HOME POINTERS
BREAKFAST COCKTAIL
1 egg yolk
2 oranges, juice of
1/2 lemon, juice of
1 teaspoon honey or sugar to taste
Mix thoroughly. Chill if desired.

ORANGE SYRUP SAUCE
1 cup orange juice
1 teaspoon grated orange rind
1 cup sugar
Juice 1 lemon
Grated rind 1/2 lemon
Put ingredients into saucepan and boil fifteen minutes. Strain, strain, and pour into sterilized glasses. Use as a sauce on vanilla ice cream or on baked rice pudding. This sauce when sealed in sterilized glasses will keep well, and will be found convenient to have on hand for emergency in the summer.

Strawberry Whip
1 pkg. strawberry gelatin
1 cup boiling water
1 cup strawberry juice
1 cup strawberries, crushed and drained.
1-3 cup sugar
Dissolve gelatin in boiling water. Add strawberry juice. Chill. When slightly thickened, beat with rotary egg beater until of consistency of whipped cream. Fold in strawberries and sugar. Turn into mold. Chill until firm. Unmold. Serves eight.

Rubbing with fine sandpaper is an excellent method of removing burned crust from cakes.

To prevent the jelly roll from cracking when rolling it, turn the roll out of the baking tin upon a cloth wrung out of cold water. Then spread the jelly, and as it is rolled, the steam from the wet cloth will prevent the shrinking and consequent cracking of the top crust.
