The history of bread is being recited this week. Celebration of the one hundredth anniversary of the invention of a power reaper by Cyrus Hall McCormick, is the occasion. All the progress made in all preceding ages shrinks to nothing when placed alongside the record of harvesting inventions that have crowded into the century since McCormick's reaper was perfected in a small Virginia blacksmith shop in 1831. From this first powered device used in American wheat fields, the range of power equipment has covered every labor-saving machine which the genius of man has yet been able to create.

When it is shown that one man now plants and harvests great acreage of cereal lands at cost impossible of attainment under the old order, and that instead of the human bread supply being a serious question of quantity, it has become a mere question of proper distribution, with emphasis upon getting rid of the surplus at any price, the real philosopher removes his hat in reverence to this pioneer inventor. Of all the centennial observances within the past few years that of this remarkable invention, the reaper, is the ranking one in economic affairs. America respects the man who created this machine and untold billions of American wealth have been built upon this piece of farm equipment and the long line of further developments that have followed steadily in its track.

The first Saturday Evening Post advertisement of On-to-Oregon appeared in this week's issue. It is designed primarily to appeal to tourists and vacationists.

The Saturday Evening Post of March 21 will carry a four-page spread with a story of the entire Pacific Northwest and California. It is being sponsored jointly by On-to-Oregon, Inc., Puget Sounders, Californians, Inc., and the All Year Club of Southern California.

Thousands upon thousands of inquiries and requests for information are expected to pour in late in March and in April as a result of these advertisements.

A substantial increase in Oregon's tourist traffic is expected for 1931 as a result of the extensive advertising program for this spring. And every tourist means added dollars to Oregon's wealth and a substantial number of new residents.

H. B. No. 294 was passed in the house with only six votes against it. This is the oleomargarine bill. If it passes the Senate, users of "oleo" will hereafter be required to pay an additional 10¢ per pound. It is claimed that the passage of this measure will materially aid the dairy industry in Oregon.

The free text book bill has now become law. While it was under discussion in the Senate, Senator Schumacher scored the measure as sure to increase the dependence of parents upon the state for the education of their children and that it will increase taxes upon real property, while Senator Fisher attacked the bill on the grounds that it may be found unconstitutional and that it does not furnish free text books to children attending private schools and will cost the taxpayers of Oregon \$1,000,000.00.

Former governor Hon. A. W. Norblad of Astoria was greeting friends in the Senate Wednesday paying his respects to Senators Schumacher and Fisher, sending his best wishes to his many friends in Washington County.

Mr. and Mrs. Canfield prominent residents of Garden Home visited with Senator Fisher Friday. They are deeply interested in the Tualatin Tunnel Project.

Mr. Erick Enquist, former resident of Cooper Mt. Washington County appeared before the legislature Thursday on fishing legislation and called on Senator Fisher.

The defeat of H. B. No. 259 brings joy to all the boys in Lincoln, Tillamook, Washington, and Yamhill who sell, in automobiles, Watkin's remedies and Raleigh products to the farmers.

HOME POINTERS

UNRAVELING FROSTING MYSTERY REVEALS NO "SECRETS"
Fah! It's no secret at all—this "secret" of making successful frostings and fillings for your cakes. Somebody or other started the rumor, which has been fostered by jealous cooks, that it takes secrets and luck to turn out those resplendent frostings, those creamy fillings. Not at all! All it requires is a good recipe, some reliable ingredients, a little care. Which is all most cooking requires!

There are a world of helps to simplify the making of frosting and filling. If your time is limited, and your cake is plain, you may make a simple uncooked frosting with a recipe that requires no creaming. A fanciful and decorative cake may be quickly turned out for the party or birthday with the use of the shredded cocoanut, grains in frosting shades. A smooth "boiled" frosting with not a grain in a panful, and not a trace of that sugary taste is easy to make if you use corn syrup in it; the same ingredients comes in several flavors so you may vary the recipe without changing the method at all. A cooking thermometer makes the testing of the frosting an easy matter, but there are reliable tests for those who do not use this equipment.

The making of smooth and creamy custard fillings is made easy by using cornstarch; the golden dates we use for our most wholesome fillings may be bought already pitted; the fruit peels that go into our fruit cake fillings are packaged ready-sliced and candied; flavorings come in a multitude of assortments. Truly the frosting cook has her task made easy!

The tested recipes mentioned as a necessary part of the equipment are given here, the familiar ones because they have been improved, the new ones because they are new—and because they taste so good!

Best Boiled Frosting
2 cups sugar
2 tbsps. light corn syrup
½ cup water
2 egg whites
1 tsp. flavoring
Boil sugar, water, and syrup until it spins a thread (240 degrees F.). Pour over stiffly beaten egg white, flavor, set bowl in water, and beat until thick enough to spread.

Cocoanut Frosting
Use above recipe for boiled frostings, sprinkle shredded cocoanut or cocoanut frostettes in pink, green, orange, toasted or rainbow, generously over surface of frosting.

Orange Date Filling
1 tbsp. butter
1 ½ cups sugar
2 ½ tbsps. cornstarch
½ cup chopped dates
1 egg yolk
½ cup water
½ cup orange juice
¼ tsp. grated orange rind
Melt the butter in the top part of a double boiler. Stir in the sugar and cornstarch, then add the water, orange juice, and grated rind. Stir over hot water until thick. Add slightly beaten egg yolk and the chopped dates and cook for 1 minute. Cool before spreading on cake.

Lady Baltimore Filling
1 recipe boiled or uncooked frosting
½ cup seeded raisins
2 tbsps. lemon juice
½ cup pasteurized dates, chopped
½ cup chopped figs
½ cup chopped nuts
Mix ingredients with boiled or uncooked frosting and use as filling for Lady Baltimore Cake. One fourth pkg. sliced citron and candied cherries may be added.

Fudge Frosting
2 sqs. chocolate
2 cups sugar
½ cup milk
¼ cup dark corn syrup
1 tsp. vanilla
2 tbsps. butter
Cut chocolate and combine with sugar, milk, and syrup and cook until it forms a very soft ball when tried in cold water (234 degrees F.). Remove from fire, set pan in cold water, add butter and let stand until mixture thickens enough to stick to pan when tried with spoon. Add flavoring and beat until thick enough to spread on cake.

Tropical Filling
¼ cup sugar
1 tbsp. cornstarch
¼ tsp. salt
½ pkg. sliced orange peel
½ cup orange juice
2 tbsps. butter
1 egg yolk
1 tsp. lemon juice
Put sugar, cornstarch, and salt into top of double boiler. Mix, add orange peel and juice, add butter, egg yolk; cook until smooth and thick. Remove from fire, add lemon juice. Spread between layers of cake.

"Holt!" he exclaimed. "That's the chap who followed those three women away from Short's hotel the other night! A million to one on it!"



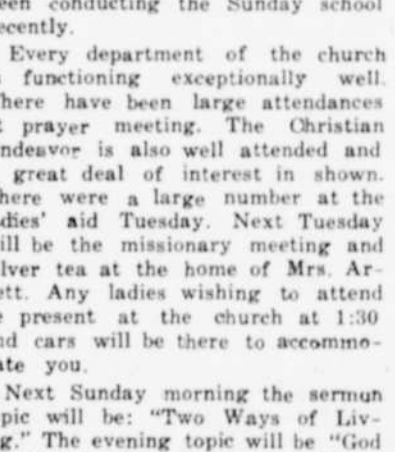
Methodist Church
