KITCHEN LORE

JANE ROGERS

NOT only as a healthful and delicious fruit, but also as an important flavoring agent, the orange deserves a prominent place in the cuisine. This latter use of the orange is not so well known as it deserves to be, but along with limes and tangerines, the orange never fails to lend a pleasant touch to the recipe in which it is used.

Both the grated rind and juice can be used with effect in the preparation of sauces, garnishes or stuffings for meats or fowl. In selecting oranges for flavoring, it is best to choose the thin skinned varieties; and since the amount of juice is important, to remember that size for size, the heavier fruit is always the juicier.

Roast Duckling a la Mignon
Prepare a duckling for roasting in the usual manner, adding one teaspoon of grated orange rind to the stuffing. Place in a hot oven for 15 minutes. When the fat begins to run, baste every 15 minutes with a syrup made from the juice of three oranges, one teaspoon of thin apple sauce and one-half cup of sugar. Garnish the duckling with thick slices of orange on beds of water cress.

HOME POINTERS

Fruit-Cheese Filling
2 pkgs. cream cheese
1/2 pkg. pasteurized dates
1/4 tsp. powdered ginger
Put dates or use ready pitted variety and slice. Add enough cream or milk to cream cheese to give proper consistency for spreading. Then add dates and ginger to cream cheese, mix well. The sliced crystallized ginger may be used if desired. This recipe makes enough filling for 12 large sandwiches.

Four Fruits Circle
A real salad "ensemble" in tones of yellow, orange and brown is this one for fruit lovers:
6 slices pineapple
1 No. 2 can grapefruit
2 seedless oranges
Lettuce
6 pasteurized dates
1/2 pkg. cream cheese
Salad dressing
Place slice of pineapple on bed of lettuce leaves. Cover round with alternate whole segments of grapefruit and orange. Fill cavity in center of round with a date stuffed with cream cheese moistened to a paste with juices from the canned fruits. Serve with cream mayonnaise or sweet French dressing.

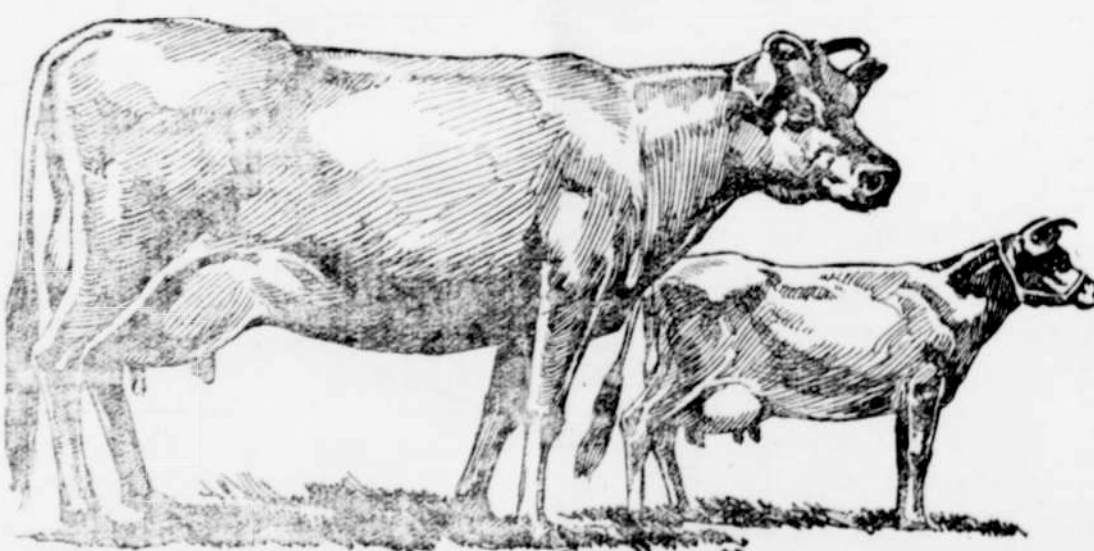

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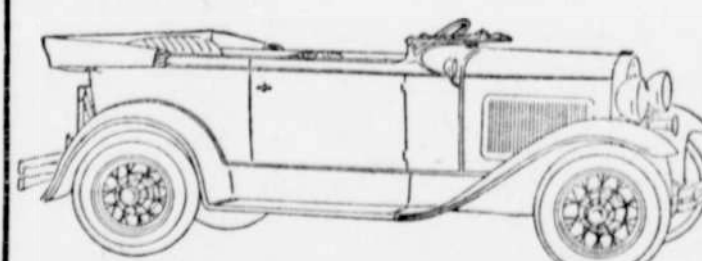
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
