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LELAND SHAW TO GET A DEGREE IN LAW

Six of the 667 students at the University of Oregon who form the largest graduating class in the history of any institution in the state, are from Washington county. One of these candidates for degrees is from Beaverton, two are from Hillsboro, one from Forest Grove, one from Gaston, and one from Sherwood.

Leland Shaw is graduating with a doctor of jurisprudence degree. He is a member of Phi Sigma Kappa, national social fraternity, and Phi Delta Phi, national law honorary.

Alice Reagan, Hillsboro, will have a bachelor of science degree.

Margaret Long, also from Hillsboro, is graduating from the school of journalism with a bachelor of science degree. She is a member of Delta Delta Delta, national social sorority, and a member of Gamma Alpha Chi, national advertising group.

From Forest Grove is Wilma Moreland who is graduating with a bachelor of science degree.

MANY CHANGES IN LOCATION OF FIRMS

SCHOOL MEETING IS VERY SHORT ONE

One of the peculiar features of the school meeting this year was the short duration of the session, only about twenty-five minutes after the call to order until the motion to adjourn came at the suggestion of the chairman. A casual visit to any other school in this county, even to the schools in the larger places, they will find that Beaverton's schools are better kept, that the work done here is as good if not better than that done in other places—so it would only seem the logical thing to do to retain the present school administration so long as they can be induced to stay.

DAIRYMEN SIGN UP AT ASSN. MEETING

Director Louis Managle of the Dairymen's Co-operative Ass'n. in his talk before an enthusiastic meeting at North Plains, Friday night, stated that the organization now has more than 750 signers and that its success is assured. Mr. Managle was a director in the Greater American Dairy Ass'n. that disavowed to affiliate with the Dairy Co-operative Ass'n. He operates an 1,000 acre farm on Sauvie Island and milks 80 cows.

The meeting resulted in a good number of signers. Dairymen throughout the county are working with their neighbors with the result much expense and time is being saved the organizations.

Two more meetings are scheduled for next week.

Dairymen are urged to attend these meetings as a means of speeding up the organization work.

Local Boy Killed At Camp Near Knappa

In 1923 Lee Carr Came To Oregon To Live With His Mother Here

HE IS HIT BY RAIL

He Dies Before He Reaches Hospital, After Regaining Consciousness

Lee Wilbur Carr met his death Friday, June 13, at about 6 o'clock in the evening. He was working for the Gypo Co., stationed at Camp 18 near Knappa, who are building a railroad for the Big Creek Lumber Co. A load of gravel had been deposited on the road which was to be leveled off with a big iron rail. He and the engineer placed the rail on the car and started back to work after working hours. Apparently the rail was put on crossways of the car and one end extended too far out. No one saw the accident, but it is thought the end of the rail hit a tree or stump, swinging back and pinning Lee to the car. He was unconscious when the engineer got to him but he regained consciousness, and told them he was hurt very bad. He was carried on the speeder for about 30 miles and then placed in a car to be taken to Astoria to the hospital, but he was so severely hurt he died before reaching the hospital.

Carr was born at Sawpit, Colorado, March 30, 1902. He lived there during his childhood and for a few years lived in Virginia. In 1923 his brother, Guy, visited in Virginia, and Lee returned to Oregon with him, where he has made his home ever since with his mother, Mrs. Otto Erickson.

Lee had a very kind and lovable disposition and had made many friends since coming here.

The funeral was held Tuesday afternoon from the Congregational church, Rev. Dungan preaching the sermon. W. E. Pegg was in charge of arrangements. Lee was laid to rest in Riverview cemetery.
