Frosty Drinks Made This New Way Give You "Pep" for Summer Sports

To keep "peppy" though active in summer sports, take a tip from the athlete and drink your energy right in the same cooling drinks we like to imbibe! It has been said that much of the illness which occurs during and after the summer months may be traced to exhaustion effected by summer sports, which deplete the body's energy, and leave it a prey to the errant germ.

Instead of numerous "don'ts" try three simple "do's": Quit exercising when you begin to tire. Relax for a few moments after your game. Replace the body's fuel supply with "quick energy" foods, as soon as relaxation period is over.

"Quick energy" foods, in case you find the term vague, are those which are assimilated by the body without a preliminary process of digestion, and immediately begin to replace the sugars in the blood and muscles which have been burned by exercise.

While most of our energy comes from carbohydrates, many of them must be changed from a "complex" to a "simple" sugar before utilization by the body, and this causes delay in getting "pepped up." Therefore carbohydrates which do not require these bodily processes are called "quick energy" foods.

This class of foods contains "fruit sugar" or what the dietitians call "dextrose", placed by nature in many of our native products. Corn syrup, because of the large amount of this element it contains, is one of our most valuable energy foods. This syrup may be easily added to our favorite drinks and improves their flavor as you will note in the following recipes.

Current Pineapple Punch

1/4 cup sugar
1 glass currant jelly
1/4 cup light corn syrup
1/4 cup lemon juice
2 cups boiling water
1 cup pineapple juice
1 cup orange juice
1 bottle ginger ale
Dissolve sugar, and jelly in boiling water. Cool and add pineapple, orange and lemon juice. Pour in pitcher or punch bowl and add ice cubes. Just before serving add ginger ale.

5 level tbsps. cocoa
8 tbsps. light corn syrup

REAL ESTATE TRANSFERS

3 cups milk
Pinch of salt
Ice cream
1 cup boiling water
Put milk and water in sauce pan first. Add cocoa, syrup and salt and bring to a boil. Beat and let cool. Chill and pour in tall glasses. Put 1 scoop vanilla ice cream in each glass, stir until frothy and serve.

Grape-Cider Gigolo

1 cup orange juice
2 tbsps. lemon juice
1 quart cider
1 quart grape juice
1 1/2 cups light corn syrup
Add a little grated rind of orange to the orange and lemon juice. Add cider, sugar to taste, and syrup. Warm slightly and stir thoroughly. Add grape juice. Chill and serve in sherbet glasses with ice cubes.

Honey Bee Cocktail

1 cup orange juice
4 tbsps. lemon juice
3 tbsps. honey flavored syrup
Mix ingredients vigorously. Serve in cocktail glasses with ice.

Three Fruit Float

Make an ice in mechanical refrigerator with this recipe: Juice of 2 large oranges
Juice of 2 lemons
2 ripe bananas
1 tsp. gelatin
1 1/2 cups sugar
1/4 cup light corn syrup
2 cups water
Boil sugar, syrup, and water until sugar is dissolved. Remove from fire and add gelatin dissolved in 2 tablespoons cold water. Strain orange and lemon juice, press bananas through a sieve. Combine all together and freeze in refrigerator trays. Stir two or three times during freezing.

Place serving of the ice in tall glass. Pour ginger ale over it to make "float", top with sprig of mint and serve.

Crystal Tea

2 quarts boiling water
1 sliced lemon
1/4 cup light corn syrup
4 tbsps. tea leaves
Pour boiling water into teapot or granite kettle (do not put in metal pan). Add 4 tablespoons of tea and allow to steep from 3 to 7 minutes. Strain and stir in syrup. Let cool and add ice. Put slice of lemon in each glass and serve. This use of syrup eliminates stirring and sweetening after serving.
