The Cook's Nook

THE USE OF APPLES IN COOKING

The recipes which follow suggest only a few of the many different ways of using apples in combination with other foods. The fact that they are a relatively cheap fruit, and that their keeping qualities are so good that they may be used almost the whole year, as well as their pleasing flavor, makes them a desirable ingredient in a wide variety of dishes.

When combining them with other foods, two points should be kept in mind—the texture and the flavor. The fairly firm texture of the raw apple is best combined with celery, nuts, pineapple, and other foods of a similar solidity, while cooked apple blends well with softer materials, such as rice, tapioca, other cooked fruits and doughs of various kinds. Although the flavor varies in different species, it is, in general, mild and usually tart, and is best with foods which do not have a strong flavor of their own which would conflict with or cover that of the apple. Keeping these points in consideration, the housekeeper can frequently substitute apples in recipes calling for other fruits.

Apples may be used in muffins, croquettes, and other hot dishes, to form a part of the main course. In some dishes, as a hot apple and bacon sandwich, they may themselves form the main constituent.

Apple Muffins

Two cups flour, 5 teaspoons baking powder, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 tablespoon sugar, 1 cup milk, 1 egg, 4 tablespoons melted fat, and cooked and sweetened apple sauce.

Sift the dry ingredients. Add the milk and the beaten egg and mix well. To this add the melted fat. Drop spoonfuls of the mixture separately in greased muffin tins. Add 1 tablespoon of apple sauce to each muffin, and then cover the sauce with the muffin mixture. Bake from 25 to 30 minutes in a moderately hot oven. This recipe makes one dozen muffins.

Apple Sauce Cake

One-third cup shortening, ¼ cup honey, 1 cup apple sauce, ¼ teaspoon cloves, ¼ teaspoon nutmeg, ½ teaspoon cinnamon, ½ teaspoon salt, 2 cups flour, 1 cup seeded raisins, ¼ cup walnuts, 1 teaspoon soda, dissolved in 1 tablespoon hot water. Cream shortening and honey well.

add apple sauce, then flour, spices, and salt sifted together. Add the raisins before the flour is mixed in, thereby flavoring them. Add walnuts, and then the soda dissolved in hot water. Beat well. Bake about an hour in a moderately hot oven.

This cake can be made several days previous to the time of use, as the flavor improves with age. It is a good cake for children.

Apple Rings and B-c-on

Select firm, tart apples. Wash and core, but do not peel, the apples. Cut them in rings or slices about ¼ inch thick. Place them in a frying pan (do not crowd the rings) with a small amount of bacon fat, and sprinkle them with brown sugar. Add just enough boiling water to cover the rings. Cover the pan and cook the apples until tender, brown them on both sides. Lift them on to a hot platter and serve them with a border of crisp bacon.

Apple Croquettes

One cup boiled rice, ½ cup thick apple sauce (quite tart), salt, 1 teaspoon lemon juice, grating of lemon peel, 1 teaspoon butter.

Mix ingredients well. When cool shape into croquettes. Roll the croquettes in crumbs and then in beaten egg to which has been added 4 tablespoons of milk, and again roll them in crumbs. Fry in deep fat and drain on soft paper. Serve with cheese sauce.

Cheese Sauce

One cup milk, 1 tablespoon flour, 1 tablespoon butter, salt and paprika to taste, 3 tablespoons grated cheese.

Heat the milk. Mix the flour and butter and add to the hot milk, stirring until smooth. Add salt, paprika, and cheese. Just before serving, beat the sauce with a Dover egg beater.

Apple-Ham Casserole

Select a slice of ham 1 inch thick, rub well with brown sugar or honey, and place in a baking dish. Stick 2 cloves in the ham, and add 1 tablespoon of onion juice. Peel, core, and quarter tart apples. Cover the ham with the apples. Sprinkle with 4 tablespoons of brown sugar, and add 1 tablespoon of butter, cut in bits. Add 1 cup of boiling water, and bake in a covered dish until the meat is tender.

