The Cook's Nook

Frizzled Beef
4 lb. dried beef
3 tbsps. corn oil
Pepper
2 tbsps. corn starch
2 cups milk
Tear beef into pieces. Heat corn oil in frying pan; add pepper; cook beef in it a few minutes. Sprinkle with cornstarch and cook 2 minutes, stirring well. Add milk and stir until it boils. Boil 3 minutes. Add salt if necessary. Serve as entree or main luncheon dish.

Pimiento Croquettes
2 cups cooked rice
1 cup milk
4 tbsps. butter
4 tbsps. flour
1 tsp. salt
1 egg
1 2-oz. can pimientos
Melt butter, add flour, blend and

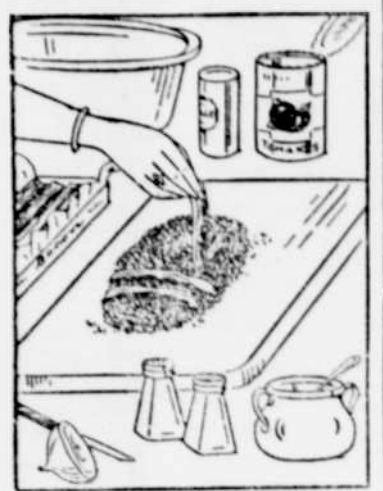
add milk. Cook until thick. Add salt, rice, beaten egg and chopped pimiento. Cool. Shape in cylinders. Roll in bread crumbs, then in egg, and then in crumbs. Fry in deep corn oil hot enough to brown a piece of bread in 40 seconds. 12 croquettes.

Stuffed Tomato Salad
6 tomatoes
1 cup cooked rice
1/2 cup celery, diced
4 tablespoons cheese, grated
1 hard boiled egg
2 tablespoons pimiento
1 small onion
seasoning
dressing
Scop out centers of tomatoes and chop. Mix ingredients together and season with salt, vinegar and any other desired seasonings. Refill tomato shells and serve with any salad dressing.

An Inexpensive Meat Dish

AMERICA has become a nation of meat eaters with beef, pork, lamb and the other offerings of the butcher forming the main dish around which the heavy meal of the day is built. Because of this,



secret lies largely in the types of seasoning used, and the way they are blended to create a harmonious whole. Salt, pepper, sugar, sage and other standard condiments should be found in every kitchen, and these are all important in turning the inexpensive cut into a delicious dish. Everyone is familiar with the seasoning qualities of salt and pepper and most of the other standard bys. The sugar is a recent discovery of culinary experts, although it has been used by continental chefs and housewives for many years. It functions, not as a sweetener, but to "blend" and point up the other flavors.

Here is one meat dish, made from inexpensive cuts, that provides a tasty offering calculated to please the entire family.

Meat Mound
1 lb. round steak
ground
1/2 lb. pork ground
1/2 can tomatoes
2 teaspoons sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
pinch of sage
1 small onion minced
Mix onion, sugar, sage, tomatoes, salt and meat until well blended. Shape in a mound and place in a roaster. Cover top with four or five strips of bacon. Place in an oven about 375 degrees for one hour. Remove top of roaster the last fifteen minutes and increase heat.
