Booze Bill Put to Sleep
The Senate committee on alcoholic traffic brought in a unanimous adverse report on the Upton bill 160 providing for the adoption of the provisions of the Volstead act for the state to take the place of the present dry law.

Eberhard asserted that it would be just as reasonable to repeal all traffic laws, cigarette laws, and other laws because they are not enforced; that prohibition laws are as well enforced as other laws.

Exemptions
In the exemption feature of the proposed new intangibles tax law the commission proposed a plan whereby any person married or single, having an income of \$750 or less would pay no tax and under a graduated scale, anyone having an income of \$1500 or more from intangibles would be allowed no exemptions. This plan of exemptions would favor such persons as widows and others beyond the years of normal earning capacity, with small incomes.

An increase in the rate of the excise tax from 5 per cent to 8 per cent is the second part of the commission's plan.

The third proposal in the plan is to increase the rate on personal incomes, 1 per cent for each thousand dollars beyond the present rate of 1 to 5 per cent to 6, 7, and 8 per cent.
