Preserving time is here again. The kitchen oozes luscious smells. The jars stand waiting open-mouthed.

For savories from hills and dells. The orchard and the sugar barrel are called upon to do their share. So here's a story telling how.

When, why and which, and also where.

Do you remember the days when almost every kitchen in the land seemed to be filled with bubbling and simmering pots about this time of year?

Grandmother made preserves, jellies, jams, and pickles all summer long it seemed. So did her sisters, her aunts, and her friends. Mother took up the task in later years, but for some reason or other, we have neglected preserving to some extent. Possibly this is because we have been able to purchase such excellent preserves whenever we needed them. Perhaps it was because certain fruits or other ingredients were not so cheap as they were ten or twenty years ago. At any rate, the good old-fashioned preserve closet with its shelves and shelves of goodies has not been so common of late. This year the pendulum seems to be swinging the other way. Most of our fruits and berries are very plentiful. Sugar, the other chief ingredient, is not only plentiful but extremely low priced. There is no reason, therefore, why the aromatic preserve bubbles should not burst again in homes all over the land.

There is a great deal to be said in favor of a well-stocked preserve closet. When company drops in unexpectedly, the dessert problem is a very simple one with such a closet to draw upon. A dish of peaches, strawberries or pears will always serve as a simple dessert, but these same preserves may be turned into sauces, used to flavor puddings, or used in some other ways to solve the dessert problem. The sugar contained in preserves and jellies is a very valuable quick-energy food so that the piece of bread and jelly given between meals to the little ones is a real fuel food indeed.

Have you ever enjoyed the thrill of placing some of your own home-made preserve or jelly before your guests? If not this is a wonderful year to prepare your-

self for such a thrill. Here are some very simple little recipes. Try them and many others as well.

Spiced Plums

4 quarts plums
1 pint vinegar
3 pounds sugar
1 tablespoon each of cloves, cinnamon, allspice

Wash the plums, dry them and place them in a stone jar. Boil the vinegar, sugar and spices together for ten minutes and pour this hot syrup over the plums. Cover the jar and let it stand overnight. Drain off the liquid and heat it. When it is boiling add the plums and cook them until they are clear, but not until they break. Pack them in clean hot jars and pour the pickling syrup over them. Seal. The plums should not lose their color and should remain firm and plump in appearance.

Peach and Apple Conserve

Use equal parts of peaches and apples diced. If the apples are a good color do not peel them. Add three-fourths as much sugar as fruit. Cook the mixture slowly until it is thick and clear. Seal in clean, hot jars.

Ginger Pears

5 pounds hard pears
5 pounds sugar
1/3 cup preserved ginger cut in small pieces
3 lemons, juice and grated rind
3 cups water

Remove the skin and cores from the pears and cut the fruit in slices lengthwise. Add the water and cook the pears until they are tender. Add the sugar and the other ingredients and simmer the mixture until it is thick. Pour it into clean, hot jars and seal. Hard varieties of apples may be preserved in the same manner.

A dainty dessert salad which looks like orange blossoms, has been devised for hostesses who tea, or bridge, or dine the bride-to-be. Each serving represents an orange blossom. On a crosswise slice of head lettuce a peeled orange is placed, the fruit opened so that each segment represents the petal of the flower. The orange is moistened with French dressing, and the whole sprinkled with orange coconut frosted and topped with whipped cream.

up with gasoline and oil," he writes. "This company had undertaken the tremendous task of supplying the necessary items for the course of the expedition. To lay down supplies across Central Africa from one coast to the other, it was necessary to send gasoline and oil to predetermined points. Some were sent up the Congo River and then into the interior by dugout canoes, some by camelback into the sand country near the Sahara, and some on the heads of porters into the swamp and bush country.

"No imagination could be so fanciful as to picture the scenes which were before our eyes," Mr. Hoefler writes of his book, "the natives who hunt ferocious lions with flimsy spears; lions that climb trees, and flocks of flamingos so dense that the river cannot be seen."

When Mr. Hoefler's party arrived at Lagos on the Atlantic Ocean, they had completed the first East to West crossing of Central Africa by automobile. They covered a total of 13,282 miles, although the bee line distance from the starting point, Mombasa on the east coast to Lagos is but 5,545 miles. Numerous side tours were made to collect scientific data and to make a pictorial record of some of Africa's secrets. While the explorers naturally expected hardships, numerous unforeseen obstacles were encountered. In "Africa Speaks," Mr. Hoefler tells of fashioning an axle from a lath found at a tin mine, of having the trucks lifted bodily from a mud-hole by friendly natives, and of a swarm of locusts, "twenty-five miles wide and sixty miles long" swooping down near the camp and leaving the country desolated.

Freedom of Press Maintained
Setting aside the famous Minnesota newspaper "rag" law by the United States Supreme court, may be one of the most important decisions ever handed down.

Chief Justice Hughes stressed the need for freedom of the press—holding that need to be greater than ever before. The law, in its intention, may have been good—to outlaw indecent and salacious sheets. But in its wording, it put newspapers at the mercy of political corruption or dictation. There is no place in America for suppression of honest comment or criticism.
