STORES NOT TO SELL BUTTER SUBSTITUTES

A widespread campaign against butter substitutes, instituted by the Banks unit of the Dairywomen's Co-operative association, has resulted in practically every food dealer in the county signing an agreement not to sell the substitutes. The Banks dairymen called in dairymen from other communities to assist in the offensive. In only a very few cases was any opposition voiced against the movement.

"The splendid spirit of co-operation on the part of the business men was not only a happy surprise to the committee in charge, but an indication that they realize the fact that our dairy industry is of first importance," declared a committee member. "Any industry so vital to the life and prosperity of our county and state as dairying and any food so vital to the health and happiness of the people should under no circumstances be allowed to suffer or be replaced by a foreign produced imitation."

The following pledge, dated January 31, was signed: "We, the undersigned retail merchants of Washington Co., dealing in food stuffs, hereby pledge ourselves to discontinue the sale of any butter substitutes in our store, for a period of three years."

Beaverton's debate season opened here Wednesday with a victory for the home team of debaters when Noma Webb and Elizabeth Huff, upholding the negative side of the question: "Resolved: That chain-stores are a detriment to the American public, met and defeated the affirmative team from Dayton High School. The contest was held in the high school assembly hall, before the student body. This is the first in the series of debates to determine the championship of the five-county district, comprising Washington, Multnomah (outside of Portland), Yamhill, Clackamas, and Tillamook counties. There are fifteen or sixteen high schools entered in these debates. The winner is to be chosen on a percentage basis. Last year, in the same area, Beaverton High School won seven out of eight of its debates.

The affirmative team travelled to Newberg to meet their negative team, Wednesday afternoon, and met defeat. The debaters were Noma Brown and Stanley Cornils.

Some Problems Of The Legislature

Lights and Side-Lights On the Actions Of the Legislators Which Are Of Interest In Washington County

Would Limit Immigrants

By petition thru Senate resolution adopted, congress has been urged at the earliest possible date, pass legislation barring all persons who desire to enter the United States and who are unable to support themselves after arrival here. Two votes were recorded against this resolution.

Refund Gas Tax Approved

Senate bill, providing for a refund of the full tax on gas and distillate used on farms was passed by a unanimous vote at the opening session of the fourth week.

Would Advertise Imitations

Senate bill No. 159, essentially agricultural, requires that persons serving imitation ice cream or using it in preparing drinks or in any preparation shall have printed on the menu the words, "We use imitation ice cream." This notice in bold type at least two inches high shall be displayed in a conspicuous place in the room where imitation ice cream is served.

Ways and Means Committee

The Combined Ways and Means Committee has been toiling to find some means of eliminating the state deficit now more than \$350,000. Unless the budget for the next biennium is pared to the amount of \$900,000 at least this sum will have to be added to the sum now in the "Red."

Senator Woodward, while the performances of the emergency board were under consideration called attention to an allowance of \$245,000 made by it for the flax industry carried on at the "Penn." When asked what provision could be made for emergencies, State Treasurer Kay placed the amount which the legislature should provide for this purpose at \$150,000.

Multiply School Laws

If House bill No. 14 by Representative Gill and Senator Wheeler survives the opposition of the state department of education, the date for the election of school directors and school clerks of districts of the second and third class will be changed from the third Monday in June to the first Monday in March. This plan will be of distinct advantage to farmers who are usually too busy to attend these elections in June but who have leisure time in March.

It is further provided in this bill that teachers for the ensuing year shall not be elected before the annual meeting. Under these conditions teachers will serve under the same board by whom elected.

Booze Walloped In House

Joint Resolution No. 10 precipitated a warm fight in the house. At the public hearing was a capacity crowd of citizens the majority of

them evidently opposed to the referendum.

State Police Proposed

Recommendation made in the Governor's inaugural address, provides for the creation of a "Department of State Police."

The general purpose of this proposed law is to co-ordinate the duties of the various criminal law enforcement departments and officers for better enforcement of the motor vehicle and motor transportation, fish and game, fire, prohibition, narcotic and drug laws. Under this type of service the executive head is called "Superintendent of police," appointed by the Governor for a term of four years. The Superintendent is directed to appoint a State Police Force of numbers sufficient to perform the duties required.

The State Police shall be organized into departments headed by officers.

Requirements for appointment to the State Police force are rigid. Appointees must be citizens of the United States, of good health, good moral character, over 21 years of age and must pass satisfactory physical and mental examinations based upon the standard provided by the United States army.

Department of Agriculture Discussed

Representative Macpherson opened the hearing called to consider the Department of Agriculture. The Portland Chamber of Commerce reported that among 290 persons interviewed no opposition was found.

Oregon is the only state in the union without a Department of Agriculture.

That standards of products would be better enforced under this plan, was also stated.

Seymour Jones, State Market Agent, favored the proposal.

President Kerr, of the O. S. C., stated that its attitude is favorable to the creation of the department.

Mr. Merriam, Commissioner, State Board of Horticulture, endorsed the proposed law.

Oppose Budget Plan

Strenuous opposition to the proposed measure providing that State boards and commissions shall turn funds received from various sources into the General fund of the state was expressed.

Among the departments mentioned are the highway, game and industrial accident commissions, banking department, and higher education board. All of these departments objected at a public hearing on the bill.

At present millions of dollars are taken in in fees by the boards and spent without responsibility to budget or state as to its expenditure. The purpose of the bill is to have three various funds deposited in the State Treasury as are other funds and paid out as provided in the State Budget.

At a meeting of the Washington County Fair Board, February 5, in the Chamber of Commerce rooms, Hillsboro, the following officers were elected: President, R. M. Banks; first vice-president, C. D. Minton; second vice-president, H. T. Hesse; treasurer, O. B. Kraus; secretary-manager, Ed L. Moore. The dates selected for the 1931 Fair are September 10, 11, and 12. Final reports of the 1930 Fair showed a good attendance, a gain over previous years, and the receipts were slightly in excess of 1929. Considerable attention will be given the night programs at the Fair this year.

Faville, dean of the school of business administration. The school of business, in co-operation with the secretaries' organization, sponsors the event annually.

With promotion of wide use of Oregon products as one of its chief aims, the course will cover a wide range of subjects, with round table discussions planned for many of them. Willamette River valley development, Columbia River development, aviation, and how it can be utilized to promote communities, and many other subjects will be brought up.
