ON OREGON FARMS

Roseburg—Demonstration trials to test the efficiency of commercial fertilizers on orchard cover crops are under way on the farm of the Kamp Brothers of Umpqua in cooperation with County Agent J. C. Leedy. Fifth-acre plots were treated with ammonium sulphate, nitrate of soda and Swifts 6-12-2 fertilizer. A substantial increase in growth was noted three weeks after application.

The Dalles—Five varieties of alfalfa, including Ladak, Cossack, Baltis, South Dakota No. 12, and Grimm will be tried out by nine farmers in eight communities of Wasco county this year, if weather conditions permit planting, reports County Agent W. Wray Lawrence, who arranged for the demonstration trials.

Lakiev—Four acres of Ladino clover harvested for seed brought H. R. Bradley of the Vernon district a gross income of \$60 last year. This, according to Mr. Bradley's estimate, is twice as much as he would have received if the land had been seeded to grain, says Victor W. Johnson, county agent.

Dallas—Seventeen Polk county dairymen recently gathered at the farm of Ernest Ziesch of Polk, under the leadership of County Agent, J. R. Beck, to observe the present condition of silage made from 1930 first cutting alfalfa. Its evident palatability for both dairy and beef cattle and sheep aroused considerable interest.

La Grande—A carload of certified Marktown smut proof oats was recently sold for seed in Montana by H. H. Huron of Imbler at a good premium over feed oats prices. This variety of oats was introduced into Union county several years ago by the county agent, and has since become a standard variety in the dry land sections of the county. In addition to being smut proof, this variety has given higher yields and better quality of grain than was previously available.

St. Helens—Planning new spring wardrobes economically and renovating and remodeling last year's garments is occupying the attention and interest of a great many Columbia county women at this time, says Mrs. Sarah V. Case, home demonstrator agent. Mrs. Case is holding a series of meetings throughout the county for women who desire assistance with their clothing problems.

Mrs. Sara Prentiss, child care specialist, Oregon State college is cooperating in leading discussions.

Bend—Women in 11 communities of Deschutes county are finding new uses for old rugs, under the direction of Mrs. Ella F. Miller, home demonstration agent. Hooked rugs, chair seats, and many other attractive articles are being made from material otherwise useless.
