The Cook's Nook

What to Take on Vacation Trip

If Foods Don't Grow on Buses
Hundreds of brilliant postal cards inscribed "wish you were here" fill the morning mail; homes from Maine to Texas are littered with vacation pamphlets; nine out of ten conversations begin, "when I go on my vacation"; All of which means that the great annual exodus to camps, summer cottages, beach-shacks, and mountain resorts is in full blast and fine fettle!

Some of the plans falling thick and fast about our heads must be devoted to the food question. "Far from the madding crowd" also means far from the place where fresh fruits and juicy beefsteaks grow in the corner store. Refrigeration facilities are not always of the best and the nearest farmer may not choose to part with his supplies.

That means we must stock up with foods that keep indefinitely and may be stored without refrigeration. Canned fruits, vegetables and entrees solve part of the problem; for variety and energy-content the sturdy dried fruits will be found invaluable. Dates, especially, because of their unversary appeal and versatility, are recommended. They need no refrigeration or special care, take little space, and combine readily with such staples as gelatine desserts, fancy crackers, canned fruit, cereals and cheese. Tuck these ingredients and recipes in your vacation stores. If you have no need of camp-recipes, keep them for summer picnics anyway!

TWO SIMPLE SALADS

Salad recipes call for lettuce, but if you have none, serve either of these on a fresh green leaf!

Hawaiian Salad

6 slices canned pineapple
12 pasteurized dates
1/4 lb. mild American cheese
Mayonnaise
Paprika
Rub soft mold American cheese through a wire strainer. Stir in enough mayonnaise dressing to permit shaping cheese into balls about 1 inch in diameter. Arrange pineapple on lettuce leaves. In center of each slice, place a ball of cheese. Dust lightly with paprika. Cut dates in quarters lengthwise with wet scissors and place strips on pineapple in the design of flower petals.

Sunflower Salad

Place a mould of sliced pasteurized dates in center of a leaf. Surround with sections of canned grapefruit arranged like flower petals. Serve with a favorite salad dressing.

Pantry-Shelf Sandwiches

The canned brown bread is used for these sandwiches; the dates are handy in their packages, the nutmeats fresh in the can. Hence, the name. Peanut butter may be used instead of nutmeats, if desired.

Moisten finely cut pasteurized dates with orange juice or other suitable liquid. Add chopper nut meats. Spread on thin rounds of buttered brown bread. Put slices together in pairs and cut in halves. One-half package of dates and one-half cup nutmeats will make one dozen sandwiches.

Vacation Julep

If ice is not obtainable at camp or on your picnic, try this. Set a can of grapefruit juice in an stream of water, leave until cold. Then puncture can and drink! A sprig of mint is a delicious addition. Canned grapefruit may be chilled in the same way.

Camp Cook's Pudding

Use left over cereal, rice, wheat compound, hominy or what is liked. Heat mixture and pour into custard cups or muffin pans over sliced dates. Turn upside down so dates will show, when serving.

Sandwich Isle Cookies

Use thin chocolate or ginger wafers, graham crackers or other fancy biscuits. Cook pasteurized dates in a little cold water until thick paste is formed. Then add chopped nutmeats and marshmallows cut in small pieces to date paste. Spread mixture, when cool, on cookie or cracker, place another cracker on top and press together. Serve as cake. Uncooked dates may be chopped and combined with nutmeats and chopped marshmallows. Moistened with any canned fruit juice, and used in same way.

Still another combination is a salty soda cracker, frosted with icing made of powdered sugar and water, chopped dates laid in frosting, and another frosted cracker put on top.

Flies, Moths, and Mosquitoes Belong In Same Class With Dreaded Bedbug



These visitors have come to stay.

CHICAGO—Bedbugs are the most universally abhorred of all household insect pests. It was revealed today in a "Social Register" of insects compiled by the American Research Foundation.

"Because bedbugs are so generally disliked, American housewives have waged relentless warfare on them with effective pest destroyers and have succeeded in curbing them to a very large degree," the Foundation reported, "but many other insects which cause even more damage than bedbugs are given little attention and therefore have multiplied in such proportions that they constitute real menaces to public health and property."

The "Social Register," the Foundation lists eleven insects in the order of their "popularity" as follows: Flies, moths, mosquitoes, crickets, ants, carpet beetles, book lice, centipedes, fleas, cockroaches and bedbugs.

"Flies, moths, and mosquitoes are the most numerous of insects because they are too often accepted in American homes as necessary evils," the Foundation asserted in a bulletin covering a nationwide survey of insects. "They are just as easy to destroy as bedbugs and cockroaches if attacked through their breathing pores by the spray of an effective pest destroyer and their number would be greatly reduced if housewives realized that they are just as much to be abhorred as the more loathsome bedbug."
