HOME POINTERS

SENSIBLE FOODS FOR FOOL'S DAY

On April 1st, that day dedicated to joke-makers, pranksters, and "charming fools", many countries have a special dish they serve in celebration of this mad holiday. In Holland, Hams and Gretel demanop pickled herring on April 1st; in France, a special soup known as Jean Potage is served; in Germany, Hans Wurst forms the traditional dish, and in England, John Bull sits down to a hearty bite of Jack Pudding.

Here in America, we have no special dish with which to celebrate the holiday that originated back in the time of the Romans, and reached its height in the Middle Ages, when the Court Jesters made it their own twenty-four hours. But one can always be different, and April Fool's Day presents a splendid opportunity to assemble some foods that are sensible. So try these dishes, which are far more practical than any prank by the same name—and the joke won't be on anybody!

Sensible dishes are wholesome; they are suited to the individual budget. But for all that, they needn't be lacking in what passes for "chic" in the culinary world. Premiere of all sensible dishes, fulfilling all these qualifications, is our old stand-by Cornstarch Pudding, or "Blanc Mange." Its cost is so small as to make it almost negligible, and there are dozens of variations to keep it recurrently interesting.

Basic Recipe for Cornstarch Pudding

4 1/2 tbsns. corn starch
3 1/2 cups milk
1/3 cup sugar
4 tsp. salt
1 tsp. vanilla
Mix cornstarch to smooth paste with one-half cup milk. Scald rest of milk; add sugar, salt, and cornstarch, stirring constantly. Cover and cook in top of double boiler for 20 minutes until thick and smooth. Remove from fire; add flavoring and pour into mold. Chill, serve cold with chocolate or fruit sauce and whipped cream.

Variations

For Golden Pudding: Beat two egg yolks into hot pudding after it is removed from fire. For Coconut Pudding: Fold in two beaten beaten egg whites, after removing from fire, and add 1 cup shredded coconut, or colored coconut frosting. **For Chocolate Pudding:** Use basic recipe, mixing 3 squares melted chocolate and 1/4 teaspoon salt; with 2 1/2 cups of the milk and scalding; before adding cornstarch and milk mixture and proceeding as before. Serve with whipped cream. **For Jelly Pudding:** Cut mold-ened gelatine or fruit flavored jelly into cubes and set around blanc mange, serving with milk. **For Sundae Pudding:** Make a sauce by heating 1/4 cup cream to 3/4 cup cream syrup in any favorite flavor; bring to boil, add nutmeats, and pour over pudding. **For Date Blanc Mange:** Arrange pitted pasteurized dates on top, the molded puddings, in semi-circle or chop and add after removing from fire.

Fruit Coffee Cake

2 cups flour
1/2 tsp. salt
4 tpsa. baking powder
3 tpsps. sugar
2 tpsps. corn oil
1/2 to 1 cup milk
1/2 cup pasteurized dates
1/4 cup nutmeats
1/4 cup butter
1/2 cup brown sugar
3 tpsps. flour
1/2 tsp. cinnamon
Mix and sift flour, salt, baking powder and sugar. Stir in oil and milk to make a stiff batter. Spread mixture about 1/2 inch thick in a shallow pan. Press sliced dates and nuts into surface of the cake. Bake in fairly hot oven (400 degrees F.) for 20 minutes; then spread with remaining ingredients which have been rubbed together. Return to the oven and bake 10 minutes longer.

Macedoine Salad

2 cups cooked rice
1 cup peas
4 tablespoons pimento
4 tablespoons relish
3 tablespoons celery, minced
3 tablespoons cheese, grated
1 teaspoon salt
lettuce and dressing
Combine ingredients lightly, chill. Serve on crisp lettuce with French dressing or mayonnaise.

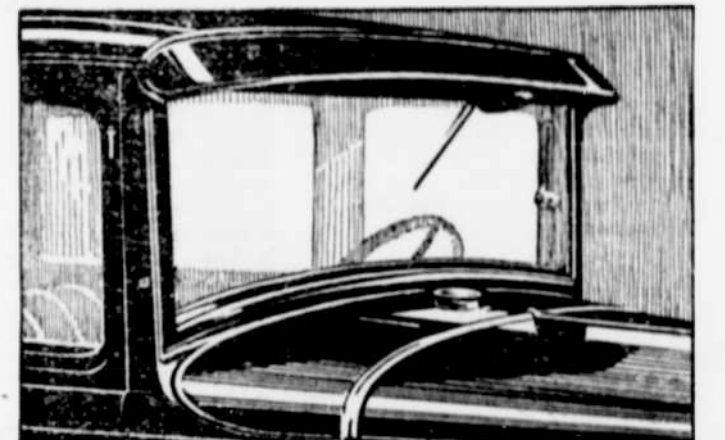
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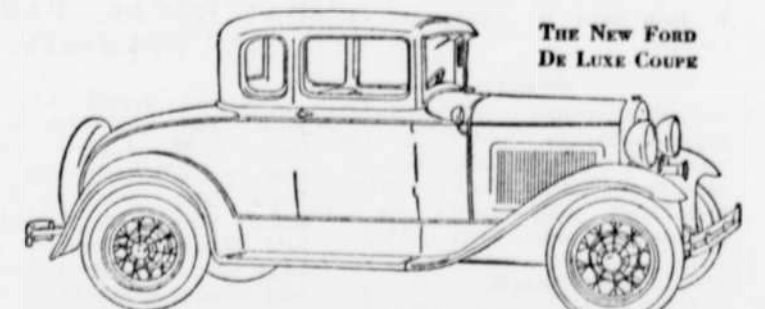


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
