LOWER ELECTRIC RATES ON MAY FIRST

Complying with a recent order of the Public Service Commission of Oregon, new and lower rates for residential lighting, commercial lighting, industrial lighting, commercial power, and industrial power will become effective upon the readings of all meters read May first and thereafter.

THESE new rate schedules will apply in Hillsboro, Beaverton, Orenco, Elmonica, Cornelius, Dilley, Gaston, Fanks, and in all of the territory in Washington County served by this Company.

AS A TOTAL OF TEN new lighting and power schedules is covered by the Commission's order, it is impractical to print them all in detail in this space.

THE NEW residential lighting schedule is as follows:

First 35 KWH per month at 8 cents
All in excess of 35 KWH at 2.5 cents

Discount: None

Minimum charge: \$1.00 per month for lighting and appliance service; \$2.00 per month for lighting and electric range service.

Complete tariffs, setting forth all of the new, lower schedules, are being prepared and may be seen at our Hillsboro and Portland offices about May 1st.

All of Portland's commercial power and industrial power and industrial lighting schedules will be extended to the "Tualatin Valley Division." The new commercial lighting schedule will also have a top rate of 8c per kilowatt hour instead of 10c.
