ANNIVERSARY OF P. HENRY'S DEATH

"Caesar had his Brutus, Charles the First his Cromwell, and George the Third—may profit by their example. If this be treason, make the most of it."

What school boy is not familiar with these immortal words. Who has not read them and visualized the fiery and eloquent Patrick Henry making this irresistible appeal to his countrymen to resist the oppressive measures of the British ministry? The undying fame that came to the young Virginia lawyer because of this speech was well deserved, as his later life proved, for no one in all the American colonies was a stauncher patriot or more ardent advocate of liberty.

Patrick Henry was born in Hanover County, Virginia, May 26, 1736, and the Division of Information and Publication of the United States George Washington Bicentennial Commission has issued a statement commemorating the 150th anniversary of his birth. This birthday is marked by the Bicentennial Commission as one of the dates to be observed in connection with the nation-wide celebration next year of the Two Hundredth Anniversary of the Birth of George Washington, which will begin on February 22, and continue until the following Thanksgiving Day.

Henry was one of the leaders of the patriot cause during the Revolutionary War. In fact, he was perhaps responsible, more than any other one man, except George Washington, although the two men differed widely in their political beliefs. Washington favored a strong central government, while Henry was decidedly averse to any serious encroachments on the authority of the States. While Washington advocated the adoption of the Federal Constitution, Henry vigorously opposed its ratification in Virginia.

He had several terms as Governor of the old Dominion, and his influence in that State was so great that he was able to prevent the election of James Madison to the United States Senate. He opposed Madison because of his part in framing the Constitution.

Despite the political differences between them, Washington always entertained the highest regard for Patrick Henry. In fact, Washington frequently expressed himself as feeling greatly indebted to his fellow Virginian, because of the personal friendliness he displayed during the Revolutionary War. When Washington was at Valley Forge with the Conway Cabal at its most threatening stage, Henry forwarded to the General letters he had received from some of the conspirators. It was a friendly act by which he hoped to put Washington on his guard.

Because of his devotion to the welfare of his country during the most trying period of her early existence, Patrick Henry rightly occupies a place of prominence on her roll of honor. He ardently desired the Independence of the United States, and to this end, his whole-hearted efforts were fearlessly engaged. The esteem in which he was held by his associates in Virginia is attested by the many terms he was called to serve as Governor of that State. When he died on June 6, 1799, he had just been elected to the Virginia House of Delegates.

Virginia's regard for the great orator is today shared by the entire nation. In the hearts of his countrymen will always burn his immortal statement: "Give me liberty or give me death!"

American Flies Soon to Tempt Canada's Speckled Trout



At this season of the year the dyed-in-the-wool trout fisherman spends his long evenings overhauling his fly-rods, oiling his reels and looking over his flies in preparation for his annual journey in quest of square-tailed speckled brook trout. Considered by many anglers to be the stoutest-hearted warrior for his size among North America's game fish, Canada, our great hospitable neighbor to the North, provides many hundreds of turbulent streams where brook trout abound. The sylvan fastnesses of Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia are ideal spots in which to spend a week or two whipping the streams and rivers. Quebec's trout streams are numerous and readily accessible from the eastern States, making them popular with

Uncle Sam's Waltonians. The streams in the districts north of Quebec City provide sport aplenty, while those in the Laurentians northwest of Montreal also have their champions. Quebec's trout season opens May 1 and closes September 30.

Ontario, long a favorite playground for sportsmen from all parts of the United States, particularly for those living in the eastern and middle-western regions, has a trout stream in the Nipigon River which is celebrated the world over for producing the largest square-tailed speckled brook trout in the world—a 14½ pounder taken by Dr. J. W. Cook of Fort William, Ont. For the convenience of anglers and their families the Canadian Pacific Railway has erected a comfortable bungalow camp in this beautiful Nipigon region, and this rendezvous is becoming increasingly popular as the fame of the trout spreads far and wide. Nipigon is in the vast Lake Superior country, 921 miles west of Montreal and 742 miles northwest of Toronto. The trip from the bungalow camp by fast motor launch to St. Ignace Island is one of the most beautiful short water journeys in Canada and it is generally productive for the angler, too, for the huge "coaster" trout—genuine square-tails which have left their native rushing streams to make their homes along Lake Superior's rocky shores. In 1929 Allan Fulton, a youngster from Truro, N. S., caught a 7½-pound rainbow trout while trolling for "coasters" off this beautiful island.
