HOME POINTERS

The macaroons called for in the preceding recipe are a delight in themselves! Use the fresh-keeping coconut for this recipe, and only ten minutes of your time.

Macaroons Francaise
2 egg whites
¼ teaspoon salt
¼ tsp. of vanilla
¾ cup granulated sugar
¼ lb. pkg. or can of coconut (1 1-3 cups)

Beat the egg whites stiff but not dry. Add the salt. Beat in the sugar one-fourth cup at a time. Add the vanilla and fold in the coconut. Drop rounded teaspoonfuls of the mixture one inch apart on a baking sheet or inverted pan which has been well greased with unsalted fat or cooking oil. Bake in a slow oven (275 degrees F) for 25 minutes. For Chocolate Macaroons, melt one square chocolate and add to recipe. 30 macaroons.
