BREAKFAST FOODS AT OTHER MEALS

There are certain foods, or at least certain dishes which have proven so popular for breakfast that they have taken unto themselves the name "breakfast foods." In many cases this is actually a misnomer.

Eggs are eaten at breakfast time but they surely appear at other meals, as garnishes, in salads, and in cakes and puddings. Fruit, which always forms part of the breakfast, is now beginning to appear at other meals also.

Of course, children have for a long time eaten cereal morning, noon or night, but the new cookery is presenting cereal under new forms at these later meals. Muffins, fruit bars, cookies, waffles, salads, pies, doughnuts, biscuits, and many other dishes are now prepared from recipes which call for a certain amount of a bran breakfast cereal.

Few changes in our diet rules have been so praise-worthy as this. In these days of refined foods most of us are sadly in need of additional supply of all-bran and other bulky breakfast foods. Laxative drugs should never be necessary in a family where such roughage is popular.

Would you care to try some of these new dishes? Here are a few recipes that may be followed easily. Try them and see how snugly almost any breakfast cereal dish will fit into the later-menu.

Perfect Plop Pie

2 eggs beaten slightly
2/3 cup sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 pint hot milk
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup pep bran flakes

To the eggs add the sugar, salt, hot milk, and vanilla. Stir in the pep bran flakes. Pour mixture into a pie crust. Bake in a quick oven (400 degrees F.) at first to set the crust, decrease the heat afterwards, as egg and milk in a combination need to be cooked at low temperature (325 degrees F.). Cover with meringue.

Roughage Pudding

2 eggs
2 cups all-bran
2 cups sweet milk
3 cup sugar
1 tablespoon butter
1 cup seeded raisins

Soak the all-bran in the milk. Beat eggs and sugar, then add butter, bran, and raisins. Bake in a moderate oven about twenty minutes until firm. Serve with cream or with hard sauce.

American Chop Suey

2 tablespoons fat
2 onions (sliced)
1/2 pound pork (cut in small strips)
1 green pepper (shredded)
1/2 cup mushrooms (sliced)
1 cup celery (shredded)
1/4 cup rice
1 teaspoon salt
3 cups stock

Here's Help for Laundry Day

No longer do we have "madonnas of the wash tubs" for wash day is not the gloomy patience killer it was of yore. Methods are easier, equipment is improved and the laundering materials, most of all, have been so improved as to chase away the "blues" from "Blue Monday."

According to statistics there are nearly three million washing machines in use in the country, and more than 7,000 power-driven laundries doing business. Mrs. 1931 lets the laundry do a large part of her washing, but always she will herself do the nicest napery and the daintiest garments, for she knows it is not the original cost but the care of them that counts. It's the restoring of the original texture and gloss and finish to the linens, the laces and cottons that is important—and this is an easy matter if, after proper washing, the careful use of laundry starch is employed, giving a gloss and finish not only to the linens, but to the less-costly materials, crash, Indian head, mercerized materials.

Of course, proper starching will keep the clothes clean longer, too—by reinforcing and protecting the very structure of the material, it will be able to keep dirt from entering the fabric, and likewise, make stains removable.

Before washing new napery, examine it carefully to know the quality you are trying to retain. Pure linens, the daintier garments, need only a trace of starch; the heavier materials and the mercerized fabrics need more. For those things we want starched more stiffly, a cold water starch is usually employed, one of the finer grained starches being appropriate. For the lighter starching, the hot water starch is best, using a coarser grained product or even bulk starch.

Laundry Directions

ing the amount necessary to restore the original texture. Wring again, pull into shape, being careful not to stretch the corners, and dry. Iron while still slightly damp. If you want to retint the materials, add a small amount of tint to the starch solution.

Removing Stains

For fruit, coffee, punch stains, etc. stretch the spotted portion tightly over a bowl and pour rapidly boiling water through, from a kettle held a foot and a half above it.

For chocolate, follow the same procedure, but first moisten with cold water and borax. For blood stains, use soap and cold water; for ink and iron rust, use oxalic acid diluted with an equal amount of cold water; put on with a medicine dropper, rinse, repeat, rinse again, and wash.

Cream stains, or any grease stains should be removed as soon as possible. If sponging with soap and water is not effective, try washing in baking soda solution or use a cleaning fluid.

Stains in cloth which has been starched will usually come out more quickly than in unstarched materials; and the boiling water method is usually efficacious, for it dissolves the starch and the stain comes with it.

Ironing Hints

Before ironing, sprinkle evenly; use a clean whisk broom if you do not own a sprinkler. Ease in ironing depends largely in smooth rolling. After sprinkling, wrap napery in cloths and let stand several hours. Iron with the warp, not round and round until thoroughly dry. Crease—little as possible, store smaller cloths and runners on cardboard rollers. Learn to iron with both hands.

