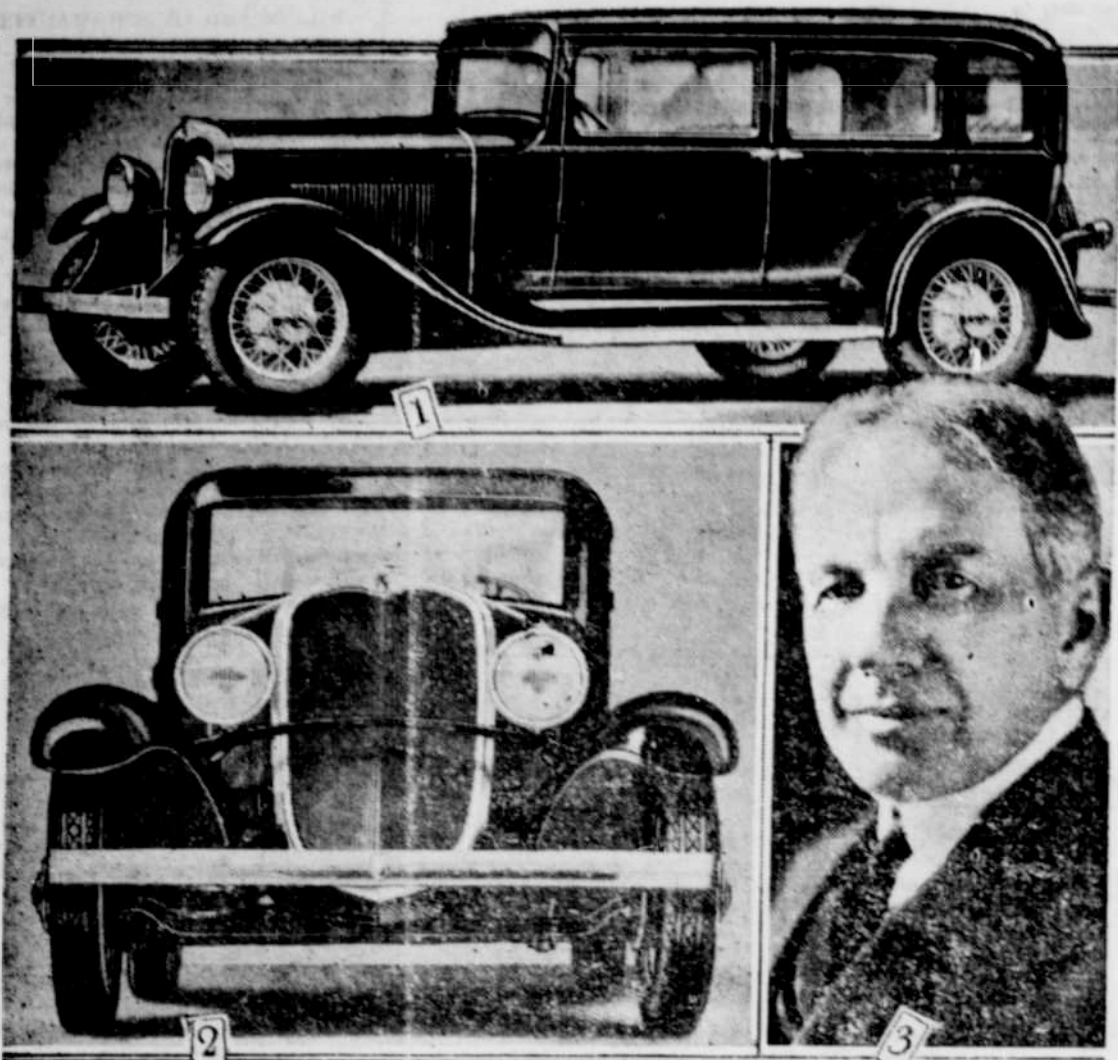




(1) Side view of new Durant 619, showing low streamline body. (2) Front view showing new radiator. (3) W. C. Durant, designer and manufacturer of the new car.

The latest development in the swiftly moving automotive industry is the presentation of a light Six with costly-car appearance and features, at price that makes its announcement a piece of real news—even in a field where the unusual occurs with commonplace frequency.

In presenting this, Mr. Erickson offers the following descriptive data: "Quite in keeping with the low streamlines of the exterior, the newest Durant model has a smartly tailored interior suggesting a selling price considerably above the one it actually bears.

"All bright finished exterior hardware is chromium plated. Riding ease is enhanced by hydraulic two-way shock absorbers.

"The power plant is a 71 H.P. Continental motor, capable of developing a speed of from 75 to 80 miles an hour. Steeldraulic 4-wheel brakes insure control.

Standard equipment includes the following: Temperature indicator, gasoline gauge, speedometer, ammeter, oil gauge, pull controls for spark, throttle and choke, coincidental ignition and coil lock, foot operated headlight control, rear view mirror, automatic windshield wiper, front and rear bumpers, hydraulic two-way shock absorber, air cleaner, oil filter. The chassis is lubricated thru zerk fittings.

Model 619 Durants are now on display at Otto Erickson's garage showroom; they are available for immediate delivery.
