BEAVERTON DELEGATION URGES ROAD

A delegation from Beaverton motored to Salem, Thursday of last week, and met with the State Highway Commission, urging that body to designate a short cut to the Sea. They also called attention to the bottle neck that now exists at the western limits of the town of Beaverton.

Their attention was called to the fact that the present highway between Beaverton and Forest Grove was of mutual concern to the people of Eastern Washington County, and that they give the widening of the Tualatin Valley Highway their immediate attention.

A. E. Wilson, mayor of Beaverton, was the principal speaker for the delegation. He spoke at length on the need of the Champeog Memorial Highway between Salem and Champeog, connecting at the West end of the proposed Tualatin Tunnel.

Mr. Gilsdorf of Huber explained to the Commission that options for the right of way between Beaverton and Hillsboro had been secured but now expired, and to date nothing had been done on the widening which would when completed, serve the traveling public as a hookup with the Short Cut to the Sea.

The people of Portland were represented by L. M. Leppert, President of the East Side Commercial Club, he also explained to the Highway Commission that the southern section of the State of Oregon already had ten coast routes to the beaches and that the people of Portland were only asking for one.

John Thornburg of Forest Grove headed another delegation from Tillamook County, and explained the advantages of the Wilson River route which was personally endorsed by County Judge, Donald T. Templeton of Washington County. The Washington County delegation listened with open ears to hear at least a few words from the Tillamook County Judge in favor of the much needed widening between Beaverton and Hillsboro, but not a word was to be heard. He evidently was busy boosting for his own County in long pants while representing the people, or maybe there might be a future when the primary election rolls around.

Our County Judge forgot to make any mention of the something like \$10,000 offered by the County Court of Washington County for the widening of the Tualatin Valley Highway between Beaverton and Hillsboro, which is a 16-foot highway
