The Washington County Grade School basketball tournament held in the Beaverton High School gymnasium last Friday and Saturday was a big success in every way. There was a large attendance at all of the games. The tournament was run off without any complications, and a profit of \$25.75 was made. This was turned over to the Washington County Grade School Athletic league fund for conducting future county athletic activities.

The basketball teams were divided into two classes—Class A and Class B—according to the size of the schools they represented. Class A included the larger schools. The Beaverton team was the champion team in that class. The Beaverton captain was presented with the silver loving cup donated by the Bank of Beaverton.

The Gaston State Bank was the donor of the cup given the champions of Class B. The Gaston team won this cup.

Gaston and Beaverton played an exciting game Saturday night to decide the county championship. At the end of the game the score was tied, 11 to 11. It was decided to play an overtime period. At the end of this, the score was again tied, 13 to 13. Another overtime period, and the score was 15 to 15. At the end of the third overtime period with the score again tied, 17 to 17, the officials decided to have a meeting held in Hillsboro Wednesday afternoon to decide whether to have a return game, or to have the two schools hold the championship cup jointly. It was decided to hold a play-off game, in Hillsboro, Friday, March 20, to determine which team shall become custodian of the championship cup.

Oris Nelson is on crutches as the result of a dislocated knee sustained in Saturday night's game. Regret was shown over Oris' forced elimination from the game, for he is one of Beaverton's fine players, but John Mason, who substituted for him did very creditably indeed.

Before the championship game Saturday night, Forest Grove of Class A and Timber of Class B played the final consolation game. Forest Grove won the pennant.

All awards were presented to the captains of the winning teams by O. B. Kraus, county school superintendent, Saturday night after the Beaverton-Gaston game.

CITY TO PURCHASE DUMPING GROUNDS

At the special meeting of the City Council, it was voted unanimously to instruct the Mayor to open negotiations to secure the dumping grounds recommended by the Chamber of Commerce at their meeting held some weeks ago. This matter came up at a previous Council meeting but it had been temporarily tabled in hopes of being able to secure the place at more favorable terms.

Engineer Robinson was present at this week's meeting and repeated the probable cost at the present time to get water from the springs to the north of town as a source of water supply for Beaverton.

Negotiations had been suggested by former Mayor Erickson and former Alderman Lewis, and the Council had met with the owner of the grounds about the springs. The owner is reported to have intimated to Messrs. Erickson and Lewis, and later to the members of the Council, that he was agreeable to an arrangement which would allow Beaverton a considerable part of the flow from this spring as a source of city water supply.

Tunnel Bill Victory Celebration Is Held

Program was Prepared and Sponsored by Officers of Westside Clubs

300 PEOPLE ATTEND

The Beaverton High School Band Furnishes Music for Occasion

About three hundred people attended the "Jubilee Celebration" held in the Beaverton High school in honor of the passage of the tunnel bill and its being signed by Governor Meier.

The program prepared and sponsored by the officers of the United Westside club showed evidence of careful and thoughtful preparation.

A. E. Wilson, Mayor of Beaverton, presided. On the platform were John H. Lewis, former State Engineer and a man full of knowledge of the tunnel project and of the real value of this project to the Tualatin valley; George Lippert, president of the United Westside Club; H. L. Davenport, secretary of the United Westside Club; Albert Tozier, custodian of the Champeo park and museum; and Otto Erickson, former mayor of Beaverton and a man who has fought diligently for the tunnel and for every development which would help to better conditions in the Tualatin valley.

Gus Anderson, member of the Portland Labor council; M. Provo, President of the Portland Labor Council; Senator E. E. Fisher, the man to whose untiring effort is due the enactment of the tunnel bill; and Ben Reiland, said to be the "Father of the Tualatin Tunnel," were all to be present on the platform, but for one reason or another these were not present, although Ben Reiland did show up late in the evening and made a short statement.

Beaverton High school band furnished music for the occasion. Invocation was pronounced by Rev. Charles Clark, Pastor of the Beaverton Methodist Congregational church. The audience sang "America" and short statements were made by those on the platform as well as the following: A. M. Jannsen, Reedville, and E. Frank Peters, Hillsboro, both of whom were in the legislature and worked for the passage of the tunnel bill; Ed Moore, secretary of the Hillsboro Chamber of Commerce; Doy Gray and Dr. C. E. Mason, members of the local school board; J. A. Tait, H. A. Alexander, W. H. Boswell, and G. P. Forney, members of the Beaverton City Council; J. H. Macdonald and G. J. Gillette of Multnomah, members of the Multnomah Boosters Club; C. J. Stickney of Alsea, Justice of the Peace; Sam Lawrence of Raleigh, attorney in Portland; Guy D. Kenney of Fairview, President of the Community club; E. G. Webb, member of the Beaverton high school faculty; Leonard Adams, President of the Beaverton Kiwanis Club; T. E. Huns of Garden Home, realtor, G. A. R. man, and booster; D. C. Howard, former County Agent for Columbia County; and Geo. Lippert.

Mr. Lippert made the principal speech of the evening, dwelling at some length on the obstacles overcome in the passage of the tunnel bill. He also graphically described the development to take place in this valley as well as pointing out the probable line of the project being a financial success.
