FIND WEEVIL ADULTS NEAR HILLSBORO

Strawberry root weevil adults are cut crawling around under the leaves of the plants in some fields around Hillsboro. In most fields in other parts of the county looked over recently, it is a little too early for bailing except for the over-wintering type. Where the adults are out, weevil bait should be applied before egg laying begins. These adults do not all come out at the same time and if but one application of bait is to be made this should be timed so that there will be a reasonably fresh supply available and attractive when the largest number of adults will be active.

Strawberry weevil live on more than ten other host plants, and can be found where strawberries have not been grown before. The life of new plantings can frequently be prolonged by consistently baiting, beginning with their first year.
