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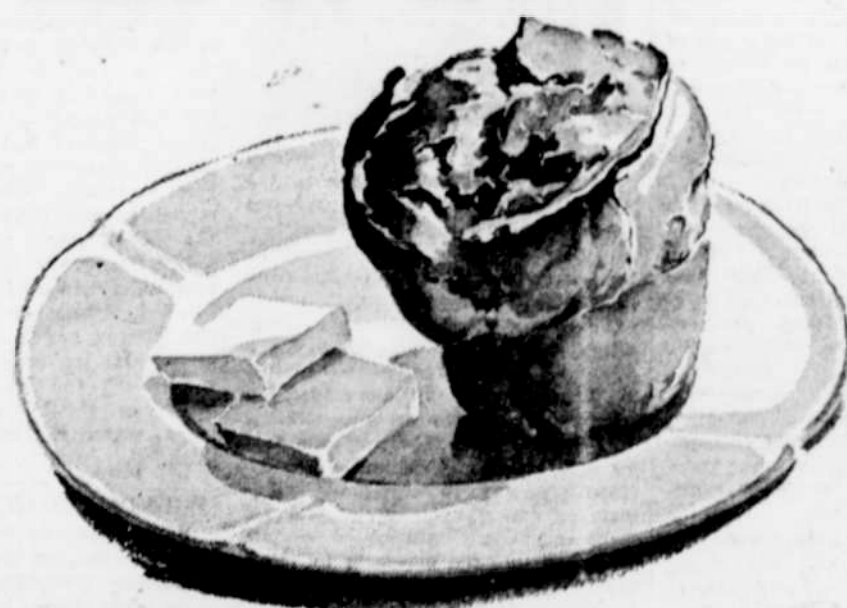
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THE TIME to eat a popover is when it has just popped over. When it has reached its climax, and is puffed and crisp. Listen to it crackle when you break it apart for butter.
