If your rows of preserves are beginning to show wide empty spaces, there is still plenty of opportunity to fill up the gaps. Carrot Conserve

Cube enough scraped carrots to make two quarts. Cook until very tender and water has almost evaporated. Drain and to liquid add the juice and grated rind of two large lemons. Dissolve four and a half cups sugar in the liquid, add carrots and cook until syrup thickens. Pack in sterilized jars and seal.

U. S. MARINE CORPS RESUMES RECRUITING

The U. S. Marine Corps has resumed recruiting and are accepting a limited number of applicants to enlistment.

The Qualifications for enlistment in the marines are that all applicants must be at least 69 inches tall; 19 years of age or over, but not more than 27; be an American citizen of good character and habits; and qualified to pass the mental and physical examinations.

The United States Marines are now serving in China, Cuba, Haiti, Nicaragua, Panama, Virgin Islands, Guam, and the Hawaiian Islands, also on board the ships of the United States fleet.

All applicants who are enlisted on the west coast are sent to the Marine Corps Training Station at San Diego, California.

The Marine Corps recruiting station is located at Room 430 Worcester Building, Third and Oak Sts., Portland, Oregon.

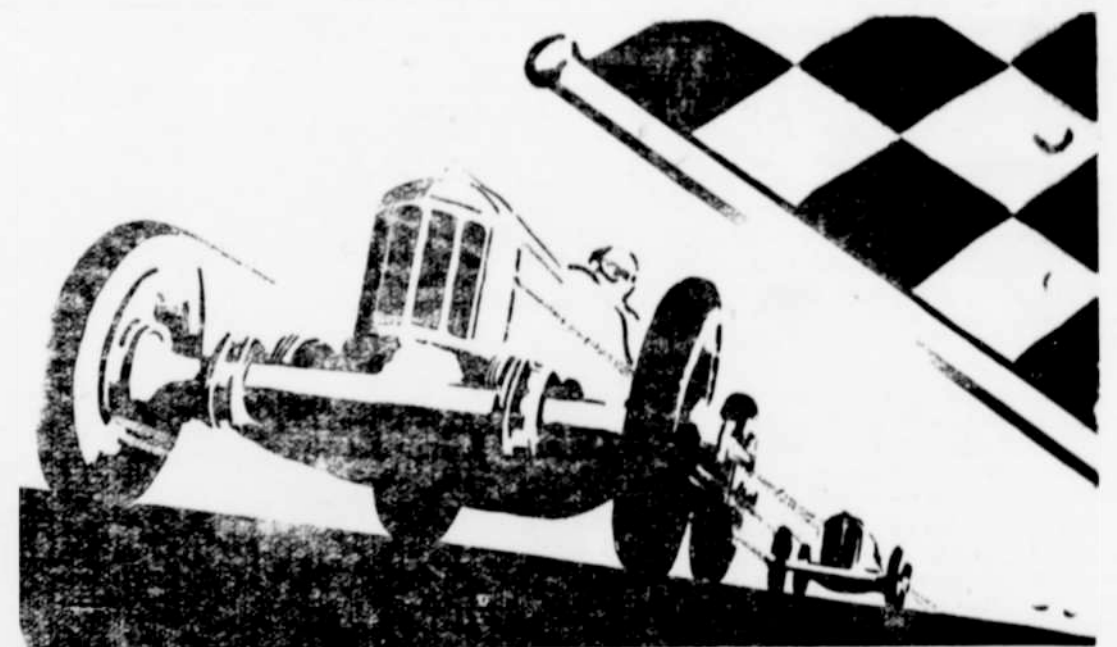
