

Tallest of All to Rise on Famous Site

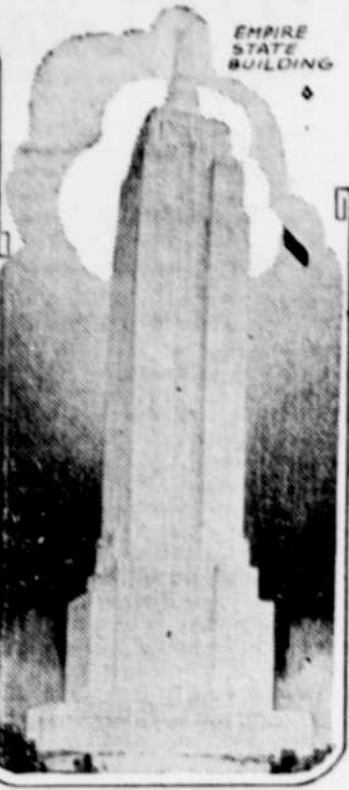


The tallest building in the world is now under construction in New York on the site of the famous old Waldorf-Astoria hotel.

Competition for the highest and biggest "cloudscraper" has been at fever heat for some time. And now, topping them all, the Empire State building will pierce the horizon 85 stories above street level.

More than 200,000 cubic feet of stone, or approximately 450 carloads, is required for this gigantic project. According to the Indiana Limestone company, which was awarded the contract, shipments of the stone will start immediately as the caisson work for the building is being rushed to completion.

The extreme height of this building, its prominent location, and the



fact that Alfred E. Smith, presidential candidate and former New York governor, is president of the building corporation, have added unusual interest to the erection of this building.

A unique feature is a roof mooring mast for dirigibles. Shreve, Lamb and Harmon are the architects.

Construction of the Empire State building heads a large building program in New York, centering around the Pennsylvania station. Many of these structures will be built of limestone to harmonize with the colossal Al Smith skyscraper.

Gifts to Universities and to Other Institutions Held to be Real Investment.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Oregon.—People of means throughout the United States are coming more and more to a realization that the wisest investment of their surplus funds is in education. It is pointed out by Dr. Arnold Bennett Hall, President of the University of Oregon. Figures just received here show that during the past year Harvard University received gifts and legacies amounting to \$13,516,000.00, and Yale University received amounts totaling about \$9,000,000.00. Another outstanding gift was made by Clarence H. Mackey, who gave \$500,000.00 to the University of Nevada to establish the Mackey Science School in memory of his father.

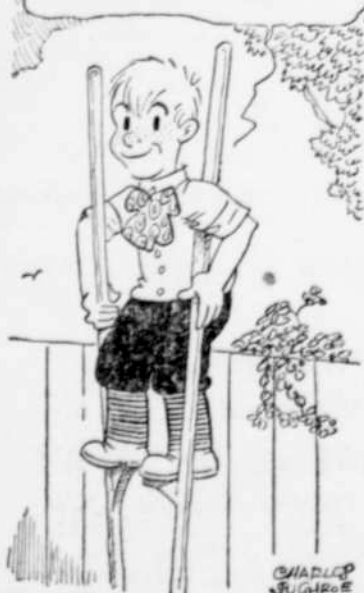
"The people who generously gave these huge sums to Harvard, Yale and Nevada realized that there is no better way in which they can be of service to the world than by aiding and advancing education. They feel that they are making sound investments for the future. They are not moved by a plea of charity, but feel that the money will be wisely spent and that the entire nation will reap the benefit," says Dr. Hall.

"Much of the money advanced to universities during the past year will go into research, and directly into the various fields of science. Out of this may emerge new methods which will save millions of dollars for various industries; new cures for diseases which will end untold suffering; new phases of education which will hasten the progress and add to the prosperity of the country.

"State universities are only now coming into the realization that they can be of utmost service to their communities, a service even greater than that rendered by private institutions. A state university should have for its purpose not only the education of youth, but should serve state industry and should aid in development of state resources as well. The university services also extend to lending the abilities of its experts to municipal and civic organizations in solving their many problems. A state university can only expand in this direction as its income is increased, and gifts made for this purpose will certainly prove a sound investment in every way."

were honored.

Below we give a little summary of what the Beaverton Bond Register shows:

Improvement district number 2, including portions of the property of Lombard, Front and East Sts., bonds Nos. 4, 5, and 6, dated November 1, 1921, and due and payable Nov. 1, 1931, were called for payment on November 1, 1925. Since then the interest coupons have been paid right along until May, 1930. Bonds, \$500, interest 6% makes \$495.00 paid on the above issue since the bonds were called.

In Improvement district No. 3, which includes portions of Second St. and Erickson Ave., there were bonds numbered 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 19, and 20, which were called for November 1, 1925, and on these the coupons have been paid up to the May, 1930 payment. That issue was dated and is due at the same time as the District No. 2. The interest on each bond figures up to \$165. Interest in the fourteen bonds at \$165 each, makes \$2,310.00 interest that has been paid on this issue since the bonds were called and the interest should have stopped.

The bond register shows that three bonds have been called for Improvement District No. 5 which includes Angel and Main Streets and a part of another street in the Clement Subdivision. Bond No. 1, called Nov. 1, 1924, Bond No. 4, called November 1, 1927 and Bond No. 5 called November 1, 1928, a total of \$415.00 paid on this issue after they were called.

One bond was called in District No. 6, Franklin and Hall Sts. for bonds dated September 1, 1924 and due September 1, 1934. The interest on this bond amounts to \$75.00 making a grand total of \$3,195.00 that has been paid on called bonds.
