.

For breeding purposes use only thoroughbreds. Select the strongest and healthiest birds. Do not mate more than 10 or 15 hens with one male. Use incubators for best results. You never have to wait for an incubator to get broody and it will give most uniform results if properly regulated. Use no eggs over ten days old. Practically all the big commercial turkey raisers use artificial brooders. The most up-to-date ones can be closely regulated so that, barring accident, results are fairly certain. It is always a gamble, however, to brood young poult with such temperamental creatures as turkey hens.

A brooder house on skids is ideal as it can be moved about to fresh ground from time to time. Stake off four temporary runs, one on each side of the house and rotate the poult from one run to the other. Leave them about a week in each run. Between 200 and 300 poult can be accommodated in a 12x14 brooder house. For heat, use a hard coal stove or any other heating arrangement that will maintain an even temperature of about 80 degrees.

When poult are about 8 weeks old they may be transferred to set aside for each 150 to 200 poult. These grounds should be where chickens have not been allowed to run and should be fenced so chickens cannot get in with the poult.

Feed nothing the first 24 to 36 hours; 36 to 48 hours, scratch grass on the sod, tender greens and butter milk or sour skim-milk; 48 to 60 hours, feed eggs hulled for 30 minutes mixed with equal quantity of dry stale (never mouldy) bread crumbs. Feed this every two hours, removing it in 20 minutes. On the third day feed as on the second and continue same diet on the day following with addition of mash composed of finely ground cornmeal, wheat bran, wheat millings, and beef scraps in equal parts by weight or a baby chick starter commercial mash may be fed instead. Feed the mash in hopper with plenty of greens at all times. From day to day feed a little scratch grain, gradually increasing the quantity. Scratch grain should be given sparingly, however, as young turkey do not require a great deal of such feed. See that a good supply of fresh clean water is always near by. Never allow poult to drink from stagnant pools.

When poult are about 8 weeks old, shift to rearing grounds if weather permits, and put on following ration: Equal parts of corn meal, ground oats, wheat middlings, wheat bran and beef scraps fed in hopper. Give bird plenty of skim-milk to drink. Keep shell and grit before them at all times. Never stint on fresh green stuff of suitable kinds. My experiments prove that baby turkeys can be successfully raised on feeds that are successfully fed to baby chicks. If your present method of raising your baby chicks is successful, use the same method with your baby turkeys which should be successful also.

Finally, enlarge your runs from time to time and keep moving flock if possible to provide fresh feeding grounds.

HAS YOUR HEATING PLANT A TEMPER?

Vacuum-Cleaning of Entire System Will Remedy Many Troubles.

Many heating plants enter their season of winter work lazy and sluggish after their summer vacation and their part time duties in the fall. Often they reveal an ungracious temper, wasting the precious fuel that is fed to them and replying to the home owner's demand for greater heat with clouds of smoke and soot.

Symptoms like these usually can be diagnosed as due to soot-poisoning or congestion of the heater's breathing apparatus, according to the Holland Institute of Thermology of Holland, Mich. This is especially likely to be the case when the patient has an offset in his chimney-flue where soot lodges.

Some old-fashioned remedies may be applied to give the sufferer emergency relief. Small parcels of kitchen refuse may be administered, for their burning produces a chemical reaction that removes the soot-infecter. A cupful of dry salt poured onto the center of the fuel-bed is another good antidote for soot-poisoning. Or scrap zinc, which may be bought from any hardware store, may be sprinkled over the fuel-bed when the fire is burning briskly.

Of course, the heater should be given plenty of air through the drafts while these treatments are administered. Otherwise, the remedy might not work and the patient might choke with smoke and spread unpleasant odors through the house.

But, while giving the patient this emergency relief, the attending physician should resolve to apply a drastic treatment looking to complete cure. The way to do this is to have the sufferer's whole system cleaned out by the suction cleaner method. The instrument that administers this treatment most effectively is a giant vacuum machine that comes to the house on a truck, equipped with a 40 horse-power motor. It has large pipes which are connected with the heating plant's various openings and, when this is done and the suction force is applied, all the winter's accumulations of dust, dirt and soot are removed from all parts of the system.