SAVES LIVES OF MANY MOTHERS

Remarkable figures have just been made public showing that the lives of 10,000 women could be saved each year if expectant mothers sought medical attention early enough and received adequate maternity care. Among a total of 4,726 women receiving such care a two-thirds reduction in the prevailing death rate was recorded, according to leading life insurance statisticians who compiled the figures from the records of mothers cared for by the Maternity Center Association, 574 Madison Avenue, New York City.

Methods used to achieve this saving of mothers' lives were described by Mrs. John Sloane, President of the Maternity Center Association. "The care given these mothers," said Mrs. Sloane, "is that prescribed by a medical board of leading authorities, and includes:

"1. Examination by a physician as soon as it is known a baby is expected, and regular visits thereafter.

"2. Regulation of work, rest, exercise and diet to suit the individual mother in accordance with her physician's advice.

"3. Supplementing this with skilled medical care at the time of delivery, and during the weeks that follow providing such nursing and household help as will assure rest in bed for at least ten days and an easy and gradual return to usual activity on the advice of the doctor and after his examination."

The Maternity Center Association, an organization sponsored and supported wholly by public spirited men and women, offers without charge, leaflets containing helpful suggestions for prospective parents. Fathers as well as mothers will be interested in one entitled "A Message to Husbands—and Wives, too."

METHODS AND REASONS FOR EXTERMINATING RATS

Rats cause much loss of feed to farmers in Washington county. Because they are seldom seen the average person does not realize the amount of feed consumed and wasted by rats, says W. S. Averill, assistant county agent.

Control measures include trapping, poisoning, gassing, and the removal of sheltered places for nesting.

The most important control measure is the systematic rat-proofing of all buildings, particularly where grain is stored and where hog and poultry feed is left exposed in self feeders day and night. Where practical, lids may be put on self feeders and closed at night.

Double walled buildings with openings near the floor and buildings set a few inches from the ground are ideal quarters for rats. Walls should be made tight by using strips of tin or blocks of wood to completely close the opening. Small buildings set up on blocks high enough to permit cats and dogs to work under will not be bothered with rats if the walls are made tight.

Another means of control is by using poison mixed with the feed the rats are using or with specially prepared baits.

Barium carbonate is a heavy white mineral salt. It should be mixed with cereals, meats, fruits, or other foods in the ratio of one part of barium carbonate to four parts of the base and mixed with water or milk to make a moist mass. The poisoned bait should be placed behind boards, in runways and out of the way places as it is also poisonous to all other animals.

Red Squill, a bulb plant grown along the coast of the Mediterranean Sea, makes a poison for rats that is not poisonous to other animals as dogs, chickens, hogs, or cats. In this respect Red Squill is an ideal rat poison. It should be mixed in the proportions of one part Red Squill to 8 or 10 parts of a base. Only fresh foods should be used as a base except where chicken mash and other prepared foods of that sort are used. Unlike barium carbonate, Red Squill does not need to be moist, but its use in a moist bait is not objectionable.

It is not a good plan to put out small quantities of poison for rats but rather to thoroughly bait the premises at one time, putting the bait out in the evening and taking it up the next morning. Baits left over from one day to the next are not appetizing except where dry baits are used.

Fumigation using calcium cyanide is another effective means of ridding the farmstead of rats. The cyanide powder is pumped into the burrows and under buildings where it forms hydrocyanic gas. This gas is very poisonous to all rodents and animals and is very effective when properly used against rats and some rodents.

Traps set around holes, in runways, behind boards leaned against the wall and in other places frequented by rats are effective if baited with meat, bread, etc., commonly taken by rats. The trap should be at least partly covered to break the outline and should be fastened to a block to prevent its being carried off.

Cage traps set against a hole in

the wall sometimes prove very effective, but are not satisfactory if set out in the center of a room. Farmers' bulletin 1533 on rat control may be secured from the county agricultural agent's office in the Court House.
