HILLSBORO BANK TO FURNISH CORN SEED

Washington County may again lead in 4-H corn club project. The Commercial National Bank of Hillsboro is repeating its offer of free corn to 4-H club members who will grow the corn and make an exhibit.

The bank is making an effort to secure the best Minnesota No. 13 seed available. Sufficient seed will be distributed through the county agricultural agent's office to all boys who will agree to grow one acre and to make a 25-ear exhibit next fall.

As in the past, the bank will sponsor a corn show, probably in the bank lobby, at which time the exhibits and records will be scored and awards made to the winners. During the fair season of 1930, 4-H corn club members were awarded a total of \$124.50 in prizes and still had their corn to sell or feed.

POSTERS DESIGNED TO HELP THE FARMER

As a part of the nation-wide advertising campaign to stimulate consumption of farm products launched by the Outdoor Advertising Association of America, Inc., posted in Beaverton, will be found one of the first displays designed to stimulate bread consumption and help the wheat situation.

At the suggestion of the Federal Farm Board through the Grain Stabilization Corporation, the tremendous force of the organized advertising through the membership of the Outdoor Advertising Association of America, has been donated in the interest of a nationwide campaign to alleviate primarily the wheat situation, and to advocate greater consumption of farm products generally.

In over 17,000 cities and towns throughout the United States the Outdoor Association will display 26,000 Farmers Prosperity posters representing a space cost alone in excess of \$2,200,000.

The keynote of the campaign will be increased prosperity for the farmer upon whom national prosperity directly depends.

The posters that are now on display carry the slogan "Your child's bread and butter can solve the wheat problem!" "One slice more each meal will do it." "Health for you. Help for the farmer."

This public spirited move on the part of the organized outdoor advertising, of which Foster and Kleiser Company is a member, recalls to mind the work accomplished by the industry at other crucial periods in the history of the country, particularly during the days of the great war when millions of dollars worth of Liberty Bonds were sold through the help of outdoor space donated to the Government.

BOXING CHAMPIONSHIPS TO BE HELD

The 1931 Pacific Coast amateur boxing championships will be held in Portland on Friday and Saturday nights, February 13 and 14, according to James J. Richardson, manager of the Multnomah Amateur Athletic Club, which organization will sponsor the amateur fistie classic of the Far West.

Practically all of the 1930 champions have turned professional which leaves the field wide open to all aspiring mitt wielders. With the Olympic Games scheduled for next year at Los Angeles where the world's championship titles will be decided it is expected that a large number of boxers will start getting ready for the Los Angeles tournament by entering the Pacific Coast championships next month in this city.

DR. MILLER TO DISCUSS WALNUT BLIGHT

Walnut and filbert blight with suggestions as to possible means of control will be discussed by Dr. P. W. Miller, of the United States Department of Agriculture, at two meetings Friday, January 16. The Scholls Grange Hall will be the place of meeting at 1:30 p.m. on that day and the Forest Grove Chamber of Commerce at 7:45 p.m., according to W. F. Cyrus, county agent. C. E. Schuster, of the horticulture department of the State college will discuss problems of walnut and fil-

bert orchard management. Washington County growers realize the seriousness of blight in both the walnut and filbert. Dr. Miller has spent considerable time both here and in other sections investigating blight and has information of importance to growers.

FIFTY GROWERS HAVE POTATOES CERTIFIED

Fifty potato growers in Washington County have had their 1930 crop approved as certified, according to W. F. Cyrus, county agent. Certification means that there have been two field inspections while the potatoes were growing and that a bin inspection was made after the crop was harvested. More than half the growers certifying this year have been in the certified seed business for several years. Several growers in this county have been producing this grade of seed since the certification was begun.

Seed potatoes grown under these requirements, stored carefully and then put up in a good manner and tagged with the certified seal carry

a definite guarantee of quality when sold. Standardization of quality is a movement developing more and more in the marketing of farm products.

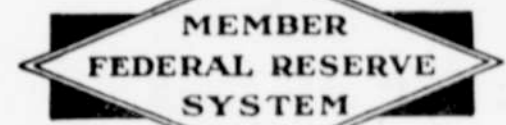

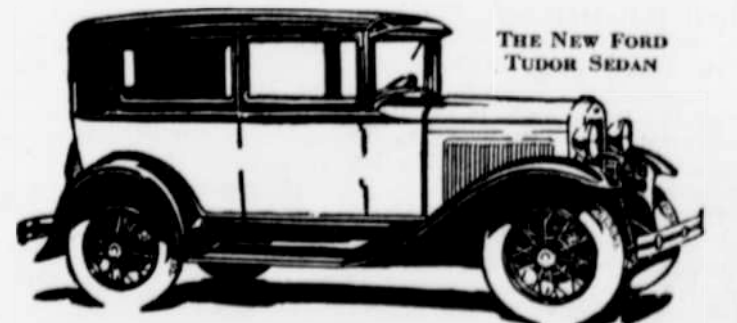
