FARM REMINDERS

Leafiness in alfalfa is an important indication of quality, as from 50 to 60 per cent of the plant weight and 70 to 75 per cent of the protein, one of the most necessary feed constituents, is contained in the leaves, say crop specialists at Oregon State college. Feeders of alfalfa everywhere recognize the value of good, leafy alfalfa.

Anything that can be done to improve the quality of the hay crop is fully as important as increasing quantity, say agronomists at the Oregon Experiment station. The ultimate result is more profit to the producer.

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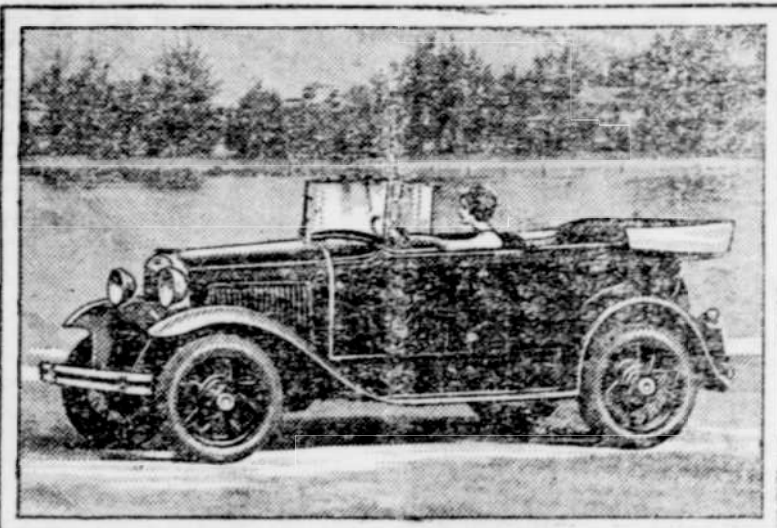

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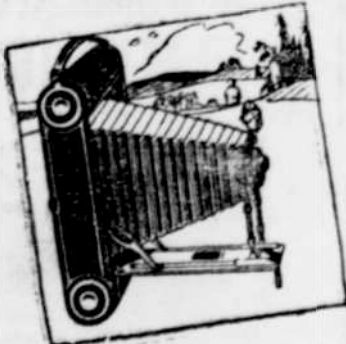
New Ford Car Wins Favor

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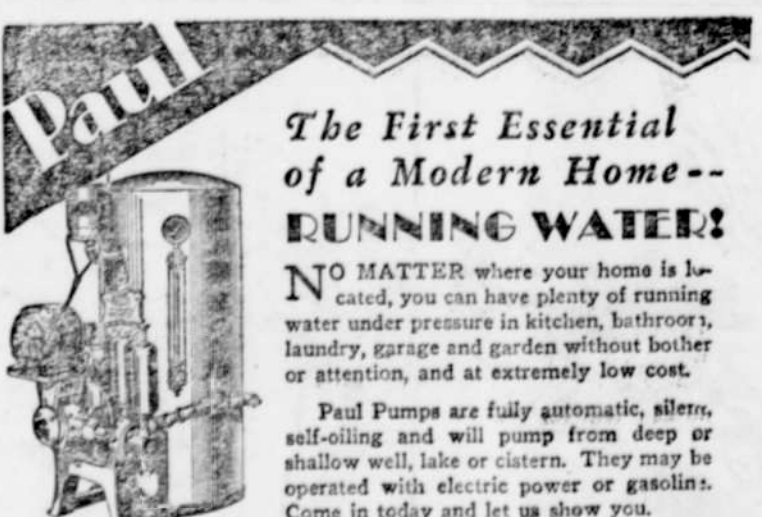
