FARM REMINDERS

During 1929 Oregon county agents were instrumental in the organization of 11 drainage districts, designed to give improved drainage to 4690 acres of land, reports show.

Actual tests have shown that a tree set as a pollinizer will be effective more than 60 to 80 feet from the tree which is to be pollinized. Under very favorable weather conditions, trees may sometimes be cross pollinized farther than this, but ordinarily it is best to play safe and set a pollinizer close to the tree to be pollinized.

Pork is the most popular meat in the American diet, and its per capita consumption last year amounted to nearly 73 pounds.

Powdery mildew of roses is a difficult disease to handle. The best way is to start as soon as new growth begins in the spring and apply the finest dusting sulphur obtainable at weekly intervals. The early morning while the air is still is the best time to make the applications.

The early spring is the best time to poison gray digger squirrels. The squirrels have not been out of hibernation long, consequently are hungry and will take poison more readily than at any other season. The poisoned grain may be obtained from any county agent, at cost.

HOME POINTERS

Green peppers are less likely to turn brown if oiled before baking.

If the tough ends of asparagus are stripped of the heavy outside skin they will be quite tender when cooked.

A few strips of bacon placed on top of a chicken while roasting will give it a delicious flavor.

The secret of success in cooking eggs, and dishes in which eggs predominate, is to cook slowly at a moderate, even temperature.

A pinch of soda in the water is not recommended to keep green vegetables green, as it is injurious to the vitamins. If the vegetables are cooked quickly, they will keep their fresh green color without the use of soda.

The main object in using a refrigerator is to save food, not ice. Frying fish in deep fat much the same as croquettes gives them a beautiful even color and a crisp crust which most persons enjoy.

When the amount of fat and sugar in a cake is increased, it is necessary also to increase the number of eggs to prevent the cake from falling.

WAFFLES
2 cups flour
4 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
1 2-3 cups milk
3 eggs
6 tablespoons butter
Beat yolks well; add milk and sifted dry ingredients quickly. Add melted butter. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites last. This recipe makes six great waffles.

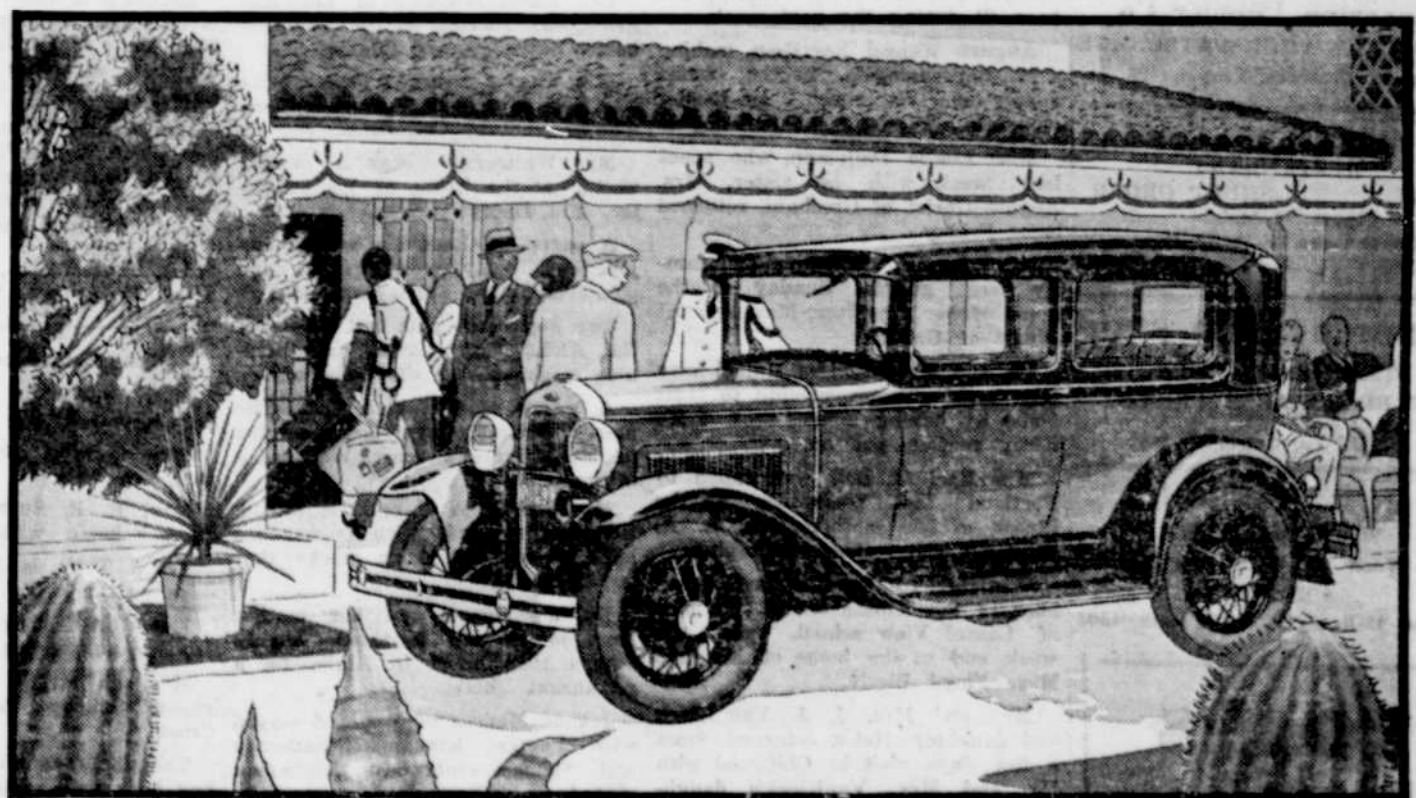
