# The Cook's Nook

You'll Cry "Ooh La La", Too, Over French Dressing Made This Way. Spruce salads as well as some mademoiselles like their dressing to be French! The crisp green ones always do, and so does the fruit and the vegetable if the dressing is properly varied. Salad dressings, like our own costumes, must suit the wearer.

Time was when French dressings were pretty prosaic and apt to consist either of plain oil and vinegar or of anything the cook chose to throw into them. Now we have standardized recipes which always turn out the successful same way, and we have new information! For instance, we know that the bland salad oils made from corn are not only more satisfactory and less expensive than the old time olive oil, but that they please people who used to shun dressing made with strong ingredients.

We have discovered that a small piece of ice put in with the other ingredients will hasten the mixing, that a bottle is better for the shaking than a bowl; that powdered sugar is better than granulated; that a bit of onion juice or catsup will give it new flavor. We do not hesitate to add minced pimientos or even currant jelly when those flavors are appropriate.

(To know just when a variation is appropriate, glance over the suggestions which follow the recipes below.) Perfect your procedure for the standard recipe, go on to the new types, and find out what the French mean when they cry "ooh la la" over a salad!

**Standard French Dressing**  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1/2 tsp. mustard  
Paprika  
1/2 tsp. sugar  
6 tbsps. corn salad oil  
1/2 tsp. onion juice  
2 tbsps. vinegar

Mix dry ingredients and add to corn salad oil. Add onion juice and vinegar and stir until it thickens. A small piece of ice added before stirring hastens the process.

**Roquefort Dressing**  
To Standard French Dressing add 1/2 or three ounces of Roquefort cheese. Beat with fork until cheese is broken into small particles. Serve with lettuce or other salad vegetables.

**Fruity French Dressing**  
1/2 cup corn oil  
2 tbsps. canned grapefruit juice  
1/4 tsp. paprika  
2 tbsps. lemon juice  
1 tsp. powdered sugar

Mix in order given. Chill and shake well before serving.

**Chili Sauce Dressing**  
Beat 3 tablespoons chili sauce and 1 tablespoon horseradish into Standard French Dressing. Serve with fish or meat salad or with plain lettuce.

**Currant Jelly Dressing**  
1/3 cup corn oil  
1 1/2 tbsps. lemon juice  
1/4 tsp. salt  
1 tsp. currant jelly  
Combine ingredients, then beat well and serve with any fruit salad.

**California Dressing**  
1 cup corn oil  
1 cup sugar  
1/2 cup malt vinegar  
1 tsp. grated onion  
1/2 cup catsup  
1 1/2 tbsps. salt  
1 tsp. Worcestershire Sauce  
Mix all ingredients with a piece of ice in the bowl, and beat until thick.

**Spicy Salad Dressing**  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 cup vinegar  
2 tbsps. corn salad oil  
2 tbsps. grated onion  
1 tsp. salt  
1 tsp. ground sweet pepper  
Paprika  
4 drops Worcestershire Sauce  
1 tsp. ground celery  
Mix ingredients, add small piece of ice, and beat one minute until thick.

**Chiffonade Dressing**  
Standard French Dressing  
1 canned pimiento  
2 tbsps. celery  
1 tsp. parsley  
2 tbsps. onion  
1 hard boiled egg  
Mince ingredients finely and mix with Standard French Dressing. Serve with lettuce, endive, or romaine.

**Columbia Dressing**  
1 tsp. salt  
1 tsp. mustard  
6 tbsps. corn salad oil  
1/2 tsp. onion juice  
1 tsp. Worcestershire Sauce  
2 tbsps. lemon juice  
Mix ingredients in glass jar, cover, set in cold place and shake well before using.

**Chutney Dressing**  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1/4 tsp. paprika  
1 tsp. vinegar  
2/3 cup Chutney  
1 tsp. lemon juice  
4 tbsps. corn salad oil  
Mix salt, paprika, vinegar, lemon juice and oil. Blend well and then add Chutney. Serve with lettuce.

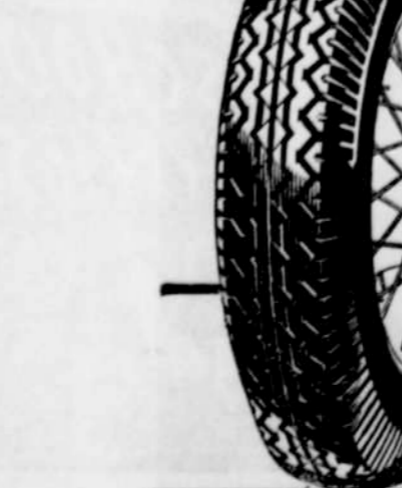
The Wilkamina "Times" has been purchased by W. P. Dunton of Woodland, Wash.
