C M T C TO BE FINISHED SATURDAY

Drawing rapidly to a close with July 19 as the final day, the Citizens' Military Training Camp here has for some of its achievements the noticeable improvement in the physical bearing of its 700 Oregon and southwestern Washington boys, the increase in weight of practically all students, and the marked improvement in discipline and obedience to commands. Among the other changes too, are the spirit of comradeship, and consciousness of American citizenship and a wholesome spirit of rivalry in athletics—and a good, healthy coat of tan.

Sleeping in tents, rolling out for Reveille at 5:45 and turning in at 10 o'clock have worked wonders for these boys, on whom the United States government has expended an average of \$80 each, in its scheme of training for citizenship and national defense. Young men of 17 to 24 are eligible, and upon completion of the course of four camps, may qualify for reserve commissions in the Army.

Beaverton is represented at C. M. T. Camp this year by William J. Leonard, and Walter A. Lissy.

OREGON POULTRY MEN TO HAVE MEET

A two-day program of practical discussion of modern poultry problems and methods has been prepared for the eighth annual Oregon Poultrymen's convention at Oregon State college, July 23 and 24. In addition to these features an unusual number of exhibits and demonstrations have been arranged for the hundreds of men and women who attend these meetings.

The new demonstration poultry plant consisting of six buildings is now complete and will be inspected by visitors. Another new house provides a laboratory for studying poultry diseases with many birds.



JEWISH LAWYER TO SPEAK AT CHURCH

The services next Tuesday and Wednesday, July 22, and 23, at the Methodist Church at Beaverton will offer an unusual attraction. Dr. A. Michelson, a former Judge and criminal lawyer from Germany, will be the speaker.

Dr. Michelson has an interesting story to tell, and wherever he has spoken large crowds have gathered. He has spoken in many churches of different denominations and almost everywhere the churches are crowded and many times scores have been turned away.

Dr. Michelson is the son of an orthodox Jew and was brought up in the house of a Jewish rabbi. He studied in the University of Berlin and other European universities, and graduated with the highest degree. He not only studied law, but also medicine, languages, history, psychology, philosophy, theology, etc. Later he made his highest examination before the Secretary of State in Berlin, and the judges of the supreme court and the professors of the different universities.

He was decorated with the robe and cap and the Imperial insignia. He then was a judge in the Court of Germany and afterwards practiced as a criminal lawyer.

Through the study of philosophy, he became a free thinker and repudiated all religion, Judaism included. He was convinced that philosophy was the greatest thing in the world and he expressed the thought before the International Diplomatic Club, that the world could only succeed by philosophy.

After his conversion to Christianity he gave up his position as imperial officer and his large practices and was called as a professor of foreign languages and literature to America, where he has spoken in universities, colleges and theological seminaries.

From an atheist he has become one of the most devoted followers of Christ. It is an exceptional opportunity that comes to Beaverton and vicinity to hear this converted Jew with a ringing testimony.

The meeting begins promptly at 8 o'clock. Everybody is cordially invited and the pastor of the church, Rev. J. J. Patton, promises the people a hearty welcome.

Beaverton Women May Enter Contest

Six Hundred Dollars Will Be Given For One Quart of Food

TO BE HELD IN IOWA

Food Entries May Be Entered In Either of Three Divisions

Six hundred dollars for a quart jar of canned food! Can one jar of food be worth that?

This is a question that has been agitating Beaverton homemakers since word got around that six hundred dollars in cash would be paid for the best jar of fruit, vegetables, or meat entered in the second National Canning Contest which is being held at Shenandoah, Iowa under the auspices of the Household Science Institute.

The contest seeks to further the work of the U. S. Department of Agriculture and the home demonstration agents throughout the country by focusing the attention of American housewives on the economy and healthfulness of home canned foods.

Four hundred and seventy prizes, totaling \$4,250 in cash, loving cups, and ribbons, will be distributed to the winners in the contest which comprises three major divisions: fruits, vegetables, and meats. The best entry in each division will be awarded \$100. One of these will also receive the five-hundred dollar sweepstakes prize. Second prize in each division will be \$50, the third prize, \$25, and the fourth prize, \$10. The winners will also receive a loving cup and ribbon.

There will also be 30 prizes of five dollars each, seventy-five prizes of \$2.50 each, and 300 prizes of one dollar each. In addition, five hundred dollars in cash will be awarded to the home demonstration agent whose county sends in the largest number of entries, \$250 to the agent whose county sends in the next largest number, and \$100 to the agent of the county sending in the third largest number.

The contest is open to every woman and girl in the United States. There are no restrictions as to the nature of the food sent. Contestants may enter one, two or all three divisions. Entries should be sent in as soon as possible after canning. These will be placed and kept on exhibition at Shenandoah until after the closing of the contest, which will be on October 1.

Fruit and vegetable entries in the contest will be judged for clearness, color, pack, neatness, flavor, and texture. The meat entries will be judged on neatness, texture, and flavor. Judges, each one a recognized food authority, will be: Dr. Louise Stanley, director, bureau of home economics, U. S. Department of Agriculture; Dr. Margaret Jurtin, president, American Home Economics Association; George Farroll, director of extension for the north central states for the Department of Agriculture; Mrs. Josephine Arquist Balke, director of home economics for Iowa State Agricultural College; and Miss Elaine Massey, leader of girls club work for Mississippi.

That the judging may be thoroughly impartial and the display of jars absolutely uniform, contestants are required to submit their entries in standard glass jars of the quart size. A sample full mason jar and carton together with prize entry labels for use in sending entries may be had without cost by writing the National Canning Contest, Shenandoah, Iowa.
