CANADA SENDS ENTRIES TO ORE. FAIR

From Canada to Texas and from the Mississippi river to the Pacific coast, entries for all departments are flooding into the registrar's bureau of the 69th Oregon state fair to be held at Salem September 22 to 28, advance lists revealed this week.

Illinois, Wisconsin, Texas, California, Montana, Washington, Oregon, and several Canadian provinces are to be unusually well represented, present records show, with late applicants from other states certain to swell still further the long list of competitors for the \$80,000 in premiums and purses, and the \$17,500 up for the horse races.

Second Class Office Looms In The Offing

The Saving of Rural Route No. 1 Will Save Much Money For Office

WILL MAKE TWO JOBS

Postoffice Department Is Greatest Penny Business In World

Action of Beaverton citizens and the Beaverton Chamber of Commerce in saving for Beaverton Postoffice the Rural Route 1 which Aloha community was attempting to have transferred will very probably result in having the postoffice advanced to the second class a year hence.

According to the official figures compiled, the 1929 business was in excess of \$7900, or not much shy of the \$8000 business required by the Department to be transacted annually before advancing a postoffice from third to second class. A careful check has been kept on 1930 business, and the announced receipts of first two quarters exceeds \$4000, or well in excess of 1929 figures, as the December quarter is always the heavy part of the year in the postoffice.

The advancing of the postoffice to the second class will make available two full time jobs at decent salaries. An assistant postmaster will be selected by competitive examination, as well as a classified clerk; and they will enjoy all the benefits of the classified civil service in their positions not attainable by non-classified employees. Other benefits will be increased allowances for light, heat and janitor service not now available under the present status.

The postoffice department as a business is the greatest penny business in the world. That is, the aggregate is made up of countless penny spending; and if loyal Beaverton citizens will only remember to patronize this office the results will be surprising. Beaverton would have reached the second class 3 years ago except for the loss of one rural route to Tigard, and if our present territory can be held with the giving of the service to which it is entitled, and in addition given the loyal support of the townspeople in the matter of stamp purchases the attaining and maintaining of second class status should not be difficult.

Beaverton Plane And Passenger Join Flight

Some Forty Airplanes Are Now Making A Tour of Northwest

E. STIPE IS PASSENGER

It Takes 27 Minutes to Go From Kelso Airport to Beaverton

Most everybody knows of the flight of some forty airplanes now making a tour of the Pacific Northwest with the idea of getting the communities better acquainted. Most everybody knows all the various cities where this fleet has stopped and is scheduled to stop—the big metropolitan dailies have taken care of the publicity, that is so far as the state of Oregon and the big cities are concerned.

There has however been one or two items which they have omitted to mention, or if they did mention it they have done it in such a manner as to cause little comment even among our own people. The things to which we refer is that a Beaverton made plane is among the number which is making this historic trip, and that a citizen of Beaverton has been a passenger for at least a part of the trip.

Beaverton's own air ship, "The Roamer," christened at the airport when Gov. A. Norblad made his last visit here, was one of the entries in the travelling air circus this week, and as such gained favorable publicity for it self and for Beaverton. Piloted by Mr. Yates, and with Ray J. Davis and Dr. Watts as passengers, the ship went to Eastern Oregon with the circus; and then coming back added Elmer Yates, proprietor of Stipe's Garage, to the passenger list for its run Wednesday. This was to various Washington cities and return, the group reaching Beaverton field Thursday evening, 27 minutes from Kelso field.

At the Kiwanis meeting this week Leonard Adams told of being up in the Roamer and of his impressions gained flying with Beaverton airman. Evidently Beaverton is gradually becoming air-minded. More power to the airport, may it become a vital factor in Beaverton's business life.

HOSE SAMPLES SHOWN

Application For A New Fire Hydrant Is Received and Granted

The City government held their regular monthly meeting at the Town Hall this month, their first meeting there since moving of this hall to its new location at the corner of First and Main Streets.

All the members of the Government were present with the exception of Attorney Allen and the health officers, for whom there was no business enough to justify their appearance. The first matter coming up after the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting and the auditing of the bills was the matter of making an attempt to collect interest on money on deposit at the bank. This matter was temporarily left up to the different members to investigate what could be done.

Mr. Van Eiper wished to purchase the old hose owned by the city but the Council thought that it was too valuable to let go and decided to have it repaired for use in case of fire.

E. Davis representing the Eureka Fire Hose Co. exhibited samples of fire hose and told of the merits of his particular kind. The Mayor inquired whether the Town was contemplating the purchase of hose and was told by Alderman Lewis and Wilson that it was not in a financial condition to make the purchase at present.

The Recorder was then instructed to write the West Coast Telephone Co. about having a phone installed in the Town Hall. He was also instructed to send out final notices to all delinquent water users with the notice that the water would be cut off in case settlement was not made immediately.

There was some discussion about the Oil companies selling oil to the different stations being subject to the pedler tax. This matter was however laid on the table with instructions to the Recorder to get the data on the matter. The Recorder was also to write the State Highway Commission about remuneration for moving the Town Hall.

An application for a new hydrant to be located at the corner of Eighth and Algon streets near the Drew Nursery was considered and Marshall Bixby given authority to have one installed.
