LIFE SKETCH OF SENATOR HALL

Republican Candidate Well Qualified for Position of Governor.

A quarter of a century ago, a young man, lured to Oregon by the call of the west, was swinging a shovel in a Portland sewer. As each day ended he would climb steep stairs to the fifth floor of the Tremont hotel—there was no elevator—to his \$1 a week room.

Today, with a fiction-like record of success behind him, the man—Charles Hall—stands before the public as a candidate for the republican nomination for governor. In 1922 he barely missed the nomination, losing by 500 votes.

He taught school three terms in Pennsylvania after completing his elementary education in a little red school house near his father's farm. When he stepped from the Portland sewer ditch, he taught a term at Clatskanie. This teaching experience gave him an intimate knowledge of educational problems in which he, as a state senator and leader in public life has been actively concerned.

Hall, after leaving school work, was employed by an uncle in a drug store at Clatskanie. He saved systematically during his early years, and then engaged in timber cruising. He was successful and made enough to attend the University of Michigan 1903-05. In 1906 he returned to Oregon, where he acquired a drug store at Hood River. There he was active in the work of the Chamber of Commerce. For a time he was the organization's president. This gave him a vision of the possibilities of united effort. He was one of the leaders in organization of the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce for more comprehensive efforts in behalf of the state, and was the first state president.

Going to Coos county, he took over a struggling rural telephone system which was undercapitalized and facing the problem of serving a rapidly growing but widely scattered area. He built and strengthened it until it was known for its efficiency. Its friendly relationship with its customers, and its low rates.

A determined organizer and builder, he founded the Bank of Southwestern Oregon and later the American Bank of Marshfield.

He was among the first leaders to see the commercial value of the Columbia river highway, and interested many influential men to join the drive to put the project across. As chairman of the senate highway committee, he fostered much of the legislation for better highways. If nominated and elected, he says, one of his first moves will be to start his "Industrialize Oregon" program by calling a meeting of representative citizens from each county in the state.

JOHNNY MUSKRAT TELLS HOW TO PREPARE RAW FURS



"In my years of experience helping trappers get full value for their furs," says Johnny Muskrat, broadcaster on Furs and Trapping for Sears Roebuck Agricultural Foundation, "I have found that a great deal of waste is caused by trappers not knowing how to prepare furs correctly. Here are a few simple directions. Follow them. The results will surprise you."

There are two methods of skinning fur bearers, coon and mink. Skunk, Opossum, Mink, Muskrat, Weasel, Ringtail Cat, Otter, Civet, and Rabbit should be skinned by the Wolf, Fox, Lynx, Coyote, Cat, Marten, Fisher, and Wolverine should be skinned by the side out. Coon, Beaver, Bear, Mountain Lion, and Badger should be skinned on top.

To remove a pelt skinned out it loose around the hind feet and rip down the back of the hind legs. Peel the pelt from the hind legs carefully, skin the tail and take out the tail bone. Draw the skin downward from the body. Use a good sharp knife and scrape the pelt as clean of heavy fat and meat as possible but don't scrape too close because if you do the fur roots are apt to be injured. A good method of skinning is to attach the hind feet of the carcass to a tree limb with strong cord or wire. This permits you to pull off the pelt very easily. After the head has been reached cut the

skin from around nose and eyes. The skin is then in the form of a long pocket with flesh side out.

To take a skin off open, rip the skin down the center of the belly from mouth to tail. Also rip down the inside of the front legs and the back of the hind legs.

Pelts should be placed on stretchers immediately after skinning. Cased pelts should be stretched to their natural size and shape and open pelts should be stretched on a wall or board by tacking them flesh side out in a position which will stretch them uniformly.

After placing skins on stretchers hang them in a cool airy place to dry. Never dry a skin by the fire or in the sun. It is wrong to use salt alum, or any preparation for curing skins. Simply stretch and dry them as they are taken from the animals. Furs need only be dry enough to hold their shape in order to ship them but to be perfectly safe never ship furs having heavy grease or fat on them which might cause spoilage in transit on account of warm weather. The best way to pack furs is to lay them flat one on top of the other, and wrap in cloth or burlap sewing up the bundle tightly so as to leave no holes in the wrapper. It is never wise to wrap furs in paper because over heating and spoilage may result.
