THE HISTORY OF PHARMACY

Drug comes from the Romance languages, but the origin is obscure. It may have originated in the Dutch "droog", which signifies dry. Today it means that which goes to make up medicine.

Formerly remedies were prescribed and sold by an apothecary. That word first meant a place where medicines were kept, but it soon lost its original meaning and later the word became applied to what is now known as a medical practitioner. In London "Apothecaries' Society" grants licenses to practice medicine.

In early times the different branches of the medical profession were not distinguished from each other. In 1606 the King incorporated the apothecaries and grocers into one company. In 1617 the law was passed prohibiting grocers from selling drugs. From that time onward the standing of the pharmacist, or druggist, as he is now called, has advanced. It has now become one of its principal aims to provide a wide and accurate knowledge of remedial substances in relation to their application to the treatment of disease, while another aim is to discover new and improved remedies.

The introduction in to practical use of many remedies has followed the study of their action on animals. Our next issue will deal with the nature of what is known as a drug.

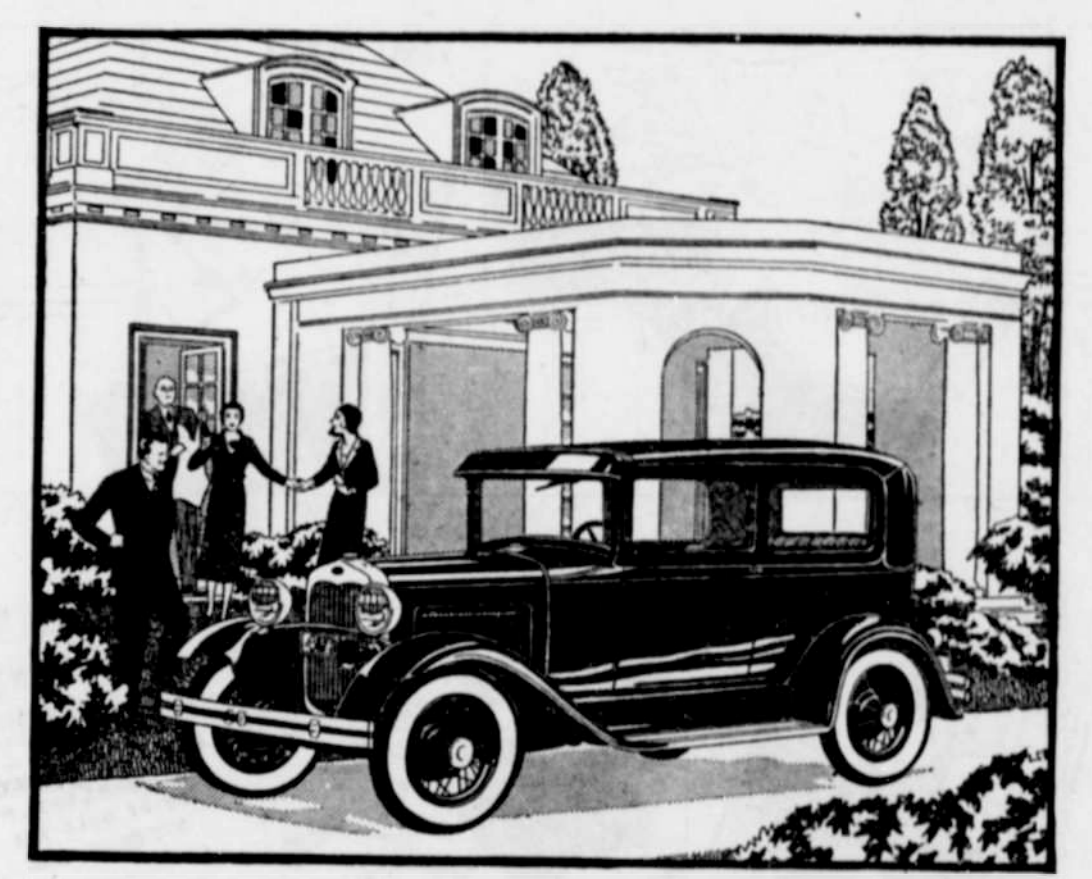
