The Cook's Nook

Let Vegetables Be Versatile:

And Your Meals Be Superfine:

What this country really needs is not a five-cent cigar, but some new ways to fix vegetables. Wileless though the toast: "here's to potatoes, long may they boil" may be, therein lies a little object lesson for cooks.

We've been boiling vegetables long enough; now let's turn our energies to finding some new ways to prepare them, that we may "vary our victuals."

For one thing, we may scallop them, using a medium white sauce made "snappy" with onion, and creamy with cornstarch, as in the tested recipe for Scalloped Cauliflower. Or we may saute them in a bland oil to bring out their flavor, or make them into fritters, as in the Tomato recipe. Then, of course, there are vegetable salads, canapés, and sauces for the meat course. They will fill perfectly the role assigned them, if we just get busy and discover they are versatile!

Here are some recipes to begin on:

Tomato Fritters
3 cups tomatoes
6 cloves
1/2 cup sugar
3 slices onion
1 tsp. salt
Few grains cayenne
1/2 cup butter
1/2 cup cornstarch
1 egg

Cook first four ingredients twenty minutes, rub all through a sieve except seeds, season with salt and pepper. Melt butter, and when bubbling, add cornstarch and tomato gradually; cook two minutes, then add egg slightly beaten. Pour into a buttered shallow tin, and cool.

Turn on a board, cut in squares, diamonds, or strips. Roll in crumbs, egg, and crumbs again, fry in deep oil, drain and serve. Use either fresh or canned tomatoes; the fresh ones require longer cooking.

Scalloped Cauliflower
1 medium cauliflower
2 cooked eggs
Salt and pepper
1 1/2 cups white sauce
Bread crumbs

Make White Sauce as follows: Heat 1 1/2 tablespoons corn oil, and cook 1 tablespoon minced onion in it until tender. Then stir 1 tablespoon cornstarch, 1/2 teaspoon salt and pepper to taste, into oil and onion. Cook for two minutes, stirring, then stir in 1 cup milk. Continue cooking until sauce thickens, boil 3 minutes, strain and keep warm until using in scalloped cauliflower.

Break cauliflower head into small flowerets and cook in boiling water. Add salt just before cooking is completed. Drain. Grease a baking-dish and place a layer of cauliflower in it, then a layer of sliced eggs, then a layer of white sauce. Put a layer of crumbs over the top and bake in a hot oven until brown. Four tablespoons of grated cheese may be used instead of the hard-

Vegetable Goulash
1/2 cup corn oil
2 onions
2 green peppers
3 ears corn, raw or cooked
8 tomatoes
Salt and pepper

Heat corn oil, slice vegetables and add in order to the oil. Cook peppers, onions, and corn five minutes before adding tomatoes. Season and cook until tomatoes are soft. Serve plain, on toast or poured over meat.

Stuffed Egg Plant
1 egg plant
1 cup soft bread crumbs
2 tbsps. corn oil
1 tbsps. finely chopped onion
1/3 cup browned crumbs
Salt and pepper

Cook egg plant fifteen minutes in boiling water to cover. Cut slice from top and with spoon remove pulp. Chop pulp and add one cup soft, stale bread crumbs. Heat corn oil, and add finely chopped onion. Cook two minutes. Add pulp, season with salt and pepper and if necessary, moisten with a little stock or water. Cook five minutes.

Fill egg plant and cover with browned crumbs. Bake twenty-five minutes in hot oven, 450 degrees F.

Sweet Pickles
(By Jennie Shearer)

Put sufficient cucumbers in brine to make ten gallons and leave for ten days. If too salt, freshen in clear water to suit taste. After sorting out all soft or flabby ones, leave over vinegar to cover and leave another ten days. Drain off vinegar and sort again. Add to the same vinegar one-fourth ounce of oil of cloves and some of oil of cinnamon and add each day (until sweet enough) one cup of sugar, stirring well. When sweet enough, dissolve a tablespoonful of benzoate of soda in a cup of the vinegar and mix well with the liquid. By adding the sugar slowly each day the pickles will be firm and not swelled.

COUNTRY TOWN PLEASURE
Perhaps foremost among the pleasures and joys of country town life should be placed the warm and free hearted intercourse among the people.

City life raises barriers of stiffness and unsciability. There is a kind of strain about life in crowded towns, which leads people as a measure of self protection to hold themselves aloof to a large extent. They form the habit of not speaking to each other on the street un-

less they have been formally introduced. Even if they have met each other conventionally, they forget faces soon because they see so many people, that it is hard to remember each other.

This stiff formality produces an isolation far worse than the so-called loneliness that is said to exist in country localities. The friendly person walks down a city street, and he feels the coldness and remoteness of many strange faces that care nothing whatever for him.

But such a person comes into a country town, and soon the faces that he meets on the street express pleasure at seeing him. Their smiles and cordial greetings give him the sense of companionship, and convey assurances of sympathy.

When he attends social gatherings, instead of finding a freezing atmosphere among people who rarely see and care little for each other, he finds such meeting places like a jolly family gathering where everybody knows everyone else, and all act as if they were at home. This releases merriment and good fellowship. Instead of polite and formal manners, the room resounds with the happy laughter. It is like exchanging the cold light of an Arctic winter, for the warm sun of a bright spring day. Many a cold hearted person has been thawed out by the simple and friendly life of a country town.

CHICAGO'S 1933 EXPOSITION OPENS FIRST EXHIBIT
Two years before the formal opening of a Century of Progress—Chicago's 1933 World's Fair—the first exposition building has been thrown open to the public.

It is Fort Dearborn, an exact replica of Chicago's birthplace—the log stronghold built in 1803 by Captain John Whistler and burned to the ground by savage Redskins on August 15, 1812, after the evacuating garrison had been massacred.

Silhouetted against the skyscrapers of modern Chicago, Fort Dearborn offers a romantic contrast to life today.

From the top of a tall pole in the center of the parade ground flies a flag bearing fifteen stars and fifteen stripes.

At diagonal corners of the fort, log blockhouses frown down upon the narrow enclosure between inner and outer stockades and menace the prospective foe with brass French cannon which saw service in the War of 1812.

Ancient flint-lock muskets, dueling pistols and powder horns hang on the rough, hand-axed walls and above the heavy, masonry fireplaces.

It is a fascinating reproduction of frontier life at the beginning of the marvelous century whose culmination the world will celebrate in Chicago in 1933.
