The Cook's Nook

Be A Modern Mother Hubbard—Keep An Emergency Shelf!

A modern Mother Hubbard Went to the cupboard For a snack for her guests and herself; And when she got there—The cupboard wasn't bare For she kept an emergency shelf!

Old Mother Hubbard wouldn't have had to disappoint her hungry canine or herself either if she had lived in 1931 and maintained an emergency shelf. The modern housewife has rendered such dismal events as out of date for the shapeless garment made for the Mother Goose heroine. On her pantry shelf is arrayed a stock of packaged and canned goods which can be quickly turned into a dainty dessert or entree or eaten without further preparation. In addition, the clever hostess keeps on hand some baked delights to supplement the menu or provide a "snack" for the party at a moment's notice which is almost a custom nowadays.

If your life-mate is in the habit of bringing home friends without your knowledge, or if your circle of friends include "droppers-in," the emergency shelf will come in handy for ingredients to "piece out" the dishes and make them go farther and look prettier.

"Piecing-Out"

To make special servings grow where only a few grew before try these: Add shredded coconut to puddings or mix it with canned or fresh fruits to make a cocktail or dessert that looks festive. Canned grapefruit makes an excellent cocktail or combined with lettuce and dressing a delicate salad. Pour flavored corn syrup and nutmeats over the ice cream to make a professional sundae from the ice cream bought at the corner store. Use it, too, to make a sauce to pour over the stale cake used for the pudding or to glaze the carrots, sweet potatoes or other lowly vegetables. Dates stuffed with cheese may be added to the salad servings to make enough to "go round," and the plain dates make an admirable addition to the homely baked apple. Canned pimientos are a means of eking out the entree, and are a real life-saver in the preparation of salads and sandwiches. The ready-prepared desserts, with a cornstarch base, are quickly turned into company dishes, and come in a multitude of flavors.

Here are two quickly-made desserts suitable for the emergency meal, using staple ingredients which most households have on hand.

Banana Logs
3 large bananas 2-3 cups
3 tps. lemon juice coconut
1 egg white 1 1/2 tbsps. pow-
1/2 cup heavy cream dored sugar
Cut the bananas into four slices crosswise, sprinkle with lemon juice. Stand each section on end in a buttered baking dish. Beat egg white until stiff; then beat in the powdered sugar; fold in one-third cup coconut. Place a tablespoonful of the mixture on top of each banana. Bake in a slow oven for 10 or 15 minutes. Remove to a serving plate. Serve with sweetened whipped cream in which the remaining coconut has been folded.

Twenty-minute Trifle
2 1/2 cups milk 3 T. cornstarch
1/2 cup brown sugar 1/2 cup raisins
1 tsp. salt 1/2 cup pitted dates
Scald two cups of milk and add brown sugar and salt. Mix cornstarch with one-half cup cold milk and add to hot milk, stirring until smooth and thick. Add fruit cover and cook thoroughly in double boiler at least twenty minutes. Pour into molds to cool. Serve with cream.

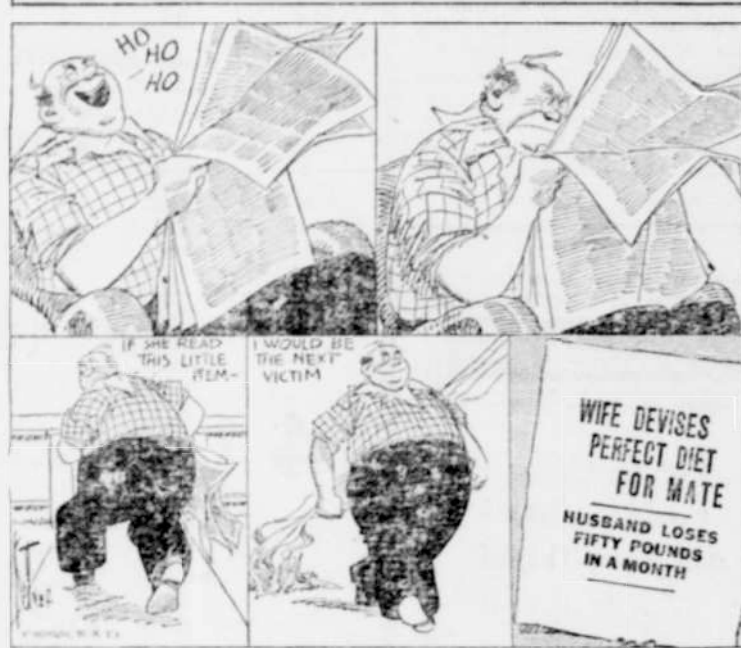
Lace Wafers
(For storage until needed)
1 cup brown sugar 1 tsp. salt
2 cups dark corn 4 cups pastry
syrup flour or 3 cups
1/2 cup shortening bread flour and
1 tsp. ginger 1/4 cup cornstarch

Steps. baking powder 1 cup raisins
Put cooking oil, sugar, syrup, ginger and salt into saucepan together. Stir mixture until it boils; then boil five minutes. Pour into bowl and stir in flour, soda, and baking powder sifted together until just stiff enough to drop from a spoon. Add raisins and drop by spoonfuls on to oiled baking sheet. Bake in moderate oven (375 degrees Fahrenheit), eight to ten minutes. Store in tin box.

Twelve Cents In Soap Becomes Worth \$300



WHEN is a twelve-cent bar of white soap worth \$300, or almost twice its own weight in gold coin? When a sculptor has carved it into a statue and won a prize at the Competition of Small Sculptures in White Soap held annually in New York, according to the National Soap Sculpture Committee.

This is the Procter & Gamble prize granted to the winner in the advanced amateur group. Amateurs are divided into several groups, with first prizes ranging from \$50 to \$200. Second, third and fourth prizes are equally generous and a large number of smaller awards are given honorable mentions.

A bar of white soap, a knife, and an orange stick form the total equipment of the soap sculptor. Yet the completed statue, as the photographs show, has all the finish and flawless whiteness of a work in the finest Italian marble.

Besides the prize sculptures shown in the photograph, thousands of others from all over the world were entered in the Sixth Annual Competition held last June. Many of these were of outstanding merit, and were deemed worthy of being reproduced in marble. "The Beggar," shown above, was, in addition to being awarded first prize in the Advanced Amateur Group, chosen for the Gorham award to be cast in bronze.

The development of the soap sculpture movement has been phenomenal. It has been established as one of the outstanding artistic movements of recent years. Art schools are using soap as a medium, and educational authorities have given it their hearty endorsement.

Sculpture in soap offers not only an opportunity to win a large cash prize, but it has provided thousands of people with a splendid medium for creative expression. It has risen from a mere pastime to the dignity of an art in a few years, developing latent amateur talent in the most unexpected places.

The annual competitions of soap sculpture are sponsored by a committee composed of leading artists, and on the jury of award are such eminent sculptors as Lorado Taft, Gutzon Borglum, and others equally prominent. Outstanding artists throughout the United States give soap sculpture high praise as a means of developing and fostering the appreciation of art in this country.
