# The Cook's Nook

**Orient Originated Frozen Desserts**  
 Which Comfort "Hot and Bothered"  
 "Very clever, these Chinese!"  
 Stop and once more so remark the next time you put a delicious frozen dessert into your mouth— which if you are half as clever, will be very soon in these July days.

For the Chinese developed the original desserts for water ices, frozen desserts and frozen creams, if we can believe the archives which credit Marco Polo, adventurer extraordinary, with bringing the first frozen-dish recipes from the Orient to his native Italy. Italy remained the stronghold of the frozen fancy (witness their excellent spumoni!) until Catherine de Medici left Florence to become Queen of France and took with her a special chef to introduce the cooling desserts to a parched Europe. From France the vogue invaded England; from England it was brought to America.

Here in America we have developed so many new recipes that not a warm day need pass without a cold dessert to make the meals delightful. So, thank the Chinese, Messer Polo, whom you will, but try these recipes and you will be neither "hot nor bothered."

## Fruit Freeze

(For Salad Course)  
 1 No. 2 can grapefruit  
 1 No. 1 can apricots  
 1/2 cup celery  
 1/2 pkg. pasteurized dates  
 2/3 cup mayonnaise  
 1 cup heavy cream  
 Drain canned fruits from syrup, cut in small pieces and combine with diced celery. Add sliced dates. Whip cream and add it to mayonnaise. Add cream and mayonnaise to the fruits. Pack in trays of a mechanical refrigerator or in tight-lid covered mold in a mixture of ice and salt until frozen. Unmold. Serve on lettuce leaf garnished with small amount of cream mayonnaise. 12 to 14 servings.

## Peach Mousse

1 cup mashed fresh or canned peaches  
 1/2 cup sugar  
 3 tbsps. butterscotch syrup  
 Salt  
 1 tsp. gelatin  
 1 tbsps. water  
 Few drops almond extract  
 1/2 pint cream  
 Peel and mash peaches. Add sugar, butterscotch syrup, and salt. Soak gelatine in cold water and dissolve over hot water. Add almond extract and gelatin in cold water and dissolve over hot water. Add

**Grapefruit Ice**  
 1 1/2 cups sugar  
 1/2 cup light corn syrup  
 6 tbsps. lemon juice  
 1 No. 2 can grapefruit  
 1 1/2 cups water  
 Cook sugar, corn syrup and 1 cup of water to soft ball (240 degrees F.). Add lemon juice and water. Cool. Cut grapefruit segments into small pieces with scissors. Add to cooled syrup. Freeze. Yields 2 quarts (16 servings).

**Bagdad Whip**  
 1/2 lb. marshmallows  
 1/2 pkg. pasteurized dates  
 1/2 cup nutmeats  
 1/2 pint heavy cream  
 1/4 tsp. vanilla  
 1 doz. lady fingers or sponge cake

Cut pitted dates with wet scissors into quarters. Cut marshmallows into quarters with wet scissors. Break nut meats into coarse pieces.

Whip 1/2 cup of cream until stiff; add vanilla or 1 tablespoon sherry flavoring and fold in dates, marshmallows and nut meats. Chill in refrigerator for at least an hour. Line individual serving dishes with lady fingers which have been cut in half or use strips of sponge cake. Fill with marshmallow mixture and cover with remaining cream which has been whipped. Decorate with nut meats. Serves 6.

**Peppermint Fancy**  
 1 cup sugar  
 3 tbsps. cornstarch  
 2 tbsps. butter  
 2 tbsps. lemon juice  
 2 cups boiling water  
 Oil of peppermint  
 Green coloring  
 1 cup evaporated milk  
 2 egg whites  
 Blend together sugar, cornstarch, butter and lemon juice. Add boiling water, stir until smooth and cook until thick and clear, stirring constantly to prevent lumping. Add few drops oil of peppermint or a

teaspoon mint extract and coloring. properly chilled and whipped with mold, pack in salt-ice mixture, or Chill. Fold in milk that has been egg whites until stiff. Turn into freeze in refrigerator tray. Serves 8.

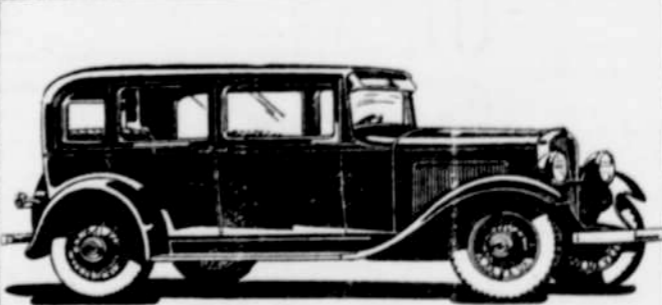