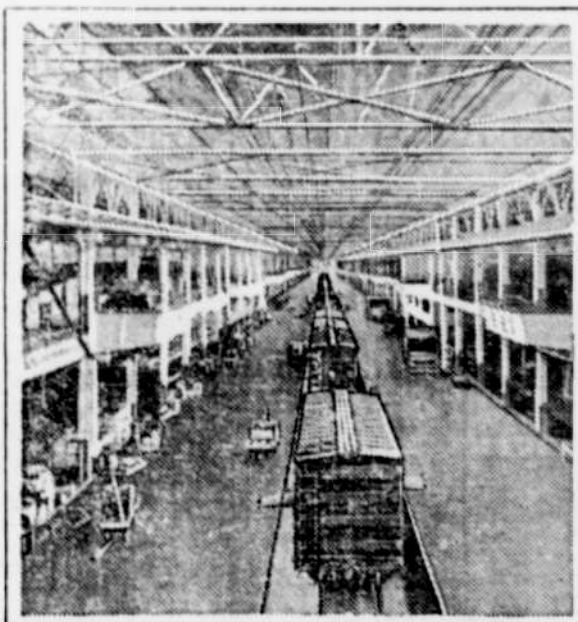

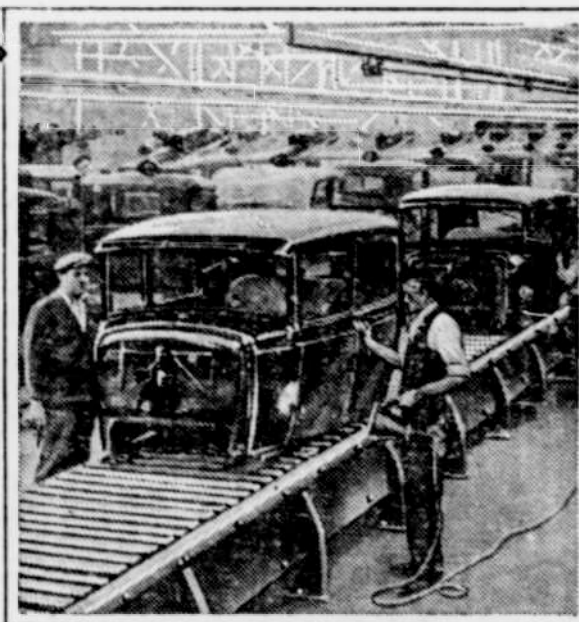
ANNOUNCEMENT

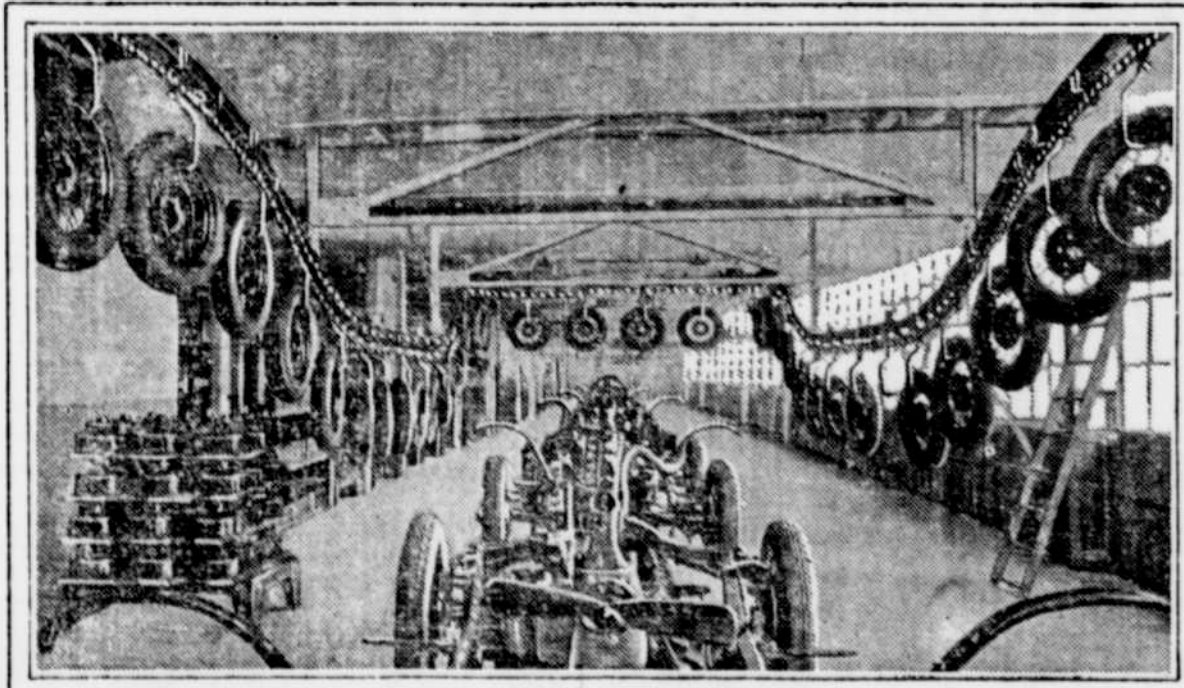
Conveyors Carry Ford Car Parts

The highly important part played by conveyor systems in all Ford Motor Company manufacturing and assembly plants is graphically shown in the above three pictures taken in the recently opened Edgewater, N. J., plant. One of the pictures shows how parts may be unloaded from freight cars within the plant only a few feet from the various assembly lines. Another picture shows automobile bodies starting their trip on a conveyor while

the third view is of the conveyor system used to bring wheels to the chassis which are also moving on a conveyor. As indicated in the picture, a constant flow of wheels on which the tires have already been mounted moves around and over the chassis assembly line. As a chassis enters the section, workers, in groups of four, each take a wheel from the hooks and fasten it to the chassis.
