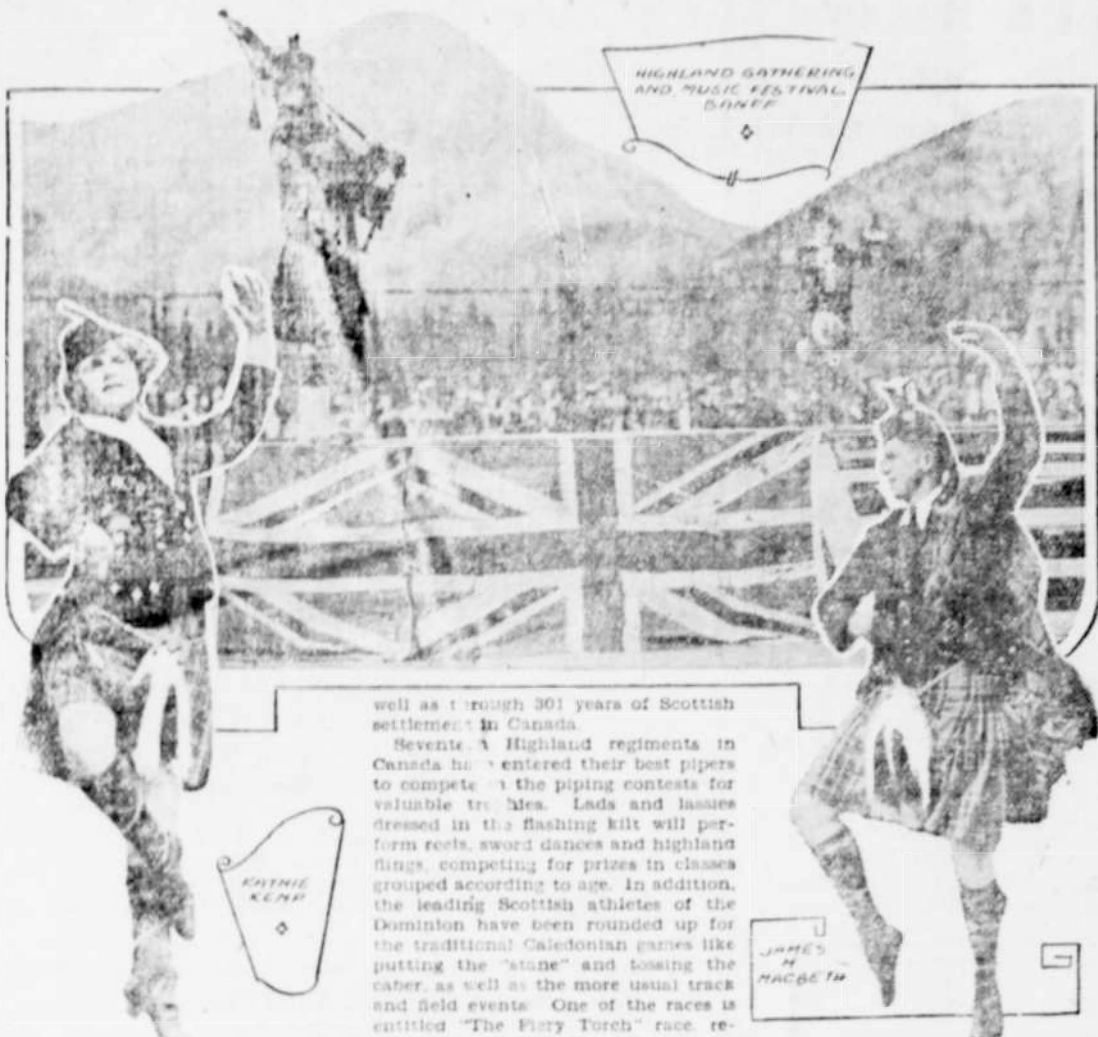

well as through 301 years of Scottish settlement in Canada.

Seventy-five Highland regiments in Canada have entered their best pipers to compete in the piping contests for valuable trophies. Lads and lassies dressed in the flashing kilts will perform reels, sword dances and highland flings, competing for prizes in classes grouped according to age. UNDERGROUND PNEUMATIC TUBES PROPOSED TO SHOOT MONEY BETWEEN BANKS

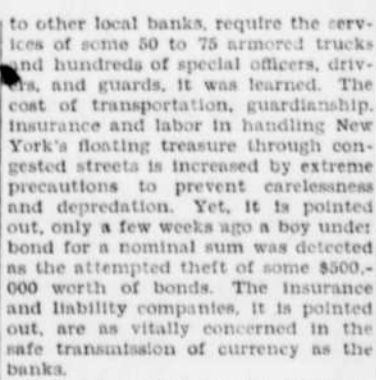
NEW YORK.—The doom of the armored car, runners, special police, and messenger boys in carrying currency from bank to bank in New York City is foreseen in the use of underground pneumatic tubes.

Leading bankers are looking toward the tube as a solution to the problem of cutting costs and speeding up deliveries of money.

An immense volume of currency is daily moved from the financial district in Wall Street and its vicinity to the uptown branch banks through the congested streets of New York. In an area one-half mile wide and three-fourths of a mile long in lower Manhattan are some of the greatest financial institutions in the world. Some of our National Banks in this district compare favorably with the Bank of England in money activity and the service they render to the security market.

In this restricted area are 90 banks and 45 trust companies, also insurance companies, the stock exchange, the clearing house, and Federal Reserve Bank. Every financial institution here has its branch financial activities North of Canal Street. Each of the branches may call for money from the parent institution and each, in turn, will have occasion to send currency to the main bank, producing constant flow into and out of the great reservoir of credit, which it is now proposed shall seek its channels in underground transmission, eliminating the delays and hazards of surface transmission.

More than forty tons of currency transported daily from the Federal Reserve Bank alone, in New York



to other local banks, require the services of some 50 to 75 armored trucks and hundreds of special officers, drivers, and guards. It was learned. The cost of transportation, guardianship, insurance and labor in handling New York's floating treasure through congested streets is increased by extreme precautions to prevent carelessness and depredation. Yet, it is pointed out, only a few weeks ago a boy under bond for a nominal sum was detected as the attempted thief of some \$500,000 worth of bonds. The insurance and liability companies, it is pointed out, are as vitally concerned in the safe transmission of currency as the banks.

"Absolute safety in the transmission of currency, gold bullion and valuables of every sort would be assured by the pneumatic tube, removing its transport from possible failure in human handling and with the absolute security with which New York's registered mail is dispatched through the tubes," a compressed air expert said. "And the danger would be too great to attempt to cut the tube. This can only be done with safety when the power is shut off, a fact

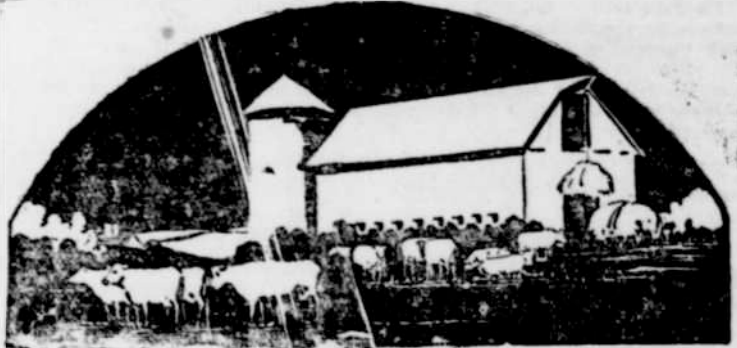
